Associations of "Causal" (30 Words)

attached	Used of buildings joined by common sidewalls. <i>A ground floor bedroom with a toilet attached.</i>
<u>cohere</u>	Come or be in close contact with; stick or hold together and resist separation. <i>The sushi rice grains cohere.</i>
<u>coherence</u>	The quality of being logical and consistent. <i>This raises further questions on the coherence of state policy.</i>
connect	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>The brick connected on her head knocking her out.</i>
connected	Joined or linked together. <i>A series of connected stories.</i>
connection	Shifting from one form of transportation to another. <i>Ferry connections are sporadic in the low season.</i>
<u>correlated</u>	Mutually related. A statistic representing how closely two variables co vary it can vary from 1 perfect negative correlation through 0 no correlation to 1 perfect positive correlation. <i>There was no correlation between the number of visits to the clinic and the treatment outcome.</i>
correlation	
<u>friendship</u>	A relationship between friends. <i>This is an ideal group for finding support and friendship.</i>
genealogist	An expert in genealogy. <i>According to a genealogist she is the queen s 18th cousin.</i>
guesswork	An estimate based on little or no information. <i>Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of guesswork.</i>
indissoluble	(of a substance) incapable of being dissolved. <i>An indissoluble friendship.</i>

inextricable	Not permitting extrication; incapable of being disentangled or untied. <i>Inextricable unity.</i>
inference	The reasoning involved in drawing a conclusion or making a logical judgment on the basis of circumstantial evidence and prior conclusions rather than on the basis of direct observation. <i>It seemed a fair inference that such books would be grouped together.</i>
interconnect	Cause to be interconnected or interwoven. <i>The bones are interconnected via the muscle.</i>
interrelationship	The way in which each of two or more things is related to the other or others. <i>Interrelationships of animal structure and function.</i>
<u>involved</u>	Emotionally involved. <i>A castle involved in mist.</i>
<u>involvement</u>	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>US officials produced evidence of his involvement in drug trafficking.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>He joined the Communist Party as a young man.</i>
<u>liaison</u>	(in French and other languages) the sounding of a consonant that is normally silent at the end of a word, because the next word begins with a vowel. <i>He provided a liaison with the guerrillas.</i>
<u>link</u>	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>Ministers are the vital link in the chain between the civil service and Parliament.</i>
mutuality	The sharing of a feeling, action, or relationship between two or more parties. <i>The mutuality of their affection was obvious.</i>
nexus	A connected series or group. <i>The nexus of any government in this country is No 10.</i>
<u>relate</u>	Be in a relationship with. <i>I cannot relate these events at all.</i>
relation	The way in which two or more people or things are connected; a thing's effect on or relevance to another. <i>He was the hero according to his own relation.</i>

relationship

A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness.

*The **relationship** between mothers and their children.*

relatively

Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite.

*They were very poor but **relatively** speaking they had been lucky.*

socialize

Participate in social activities; mix socially with others.

*Newcomers are **socialized** into orthodox ways.*

tie

Hold together by a crosspiece or tie.

*Lewis **tied** on his apron.*

undergird

Provide support or a firm basis for.

*That s a philosophy that needs to **undergird** retailers business plans this year.*
