### **Definitions of "Centralized" as an adjective**

- *(of an activity or organization) controlled by a single authority or managed in one place.*
- *Drawn toward a center or brought under the control of a central authority.*

<b>administrate</b>	Work in an administrative capacity; supervise or be in charge of. <i>The cost of administrating VAT.</i>
<b>aileron</b>	A hinged surface in the trailing edge of an aircraft wing, used to control roll around the longitudinal axis.
<b>ascendancy</b>	The state that exists when one person or group has power over another. <i>The poor have a moral <b>ascendancy</b> over the rich.</i>
<b>authority</b>	The right to act in a specified way, delegated from one person or organization to another. <i>He had absolute <b>authority</b> over his subordinates.</i>
<b><u>blimp</u></b>	A pompous, reactionary type of person. <i>I could work out four hours a day and still end up a <b>blimp</b>.</i>
<b><u>charismatic</u></b>	Relating to the charismatic movement in the Christian Church. <i><b>Charismatic</b> prophecy.</i>

<b>constancy</b>	The quality of being faithful and dependable. <i>She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of <b>constancy</b>.</i>
<b>coordinator</b>	A word used to connect clauses, sentences, or words of equal syntactic importance (e.g. and, or, for). <i>A full time <b>coordinator</b> was appointed to oversee the referral process.</i>
<b><u>dominance</u></b>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>All had in conformity with the principle of <b>dominance</b> round seeds with yellow cotyledons.</i>
<b>dominate</b>	Be the most important or conspicuous person or thing in. <i>A picturesque city <b>dominated</b> by the cathedral tower.</i>
<b>dominated</b>	Harassed by persistent nagging.
<b>grasshopper</b>	A cocktail made of creme de menthe and cream (sometimes with creme de cacao).
<b><u>manageable</u></b>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<b><u>mastery</u></b>	The action of mastering a subject or skill. <i><b>Mastery</b> of the seas.</i>
<b>microprocessor</b>	An integrated circuit that contains all the functions of a central processing unit of a computer. <i>A disk drive contains a <b>microprocessor</b> to handle the internal functions of the drive.</i>
<b><u>modulate</u></b>	Change from one form or condition into (another). <i>We all <b>modulate</b> our voice by hearing it.</i>
<b><u>obsession</u></b>	An unhealthy and compulsive preoccupation with something or someone. <i>She cared for him with a devotion bordering on <b>obsession</b>.</i>
<b>potentate</b>	A ruler who is unconstrained by law.
<b>recalcitrance</b>	The trait of being unmanageable.
<b>regulate</b>	Fix or adjust the time, amount, degree, or rate of. <i>The standard time by which other clocks were <b>regulated</b>.</i>
<b>reign</b>	The period during which a monarch is sovereign. <i>Money <b>reigns</b> supreme here.</i>
<b>rudder</b>	Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft. <i>A small amount of extra <b>rudder</b>.</i>
<b>sensorimotor</b>	Of or relating to the sensory and motor coordination of an organism or to the controlling nerves.

- subjugate** Put down by force or intimidation.  
*The invaders had soon **subjugated** most of the population.*
- subjugation** The act of subjugating by cruelty.  
*The colonial **subjugation** of a country by means of brute military force.*
- superintendence** Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group.  
*Under his vigilant **superintendence** a building was erected.*
- supervision** The action of supervising someone or something.  
*He was placed under the **supervision** of a probation officer.*
- thermostat** Control the temperature with a thermostat.
