<b>burial ground</b>	Concealing something under the ground.
<b>burial place</b>	Concealing something under the ground.
<b>burial site</b>	The ritual placing of a corpse in a grave.
<b>churchyard</b>	The yard associated with a church.
<b>garden of remembrance</b>	A yard or lawn adjoining a house.
<b>graveyard</b>	A burial ground, especially one beside a church. <i>He was buried in the <b>graveyard</b> of St Mary's parish church.</i>
<b>memorial park</b>	A recognition of meritorious service.
<b>necropolis</b>	A cemetery, especially a large one belonging to an ancient city.

## Associations of "Cemetery" (30 Words)

<b>autopsy</b>	Perform an autopsy on a body or organ. <i>On <b>autopsy</b> it was established that he had suffered from a rare brain condition.</i>
<b>bier</b>	A coffin along with its stand. <i>We followed the <b>bier</b> to the graveyard.</i>
<b>burial</b>	Concealing something under the ground. <i>They will give him a proper <b>burial</b>.</i>
<b>bury</b>	(of a football player) shoot (the ball) into the goal. <i>He ran through to <b>bury</b> a right foot shot inside the near post.</i>
<b>casket</b>	Enclose in a casket. <i>A small brass <b>casket</b> containing four black opals.</i>
<b>coffin</b>	Put a dead body in a coffin. <i>Her body was <b>coffined</b>.</i>

<b>crypt</b>	An underground room or vault beneath a church, used as a chapel or burial place.
<b>enclosure</b>	The state of being enclosed, especially in a religious community. <i>One of the chief effects of <b>enclosure</b> was to increase the number of landless workers.</i>
<b>entomb</b>	Place (a dead body) in a tomb. <i>Many people died most <b>entombed</b> in collapsed buildings.</i>
<b>epigraph</b>	An inscription on a building, statue, or coin.
<b>epitaph</b>	An inscription on a tombstone or monument in memory of the person buried there. <i>The story makes a sorry <b>epitaph</b> to a great career.</i>
<b>funeral</b>	A sermon delivered at a funeral. <i>Her <b>funeral</b> had to pass.</i>
<b>grave</b>	Causing fear or anxiety by threatening great harm. <i>The coffin was lowered into the <b>grave</b>.</i>
<b>gravestone</b>	A stone that is used to mark a grave.
<b>inhume</b>	Bury. <i>No hand his bones shall gather or <b>inhume</b>.</i>
<b>inscription</b>	Letters inscribed (especially words engraved or carved) on something. <i>The <b>inscription</b> of memorable utterances on durable materials.</i>
<b>inter</b>	Place (a corpse) in a grave or tomb, typically with funeral rites. <i>He was <b>interred</b> with the military honours due to him.</i>
<b>interment</b>	The burial of a corpse in a grave or tomb, typically with funeral rites. <i><b>Interments</b> took place in the churchyard.</i>
<b>mausoleum</b>	A large burial chamber, usually above ground. <i>The cathedral was built in 1517 as a royal <b>mausoleum</b>.</i>
<b>morgue</b>	A newspaper's collection of miscellaneous information for use in future obituaries. <i>The cadavers were bagged and removed to the city <b>morgue</b>.</i>
<b>mortician</b>	An undertaker.
<b>mortuary</b>	Relating to burial or tombs. <i>A <b>mortuary</b> temple.</i>
<b>mummification</b>	A condition resembling that of a mummy. <i>Bureaucratic <b>mummification</b> in red tape.</i>
<b>necropolis</b>	A cemetery, especially a large one belonging to an ancient city.
<b>quietus</b>	Something that has a calming or soothing effect.
<b>sarcophagus</b>	A stone coffin (usually bearing sculpture or inscriptions).

**sepulcher** A chamber that is used as a grave.

**sepulchral** Relating to a tomb or interment.  
*The **sepulchral** darkness of the catacombs.*

**tomb** A place for the burial of a corpse especially beneath the ground and marked by a tombstone.  
*None escape the **tomb**.*

**tombstone** An advertisement listing the underwriters or firms associated with a new issue of shares, bonds, warrants, etc.  
*His grin exposed his yellowed teeth like a row of **tombstones**.*
