| ascend | Go back in order of genealogical succession. <i>The first traveller to ascend the mountain.</i> |
| ascending | The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>Incomes ranked in ascending order of size.</i> |
| ascent | An instance of rising or moving up through the air. <i>The first ascent of the Matterhorn.</i> |
| boost | Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>He d had his wallet boosted in a bar.</i> |
| <u>climb</u> | An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. <i>The track climbed steeply up a narrow twisting valley.</i> |
| <u>climbing</u> | The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was climbing especially in the Alps.</i> |
| <u>elevate</u> | Increase the level of (something). <i>The field guns were elevated twenty degrees.</i> |
| elevator | A machine consisting of an endless belt with scoops attached, used for raising grain to an upper storey for storage. <i>In the elevator she pressed the button for the lobby.</i> |
| escalator | A stairway whose steps move continuously on a circulating belt. |
| high | A high place. <i>She wasn t tipsy just a little high.</i> |
| <u>hoist</u> | Raise (something) by means of ropes and pulleys. <i>Hoist the bicycle onto the roof of the car.</i> |
| ladder | With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>He climbed the career ladder.</i> |
| lift | A wave that lifts the surface of the water or ground. <i>He lifted his trophy over his head.</i> |

| mounting | The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its mounting.</i> |
| precipitate | A precipitated solid substance in suspension or after settling or filtering. <i>Cell proteins were then precipitated and washed in 10 trichloroacetic acid.</i> |
| promote | Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>They are using famous personalities to promote the library nationally.</i> |
| raise | Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>A strain of yeast that would create enough gas to raise the thick bread dough.</i> |
| rise | Rise to one s feet. <i>It was here that the brook had its rise.</i> |
| risen | (of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The risen sun.</i> |
| rising | Coming to maturity. <i>A rising young politician.</i> |
| soar | Fly by means of a hang glider. <i>The dollar soared against the yen.</i> |
| soaring | Increasing rapidly above the usual level. <i>Soaring prices.</i> |
| stairs | A flight of stairs or a flight of steps. |
| stepladder | A folding portable ladder hinged at the top. |
| underpin | Support from beneath. <i>The theme of honour underpinning the two books.</i> |
| uphill | An upward slope. <i>The journey is slightly uphill.</i> |
| upstairs | On or of upper floors of a building. <i>No one was allowed to see the upstairs.</i> |
| upward | Towards a higher place, point, or level. <i>From childhood upward.</i> |
| vertically | In a vertical direction. <i>Vertically integrated companies.</i> |
| zoom | Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>The camera zoomed in for a close up of his face.</i> |
