

- (of an action) characterized by the desire to avoid potential problems or dangers.
- (of a person) careful to avoid potential problems or dangers.
- Avoiding excess.
- Showing careful forethought.

Taking heed; giving close and thoughtful attention.

Aware that he had exceeded the speed limit.

careful Cautiously attentive.

He was very **careful** of his reputation.

Characterized by great caution and wariness.

heedful Giving attention.

Heedful of the warnings.

Inclined or willing to do something.

mindful I arrived home for the summer ever **mindful** of my obligations to my

parents.

Acting with or showing care and thought for the future.

A **prudent** manager.

vigilantKeeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties.

The burglar was spotted by **vigilant** neighbours.

wary Feeling or showing caution about possible dangers or problems.

Taught to be **wary** of strangers.

watchful Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness.

Twenty **watchful** weary tedious nights.

heed Pay close attention to give heed to.

If he heard he paid no **heed**.

measured Carefully thought out in advance.

She set off with **measured** tread.

meditative Deeply or seriously thoughtful.

Meditative techniques.



Behaviour, manner, or appearance intended to avoid impropriety or

modesty indecency.

Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.

A person or personified force who is the source of inspiration for a creative

<u>muse</u> artist.

Yeats **muse** Maud Gonne.

pensive Showing pensive sadness.

A **pensive** mood.

Reflect deeply on a subject.

I **ponder**ed the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.

A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or

precaution injury etc.

We never took **precautions**.

premeditated (of an action, especially a crime) thought out or planned beforehand.

A premeditated crime.

preoccupied Engrossed in thought; distracted. *She seemed a bit preoccupied.*

Acting with or showing care and thought for the future.

More **prudent** to hide than to fight.

solicitous Full of anxiety and concern.

Solicitous parents.

thoughtfulTaking heed giving close and thoughtful attention.

He was attentive and **thoughtful**.

warn Give (someone) cautionary advice about their actions or conduct.

The director **warn**ed him that he might be fired.

Marked by keen caution and watchful prudence.

Dogs which have been mistreated often remain very **wary** of strangers.

watchful Engaged in or accustomed to close observation.

They attended dances under the **watchful** eye of their father.
