admonitory	Giving or conveying a warning or reprimand. <i>The sergeant lifted an admonitory finger.</i>
<u>attention</u>	A motionless erect stance with arms at the sides and feet together; assumed by military personnel during drill or review. <i>He was found guilty of failing to give a patient adequate medical attention.</i>
<u>attentive</u>	Giving care or attention. <i>Attentive to details.</i>
<u>beware</u>	Be cautious and alert to risks or dangers. <i>We should beware the incompetence of legislators.</i>
<u>careful</u>	Exercising caution or showing care or attention. <i>Careful about one's behavior.</i>
carefully	Taking care or paying attention. <i>He listened carefully to the way people spoke.</i>
carefulness	The trait of being cautious; being attentive to possible danger. <i>I admired the carefulness of his work.</i>
caution	(of a police officer) advise (someone) of their legal rights when arresting them. <i>He exercised caution in opening the door.</i>
<u>cautious</u>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>The plan received a cautious welcome.</i>
ensorious	Severely critical of others. <i>Censorious champions of morality.</i>
circumspection	The quality of being wary and unwilling to take risks; prudence. <i>Circumspection is required in the day to day exercise of administrative powers.</i>
critical	Marked by a tendency to find and call attention to errors and flaws. <i>A critical illness.</i>
crucial	Having crucial relevance. <i>A crucial election.</i>
<u>discreet</u>	Intentionally unobtrusive. <i>A discreet investor.</i>
<u>forewarn</u>	Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem. <i>I forewarned him of the trouble that would arise if he showed up at his ex wife's house.</i>

heed	Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>We must take heed of the suggestions.</i>
historic	Famous or important in history, or potentially so. <i>A historical character.</i>
important	Important in effect or meaning. <i>An important senator.</i>
modesty	Behaviour, manner, or appearance intended to avoid impropriety or indecency. <i>Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i>
momentous	Of great importance or significance, especially in having a bearing on future events. <i>A momentous event.</i>
monition	A warning of impending danger. <i>A letter of admonition about the dangers of immorality.</i>
monitory	Serving to warn. <i>The chill monitory wail of an air raid siren.</i>
patent	Obtain a patent for. <i>He took out a patent for an improved steam hammer.</i>
pickpocket	A person who steals from people's pockets. <i>I think someone pickpocketed me in Brighton on my way to the station.</i>
pivotal	Fixed on or as if on a pivot. <i>A pivotal event.</i>
precaution	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took precautions.</i>
prudence	Knowing how to avoid embarrassment or distress. <i>We need to exercise prudence in such important matters.</i>
warn	Notify, usually in advance. <i>The old man warned the children off his property.</i>
warning	Cautionary advice about something imminent (especially imminent danger or other unpleasantness). <i>They gave little warning of their arrival.</i>
watershed	A ridge of land that separates two adjacent river systems. <i>The agreement was a watershed in the history of both nations.</i>
