Associations of "Centralized" (30 Words)

administrate	Work in an administrative capacity; supervise or be in charge of. <i>The cost of administrating VAT.</i>
aileron	A hinged surface in the trailing edge of an aircraft wing, used to control roll around the longitudinal axis.
ascendancy	The state that exists when one person or group has power over another. <i>The poor have a moral ascendancy over the rich.</i>
authority	The right to act in a specified way, delegated from one person or organization to another. <i>He had absolute authority over his subordinates.</i>
<u>blimp</u>	A pompous, reactionary type of person. <i>I could work out four hours a day and still end up a blimp.</i>
<u>charismatic</u>	Relating to the charismatic movement in the Christian Church. <i>Charismatic prophecy.</i>

constancy	The quality of being faithful and dependable. <i>She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of constancy.</i>
coordinator	A word used to connect clauses, sentences, or words of equal syntactic importance (e.g. and, or, for). <i>A full time coordinator was appointed to oversee the referral process.</i>
<u>dominance</u>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>All had in conformity with the principle of dominance round seeds with yellow cotyledons.</i>
dominate	Be the most important or conspicuous person or thing in. <i>A picturesque city dominated by the cathedral tower.</i>
dominated	Harassed by persistent nagging.
grasshopper	A cocktail made of creme de menthe and cream (sometimes with creme de cacao).
<u>manageable</u>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i>
<u>mastery</u>	The action of mastering a subject or skill. <i>Mastery of the seas.</i>
microprocessor	An integrated circuit that contains all the functions of a central processing unit of a computer. <i>A disk drive contains a microprocessor to handle the internal functions of the drive.</i>
<u>modulate</u>	Change from one form or condition into (another). <i>We all modulate our voice by hearing it.</i>
<u>obsession</u>	An unhealthy and compulsive preoccupation with something or someone. <i>She cared for him with a devotion bordering on obsession.</i>
potentate	A ruler who is unconstrained by law.
recalcitrance	The trait of being unmanageable.
regulate	Fix or adjust the time, amount, degree, or rate of. <i>The standard time by which other clocks were regulated.</i>
reign	The period during which a monarch is sovereign. <i>Money reigns supreme here.</i>
rudder	Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft. <i>A small amount of extra rudder.</i>
sensorimotor	Of or relating to the sensory and motor coordination of an organism or to the controlling nerves.

- subjugate** Put down by force or intimidation.
*The invaders had soon **subjugated** most of the population.*
- subjugation** The act of subjugating by cruelty.
*The colonial **subjugation** of a country by means of brute military force.*
- superintendence** Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group.
*Under his vigilant **superintendence** a building was erected.*
- supervision** The action of supervising someone or something.
*He was placed under the **supervision** of a probation officer.*
- thermostat** Control the temperature with a thermostat.
