- *A general air of confidence.*
- *Firm conviction that something is the case.*
- *The state of being certain.*
- *The quality of being reliably true.*



Synonyms of "Certainty" as a noun (18 Words)

assurance	Certainty about something. <i>His assurance in his superiority did not make him popular.</i>
assuredness	Great coolness and composure under strain.
authoritativeness	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities.
certitude	Something that someone firmly believes is true. <i>The question may never be answered with certitude.</i>
conclusiveness	The quality of being final or definitely settled.
confidence	A secret that is confided or entrusted to another. <i>Someone with whom you may raise your suspicions in confidence.</i>
<u>conviction</u>	The quality of showing that one is firmly convinced of what one believes or says. <i>She had been speaking for some five minutes with force and conviction.</i>

fact	The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. <i>First you must collect all the facts of the case.</i>
factualness	The quality of being actual or based on fact.
inevitability	An unavoidable event. <i>The inevitability of death.</i>
matter of course	Having consequence.
necessity	The principle according to which something must be so, by virtue either of logic or of natural law. <i>The necessity of providing parental guidance.</i>
positiveness	The quality of being encouraging or promising of a successful outcome.
racing certainty	The sport of engaging in contests of speed.
reliability	The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The car's background gives me every confidence in its reliability.</i>
<u>sureness</u>	The quality of being steady and unfailing. <i>Sureness of hand.</i>
truth	Conformity to reality or actuality. <i>The fundamental truths about mankind.</i>
<u>validity</u>	The quality of having legal force or effectiveness. <i>One might question the validity of our data.</i>



Usage Examples of "Certainty" as a noun

- *There is a bewildering lack of certainty and clarity in the law.*
- *A man exuding certainty.*
- *His certainty reassured the others.*
- *His victory is a certainty.*
- *She knew with absolute certainty that they were dead.*
- *He was expected to be a certainty for a gold medal.*



Associations of "Certainty" (30 Words)

absolutely	Totally and definitely; without question. <i>An absolutely magnificent painting.</i>
accuracy	(mathematics) the number of significant figures given in a number. <i>He was beginning to doubt the accuracy of his compass.</i>
actually	Used to emphasize that something someone has said or done is surprising. <i>You may actually be doing the right thing by walking out.</i>
<u>assuredly</u>	Without a doubt. <i>The lad kept his cool and assuredly slipped the ball between the posts.</i>
<u>certainly</u>	Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true. <i>She certainly is a hard worker.</i>
certitude	Something that someone firmly believes is true. <i>The question may never be answered with certitude.</i>
confirm	Administer the religious rite of confirmation to. <i>His story confirmed my doubts.</i>

<u>correctly</u>	In a way that is socially acceptable; properly. <i>She correctly answered eight questions.</i>
<u>definite</u>	Precise; explicit and clearly defined. <i>I want a definite answer.</i>
definitely	In a definite manner; clearly. <i>I shall definitely be at the airport to meet you.</i>
<u>doubtless</u>	Presumably or very probably. <i>The company would doubtless find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
<u>exactly</u>	Just as it should be. <i>What exactly are you looking for.</i>
<u>indeed</u>	In truth (often tends to intensify). <i>The idea is attractive to many men and indeed to many women.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>Indubitably liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>A disorder that usually manifests in middle age.</i>
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A marked increase in UK sales.</i>
obvious	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i>
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
positivistic	Of or relating to positivism.
precisely	Exactly (used to emphasize the complete accuracy or truth of a statement). <i>At 2 00 precisely the phone rang.</i>
real	Really very. <i>Real wages.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>A reliable source of information.</i>
reliably	In a consistently good or accurate way. <i>Few of these paintings can be reliably dated.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>United are sure of a UEFA Cup place.</i>
<u>surely</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and surely in that direction.</i>

truly

In actual fact or without doubt; really.

*We are **truly** sorry for the inconvenience.*

unambiguous

Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning.

*Instructions should be **unambiguous**.*

undoubtedly

Without doubt; certainly.

*They are **undoubtedly** guilty.*

unequivocal

Clearly defined or formulated- R.B.Taney.

*The plain and **unequivocal** language of the laws.*

unquestionably

Without question and beyond doubt.

*The awards were **unquestionably** deserved.*
