Synonyms of "Celebrities" as a noun (2 Words)

fame

The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements.

*Winning the Olympic title has brought her **fame** and fortune.*

renown

The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame.

*Authors of great **renown**.*



Usage Examples of "Celebrities" as a noun

- *He was a baseball celebrity.*



Associations of "Celebrities" (30 Words)

actress	A woman whose profession is acting on stage, in films, or on television. <i>She is one of the great actresses of her generation.</i>
autograph	A person's handwriting. <i>Fans surged around the car asking for autographs.</i>
bravo	Applaud with shouts of bravo or brava. <i>Bravos rang out.</i>
debut	The presentation of a debutante in society. <i>They looked forward to the debut of their new product line.</i>
dignitary	A person considered to be important because of high rank or office. <i>The guests included former shareholders, local dignitaries, and many of the people directly involved with the project.</i>
distinguished	Dignified and noble in appearance or manner. <i>His distinguished bearing.</i>

eminence	A protuberance on a bone especially for attachment of a muscle or ligament. <i>Her eminence in cinematography.</i>
eminent	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i>An eminent peak.</i>
fame	Favorable public reputation. <i>The song's success rocketed him to stardom and fame.</i>
famous	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A famous star.</i>
hero	The chief male character in a book, play, or film, who is typically identified with good qualities, and with whom the reader is expected to sympathize. <i>The hero of the range is the daily face peel.</i>
illustrious	Well known, respected, and admired for past achievements. <i>His illustrious predecessor.</i>
lionize	Give a lot of public attention and approval to (someone); treat as a celebrity. <i>The tenor was lionized in Vienna.</i>
moderator	Someone who mediates disputes and attempts to avoid violence. <i>In a fast reactor there is no moderator to slow the reaction down.</i>
notable	A famous or important person. <i>Businessmen and local notables.</i>
noted	Worthy of notice or attention. <i>A noted patron of the arts.</i>
outstanding	Of major significance or importance. <i>Einstein was one of the outstanding figures of the 20th century.</i>
panelist	A member of a panel.
popular	(of cultural activities or products) intended for or suited to the taste, understanding, or means of the general public rather than specialists or intellectuals. <i>Cabbage patch dolls are no longer popular.</i>
popularity	The state or condition of being liked, admired, or supported by many people. <i>The universal popularity of American movies.</i>
prominence	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>He stood on the rocky prominence.</i>
prominent	A stout drab-coloured moth with tufts on the forewings which stick up while at rest, the caterpillars of which typically have fleshy growths on the back. <i>She was a prominent member of the city council.</i>

renown	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great renown.</i>
renowned	Widely known and esteemed. <i>Britain is renowned for its love of animals.</i>
reputation	Notoriety for some particular characteristic. <i>His knowledge of his subject earned him a reputation as an expert.</i>
saga	A long, involved story, account, or series of incidents. <i>A figure straight out of a Viking saga.</i>
spotlight	Illuminate with a spotlight as in the theater. <i>She was constantly in the media spotlight.</i>
star	A star shaped character used in printing. <i>Thick grass starred with flowers.</i>
supermodel	A fashion model who has attained the status of a celebrity.
tragedian	A writer (especially a playwright) who writes tragedies.
