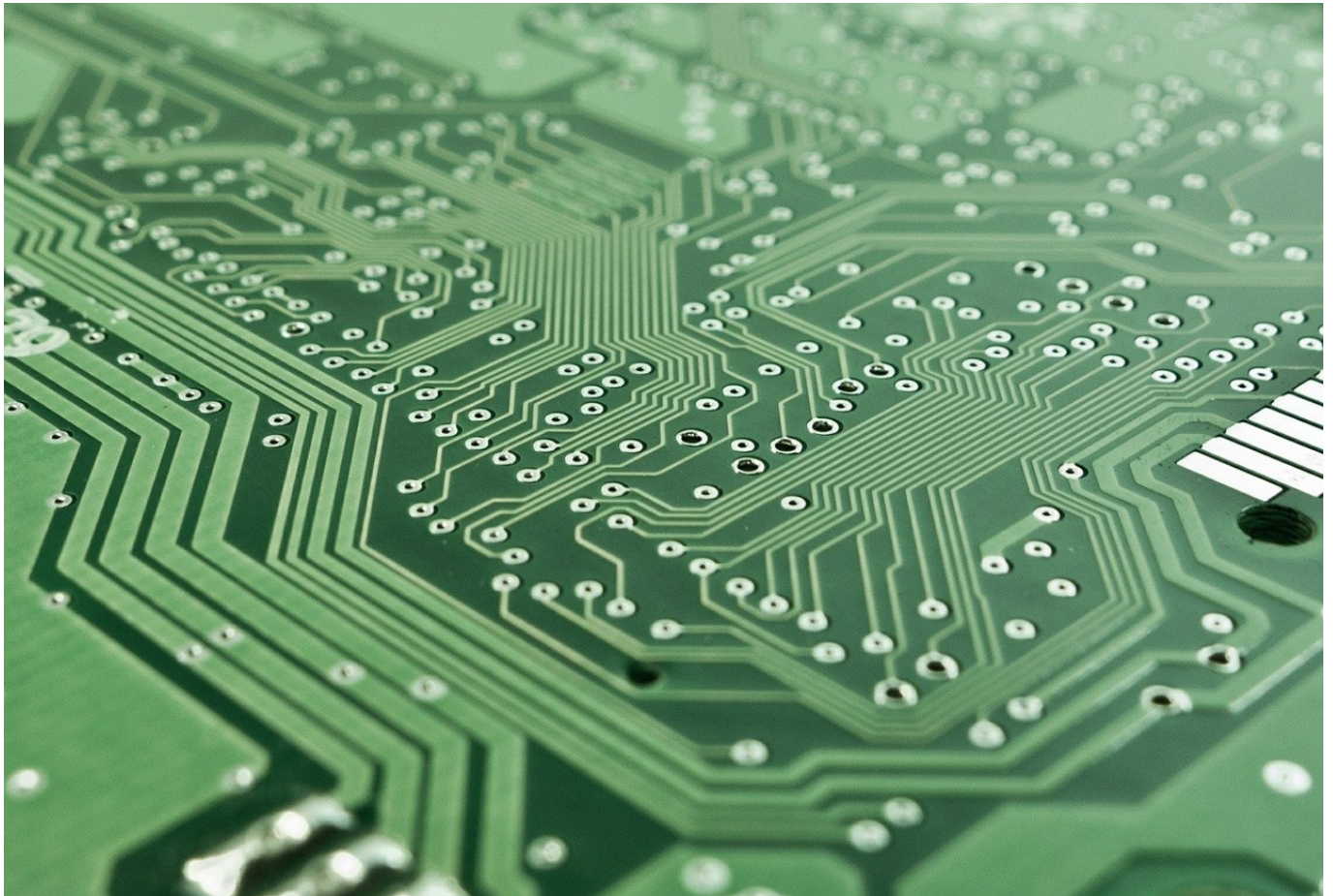
Center as a Noun

heart	<p>The heart regarded as the centre of a person s thoughts and emotions especially love compassion or loyalty. <i>He stood still his heart thumping wildly.</i></p>
heart and soul	<p>The locus of feelings and intuitions.</p>
inwardness	<p>Preoccupation with what concerns human inner nature (especially ethical or ideological values). <i>I sensed his inwardness and his desire not to talk.</i></p>
kernel	<p>The most basic level or core of an operating system, responsible for resource allocation, file management, and security. <i>The milky kernel of the wheat grain.</i></p>
mall	<p>An alley used for pall mall. <i>They spent their weekends at the local malls.</i></p>
marrow	<p>Very tender and very nutritious tissue from marrowbones. <i>A bone marrow transplant.</i></p>
<u>meat</u>	<p>The flesh of an animal, typically a mammal or bird, as food (the flesh of domestic fowls is sometimes distinguished as poultry). <i>This ll put meat on your bones.</i></p>
<u>middle</u>	<p>The middle area of the human torso usually in front. <i>He had a towel round his middle.</i></p>
midpoint	<p>A point equidistant from the ends of a line or the extremities of a figure. <i>He would have been at the midpoint in his career.</i></p>
nerve center	<p>Impudent aggressiveness.</p>
nerve centre	<p>Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body.</p>

nitty-gritty	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience.
nub	A small chunk or nugget of metal or rock. <i>A nub of gold.</i>
pith	The spongy cellular tissue in the stems and branches of many higher plants. <i>He writes with a combination of pith and exactitude.</i>
plaza	A public square with room for pedestrians. <i>They bought fancy bridal wear at the plaza.</i>
shopping center	Searching for or buying goods or services.
shopping centre	The commodities purchased from storeswomen carrying home shopping didn't give me a second glance.
shopping mall	Searching for or buying goods or services.
snapper	Large-headed turtle with powerful hooked jaws found in or near water; prone to bite. <i>Tabloid snappers were crowding the stage door.</i>
substance	The quality of having a solid basis in reality or fact. <i>He had yet to accomplish anything of substance.</i>
sum	The total amount of something that exists. <i>Do your sums then the shock will not be too great.</i>
