<b>admonitory</b>	Giving or conveying a warning or reprimand. <i>The sergeant lifted an <b>admonitory</b> finger.</i>
<b><u>attention</u></b>	A motionless erect stance with arms at the sides and feet together; assumed by military personnel during drill or review. <i>He was found guilty of failing to give a patient adequate medical <b>attention</b>.</i>
<b><u>attentive</u></b>	Giving care or attention. <i><b>Attentive</b> to details.</i>
<b><u>beware</u></b>	Be cautious and alert to risks or dangers. <i>We should <b>beware</b> the incompetence of legislators.</i>
<b><u>careful</u></b>	Exercising caution or showing care or attention. <i><b>Careful</b> about one's behavior.</i>
<b>carefully</b>	Taking care or paying attention. <i>He listened <b>carefully</b> to the way people spoke.</i>
<b>carefulness</b>	The trait of being cautious; being attentive to possible danger. <i>I admired the <b>carefulness</b> of his work.</i>
<b>caution</b>	(of a police officer) advise (someone) of their legal rights when arresting them. <i>He exercised <b>caution</b> in opening the door.</i>
<b><u>cautious</u></b>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>The plan received a <b>cautious</b> welcome.</i>
<b>censorious</b>	Severely critical of others. <i><b>Censorious</b> champions of morality.</i>
<b>circumspection</b>	The quality of being wary and unwilling to take risks; prudence. <i><b>Circumspection</b> is required in the day to day exercise of administrative powers.</i>
<b>critical</b>	Marked by a tendency to find and call attention to errors and flaws. <i>A <b>critical</b> illness.</i>
<b>crucial</b>	Having crucial relevance. <i>A <b>crucial</b> election.</i>
<b><u>discreet</u></b>	Intentionally unobtrusive. <i>A <b>discreet</b> investor.</i>
<b><u>forewarn</u></b>	Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem. <i>I <b>forewarned</b> him of the trouble that would arise if he showed up at his ex-wife's house.</i>

<b>heed</b>	Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>We must take <b>heed</b> of the suggestions.</i>
<b>historic</b>	Famous or important in history, or potentially so. <i>A <b>historical</b> character.</i>
<b>important</b>	Important in effect or meaning. <i>An <b>important</b> senator.</i>
<b>modesty</b>	Behaviour, manner, or appearance intended to avoid impropriety or indecency. <i><b>Modesty</b> forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i>
<b>momentous</b>	Of great importance or significance, especially in having a bearing on future events. <i>A <b>momentous</b> event.</i>
<b>monition</b>	A warning of impending danger. <i>A letter of <b>admonition</b> about the dangers of immorality.</i>
<b>monitory</b>	Serving to warn. <i>The chill <b>monitory</b> wail of an air raid siren.</i>
<b>patent</b>	Obtain a patent for. <i>He took out a <b>patent</b> for an improved steam hammer.</i>
<b>pickpocket</b>	A person who steals from people's pockets. <i>I think someone <b>pickpocketed</b> me in Brighton on my way to the station.</i>
<b>pivotal</b>	Fixed on or as if on a pivot. <i>A <b>pivotal</b> event.</i>
<b>precaution</b>	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took <b>precautions</b>.</i>
<b>prudence</b>	Knowing how to avoid embarrassment or distress. <i>We need to exercise <b>prudence</b> in such important matters.</i>
<b>warn</b>	Notify, usually in advance. <i>The old man <b>warned</b> the children off his property.</i>
<b>warning</b>	Cautionary advice about something imminent (especially imminent danger or other unpleasantness). <i>They gave little <b>warning</b> of their arrival.</i>
<b>watershed</b>	A ridge of land that separates two adjacent river systems. <i>The agreement was a <b>watershed</b> in the history of both nations.</i>
