
### **Certainty as a Noun**

#### Definitions of "Certainty" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "certainty" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- Something that is certain.
- A person that is certain to do or win the specified thing.
- A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place.
- A general air of confidence.
- Firm conviction that something is the case.
- The state of being certain.
- The quality of being reliably true.





## Synonyms of "Certainty" as a noun (18 Words)

assurance	Certainty about something. His <b>assurance</b> in his superiority did not make him popular.
assuredness	Great coolness and composure under strain.
authoritativeness	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities.
certitude	Something that someone firmly believes is true. The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b> .
conclusiveness	The quality of being final or definitely settled.
confidence	A secret that is confided or entrusted to another. Someone with whom you may raise your suspicions in <b>confidence</b> .
<u>conviction</u>	The quality of showing that one is firmly convinced of what one believes or says. She had been speaking for some five minutes with force and <b>conviction</b> .



fact	The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. First you must collect all the <b>fact</b> s of the case.
factualness	The quality of being actual or based on fact.
inevitability	An unavoidable event. The <b>inevitability</b> of death.
matter of course	Having consequence.
necessity	The principle according to which something must be so, by virtue either of logic or of natural law. The <b>necessity</b> of providing parental guidance.
positiveness	The quality of being encouraging or promising of a successful outcome.
racing certainty	The sport of engaging in contests of speed.
reliability	The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The car s background gives me every confidence in its <b>reliability</b>.</i>
<u>sureness</u>	The quality of being steady and unfailing. <i>Sureness</i> of hand.
truth	Conformity to reality or actuality. The fundamental <b>truth</b> s about mankind.
<u>validity</u>	The quality of having legal force or effectiveness. One might question the <b>validity</b> of our data.

- A man exuding certainty.
- His certainty reassured the others.
- *His victory is a certainty.*

absolutely	Totally and definitely; without question. An <b>absolutely</b> magnificent painting.
accuracy	(mathematics) the number of significant figures given in a number. <i>He was beginning to doubt the <b>accuracy</b> of his compass.</i>
actually	Used to emphasize that something someone has said or done is surprising. You may <b>actually</b> be doing the right thing by walking out.
<u>assuredly</u>	Without a doubt. The lad kept his cool and <b>assuredly</b> slipped the ball between the posts.
<u>certainly</u>	Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true. She <b>certainly</b> is a hard worker.
certitude	Something that someone firmly believes is true. The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b> .
confirm	Administer the religious rite of confirmation to. <i>His story <b>confirm</b>ed my doubts.</i>



<u>correctly</u>	In a way that is socially acceptable; properly. She <b>correctly</b> answered eight questions.
<u>definite</u>	Precise; explicit and clearly defined. I want a <b>definite</b> answer.
definitely	In a definite manner; clearly. I shall <b>definitely</b> be at the airport to meet you.
<u>doubtless</u>	Presumably or very probably. The company would <b>doubtless</b> find the reduced competition to their liking.
<u>exactly</u>	Just as it should be. What <b>exactly</b> are you looking for.
<u>indeed</u>	In truth (often tends to intensify. <i>The idea is attractive to many men and <b>indeed</b> to many women.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <b>Indubitably</b> liberalism parades under many guises.
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. A disorder that usually <b>manifest</b> s in middle age.
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. A <b>marked</b> increase in UK sales.
obvious	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. Unemployment has been the most <b>obvious</b> cost of the recession.
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
positivistic	Of or relating to positivism.
precisely	Exactly (used to emphasize the complete accuracy or truth of a statement. At 2 00 <b>precisely</b> the phone rang.
real	Really very. <b>Real</b> wages.
reliable	A reliable person or thing. A <b>reliable</b> source of information.
reliably	In a consistently good or accurate way. Few of these paintings can be <b>reliably</b> dated.
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>United are sure of a UEFA Cup place.</i>
<u>surely</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and <b>surely</b> <i>in that direction.</i></i>



<u>truly</u>	In actual fact or without doubt; really. We are <b>truly</b> sorry for the inconvenience.
<u>unambiguous</u>	Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning. Instructions should be <b>unambiguous</b> .
<u>undoubtedly</u>	Without doubt; certainly. They are <b>undoubtedly</b> guilty.
<u>unequivocal</u>	Clearly defined or formulated- R.B.Taney. The plain and <b>unequivocal</b> language of the laws.
unquestionably	Without question and beyond doubt. The awards were <b>unquestionably</b> deserved.
