### **Definitions of "Celebrities" as a noun**

- *A widely known person.*
- *The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed.*



## Synonyms of "Celebrities" as a noun (2 Words)

**fame** The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements.

*Winning the Olympic title has brought her **fame** and fortune.*

**renown** The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame.  
*Authors of great **renown**.*



## Usage Examples of "Celebrities" as a noun

- *He was a baseball celebrity.*



## Associations of "Celebrities" (30 Words)

- actress** A woman whose profession is acting on stage, in films, or on television.  
*She is one of the great **actresses** of her generation.*
- autograph** A person's handwriting.  
*Fans surged around the car asking for **autographs**.*
- bravo** Applaud with shouts of bravo or brava.  
***Bravos** rang out.*
- debut** The presentation of a debutante in society.  
*They looked forward to the **debut** of their new product line.*
- dignitary** A person considered to be important because of high rank or office.  
*The guests included former shareholders, local dignitaries, and many of the people directly involved with the project.*
- distinguished** Dignified and noble in appearance or manner.  
*His **distinguished** bearing.*

<b>eminence</b>	A protuberance on a bone especially for attachment of a muscle or ligament. <i>Her <b>eminence</b> in cinematography.</i>
<b>eminent</b>	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i>An <b>eminent</b> peak.</i>
<b>fame</b>	Favorable public reputation. <i>The song's success rocketed him to stardom and <b>fame</b>.</i>
<b>famous</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A <b>famous</b> star.</i>
<b>hero</b>	The chief male character in a book, play, or film, who is typically identified with good qualities, and with whom the reader is expected to sympathize. <i>The <b>hero</b> of the range is the daily face peel.</i>
<b>illustrious</b>	Well known, respected, and admired for past achievements. <i>His <b>illustrious</b> predecessor.</i>
<b>lionize</b>	Give a lot of public attention and approval to (someone); treat as a celebrity. <i>The tenor was <b>lionized</b> in Vienna.</i>
<b>moderator</b>	Someone who mediates disputes and attempts to avoid violence. <i>In a fast reactor there is no <b>moderator</b> to slow the reaction down.</i>
<b>notable</b>	A famous or important person. <i>Businessmen and local <b>notables</b>.</i>
<b>noted</b>	Worthy of notice or attention. <i>A <b>noted</b> patron of the arts.</i>
<b>outstanding</b>	Of major significance or importance. <i>Einstein was one of the <b>outstanding</b> figures of the 20th century.</i>
<b>panelist</b>	A member of a panel.
<b>popular</b>	(of cultural activities or products) intended for or suited to the taste, understanding, or means of the general public rather than specialists or intellectuals. <i>Cabbage patch dolls are no longer <b>popular</b>.</i>
<b>popularity</b>	The state or condition of being liked, admired, or supported by many people. <i>The universal <b>popularity</b> of American movies.</i>
<b>prominence</b>	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>He stood on the rocky <b>prominence</b>.</i>
<b>prominent</b>	A stout drab-coloured moth with tufts on the forewings which stick up while at rest, the caterpillars of which typically have fleshy growths on the back. <i>She was a <b>prominent</b> member of the city council.</i>

<b>renown</b>	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>renowned</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>Britain is <b>renowned</b> for its love of animals.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	Notoriety for some particular characteristic. <i>His knowledge of his subject earned him a <b>reputation</b> as an expert.</i>
<b>saga</b>	A long, involved story, account, or series of incidents. <i>A figure straight out of a Viking <b>saga</b>.</i>
<b>spotlight</b>	Illuminate with a spotlight as in the theater. <i>She was constantly in the media <b>spotlight</b>.</i>
<b>star</b>	A star shaped character used in printing. <i>Thick grass <b>starred</b> with flowers.</i>
<b>supermodel</b>	A fashion model who has attained the status of a celebrity.
<b>tragedian</b>	A writer (especially a playwright) who writes tragedies.
