### Definitions of "Certainty" as a noun

- *A person that is certain to do or win the specified thing.*
- *A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place.*
- *A general air of confidence.*
- *Firm conviction that something is the case.*
- *The state of being certain.*
- *The quality of being reliably true.*



## Synonyms of "Certainty" as a noun (18 Words)

<b>assurance</b>	Certainty about something. <i>His <b>assurance</b> in his superiority did not make him popular.</i>
<b>assuredness</b>	Great coolness and composure under strain.
<b>authoritativeness</b>	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities.
<b>certitude</b>	Something that someone firmly believes is true. <i>The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b>.</i>
<b>conclusiveness</b>	The quality of being final or definitely settled.
<b>confidence</b>	A secret that is confided or entrusted to another. <i>Someone with whom you may raise your suspicions in <b>confidence</b>.</i>
<b><u>conviction</u></b>	The quality of showing that one is firmly convinced of what one believes or says. <i>She had been speaking for some five minutes with force and <b>conviction</b>.</i>

<b>fact</b>	The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. <i>First you must collect all the <b>facts</b> of the case.</i>
<b>factualness</b>	The quality of being actual or based on fact.
<b>inevitability</b>	An unavoidable event. <i>The <b>inevitability</b> of death.</i>
<b>matter of course</b>	Having consequence.
<b>necessity</b>	The principle according to which something must be so, by virtue either of logic or of natural law. <i>The <b>necessity</b> of providing parental guidance.</i>
<b>positiveness</b>	The quality of being encouraging or promising of a successful outcome.
<b>racing certainty</b>	The sport of engaging in contests of speed.
<b>reliability</b>	The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The car s background gives me every confidence in its <b>reliability</b>.</i>
<b><u>sureness</u></b>	The quality of being steady and unfailing. <i><b>Sureness</b> of hand.</i>
<b>truth</b>	Conformity to reality or actuality. <i>The fundamental <b>truths</b> about mankind.</i>
<b><u>validity</u></b>	The quality of having legal force or effectiveness. <i>One might question the <b>validity</b> of our data.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Certainty" as a noun

- *There is a bewildering lack of certainty and clarity in the law.*
- *A man exuding certainty.*
- *His certainty reassured the others.*
- *His victory is a certainty.*
- *She knew with absolute certainty that they were dead.*
- *He was expected to be a certainty for a gold medal.*



## Associations of "Certainty" (30 Words)

<b>absolutely</b>	Totally and definitely; without question. <i>An <b>absolutely</b> magnificent painting.</i>
<b>accuracy</b>	(mathematics) the number of significant figures given in a number. <i>He was beginning to doubt the <b>accuracy</b> of his compass.</i>
<b>actually</b>	Used to emphasize that something someone has said or done is surprising. <i>You may <b>actually</b> be doing the right thing by walking out.</i>
<b>assuredly</b>	Without a doubt. <i>The lad kept his cool and <b>assuredly</b> slipped the ball between the posts.</i>
<b>certainly</b>	Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true. <i>She <b>certainly</b> is a hard worker.</i>
<b>certitude</b>	Something that someone firmly believes is true. <i>The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b>.</i>
<b>confirm</b>	Administer the religious rite of confirmation to. <i>His story <b>confirmed</b> my doubts.</i>

<u>correctly</u>	In a way that is socially acceptable; properly. <i>She <b>correctly</b> answered eight questions.</i>
<u>definite</u>	Precise; explicit and clearly defined. <i>I want a <b>definite</b> answer.</i>
<b>definitely</b>	In a definite manner; clearly. <i>I shall <b>definitely</b> be at the airport to meet you.</i>
<u>doubtless</u>	Presumably or very probably. <i>The company would <b>doubtless</b> find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
<u>exactly</u>	Just as it should be. <i>What <b>exactly</b> are you looking for.</i>
<u>indeed</u>	In truth (often tends to intensify). <i>The idea is attractive to many men and <b>indeed</b> to many women.</i>
<b>indubitably</b>	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i><b>Indubitably</b> liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>A disorder that usually <b>manifests</b> in middle age.</i>
<b>marked</b>	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A <b>marked</b> increase in UK sales.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>Unemployment has been the most <b>obvious</b> cost of the recession.</i>
<b>palpability</b>	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<b>positivistic</b>	Of or relating to positivism.
<b>precisely</b>	Exactly (used to emphasize the complete accuracy or truth of a statement). <i>At 2 00 <b>precisely</b> the phone rang.</i>
<b>real</b>	Really very. <i><b>Real</b> wages.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i>A <b>reliable</b> source of information.</i>
<b>reliably</b>	In a consistently good or accurate way. <i>Few of these paintings can be <b>reliably</b> dated.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>United are <b>sure</b> of a UEFA Cup place.</i>
<u>surely</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and <b>surely</b> in that direction.</i>

<b><u>truly</u></b>	In actual fact or without doubt; really. <i>We are <b>truly</b> sorry for the inconvenience.</i>
<b><u>unambiguous</u></b>	Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning. <i>Instructions should be <b>unambiguous</b>.</i>
<b><u>undoubtedly</u></b>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>They are <b>undoubtedly</b> guilty.</i>
<b><u>unequivocal</u></b>	Clearly defined or formulated- R.B.Taney. <i>The plain and <b>unequivocal</b> language of the laws.</i>
<b><u>unquestionably</u></b>	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>The awards were <b>unquestionably</b> deserved.</i>
