<b>account</b>	A client having an account with a supplier. <i>A detailed <b>account</b> of what has been achieved.</i>
<b>celebutante</b>	A celebrity who is well known in fashionable society.
<b>consequence</b>	Importance or relevance. <i>The past is of no <b>consequence</b>.</i>
<b><u>distinction</u></b>	An honor awarded to someone in recognition of achievement or superiority. <i>He gained the highest <b>distinction</b> awarded for excellence in photography.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A slight projection from the surface of the body. <i>The Lord Chancellor canvassed the views of various legal <b>eminences</b>.</i>

<b>fame</b>	Favorable public reputation. <i>The song s success rocketed him to stardom and <b>fame</b>.</i>
<b>giant</b>	An imaginary figure of superhuman size and strength; appears in folklore and fairy tales. <i>Walton built a retail <b>giant</b>.</i>
<b>glory</b>	Brilliant radiant beauty. <i>The train has been restored to all its former <b>glory</b>.</i>
<b>great</b>	An important or distinguished person. <i>He is one of the <b>greats</b> of American music.</i>
<b>greatness</b>	Unusual largeness in size or extent or number. <i>Elgar s <b>greatness</b> as a composer.</i>
<b>guru</b>	An influential teacher or popular expert. <i>A management <b>guru</b>.</i>
<b>household name</b>	A social unit living together.
<b>illustriousness</b>	The property possessed by something or someone of outstanding importance or eminence.
<b>importance</b>	The quality of being important and worthy of note. <i>An issue of great <b>importance</b>.</i>
<b>influence</b>	A person or thing with the capacity to have an influence on someone or something. <i>Fiona was a good <b>influence</b> on her.</i>
<b>leading light</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>master</b>	Someone who holds a master s degree from academic institution. <i>A <b>master</b> cylinder.</i>
<b>name</b>	A word or set of words by which a person or thing is known, addressed, or referred to. <i>They studied all the great <b>names</b> in the history of France.</i>
<b>notability</b>	A celebrity who is an inspiration to others. <i>The village enjoys a <b>notability</b> out of all relation to its size.</i>
<b>note</b>	A banknote. <i>There was a <b>note</b> of uncertainty in his voice.</i>
<b>personality</b>	Lively, engaging qualities. <i>She had a sunny <b>personality</b> that was very engaging.</i>
<b>popularity</b>	The state or condition of being liked, admired, or supported by many people. <i>He was at the height of his <b>popularity</b>.</i>

<b>position</b>	An opinion that is held in opposition to another in an argument or dispute. <i>What <b>position</b> does he play.</i>
<b>prestige</b>	Widespread respect and admiration felt for someone or something on the basis of a perception of their achievements or quality. <i>A <b>prestige</b> car.</i>
<b>prominence</b>	The fact or state of projecting from something. <i>Radiographs showed enlargement of the right heart with <b>prominence</b> of the pulmonary outflow tract.</i>
<b>rank</b>	Relative status. <i>Only two cabinet members had held ministerial <b>rank</b> before.</i>
<b>renown</b>	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>He acquired a <b>reputation</b> as an actor before he started writing.</i>
<b>repute</b>	The state of being highly regarded; fame. <i>Pollution could bring the authority's name into bad <b>repute</b>.</i>
<b>standing</b>	The act of assuming or maintaining an erect upright position. <i>An inter departmental squabble of long <b>standing</b>.</i>
<b>star</b>	Used in names of starfishes and similar echinoderms with five or more radiating arms e.g. cushion star brittlestar. <i>The captain has a <b>star</b> against his name.</i>
<b>stardom</b>	The status of being acknowledged as a star. <i>Her rise to <b>stardom</b> has been meteoric.</i>
<b>stature</b>	(of a standing person) the distance from head to foot. <i>A man of short <b>stature</b>.</i>
<b>superstar</b>	An extremely famous and successful performer or sports player. <i>Despite their <b>superstar</b> status the band refuse to change their lifestyle.</i>
<b>vip</b>	An important or influential (and often overbearing) person.
<b>visibility</b>	The degree to which something has attracted general attention; prominence. <i><b>Visibility</b> was down to 15 yards.</i>

<b>distinguished</b>	(used of persons) standing above others in character or attainment or reputation. A <b>distinguished</b> American educationist.
<b>eminence</b>	A piece of rising ground. A scholar of great <b>eminence</b> .
<b>eminent</b>	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <b>Eminent</b> members of the community.
<b>fame</b>	Favorable public reputation. Winning the Olympic title has brought her <b>fame</b> and fortune.
<b>famous</b>	Widely known and esteemed. Galway stormed to a <b>famous</b> victory.
<b>hero</b>	Someone who fights for a cause. A war <b>hero</b> .
<b>illustrious</b>	Having or conferring glory. An <b>illustrious</b> career.
<b>lionize</b>	Give a lot of public attention and approval to (someone); treat as a celebrity. Modern sportsmen are <b>lionized</b> and feted.
<b>moderator</b>	A person who moderates an internet forum or online discussion. Egypt managed to assert its role as a regional <b>moderator</b> .
<b>notable</b>	Worthy of notice. A <b>notable</b> increase in the crime rate.
<b>noted</b>	Widely known and esteemed. The restaurant is <b>noted</b> for its high standards of cuisine.
<b>outstanding</b>	Owed as a debt. Much of the work is still <b>outstanding</b> .
<b>panelist</b>	A member of a panel.
<b>popular</b>	(of political activity) carried on by the people as a whole rather than restricted to politicians or political parties. A <b>popular</b> girl.
<b>popularity</b>	The state or condition of being liked, admired, or supported by many people. The universal <b>popularity</b> of American movies.
<b>prominence</b>	A stream of incandescent gas projecting above the sun's chromosphere. The steep rocky <b>prominence</b> resembled a snow capped mountain.
<b>prominent</b>	Situated so as to catch the attention; noticeable. She was a <b>prominent</b> member of the city council.

<b>renown</b>	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>renowned</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>Britain is <b>renowned</b> for its love of animals.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. <i>He acquired a <b>reputation</b> as an actor before he started writing.</i>
<b>saga</b>	A long, involved story, account, or series of incidents. <i>A figure straight out of a Viking <b>saga</b>.</i>
<b>spotlight</b>	A beam of light projected from a spotlight. <i>The knife flashed in the <b>spotlight</b>.</i>
<b>star</b>	A conventional or stylized representation of a star typically having five or more points. <i>The captain has a <b>star</b> against his name.</i>
<b>supermodel</b>	A successful fashion model who has reached the status of a celebrity.
<b>tragedian</b>	A writer of tragedies.
