Synonyms of "Cessation" as a noun (21 Words)

abandonment	The action or fact of abandoning or being abandoned. <i>His abandonment of his wife and children left them penniless.</i>
breaking off	The act of breaking something.
ceasing	End.
close	A residential street without through access. <i>They were playing better at the close of the season.</i>
<u>closing</u>	The act of closing something. <i>The ship's rapid rate of closing gave them little time to avoid a collision.</i>
<u>closure</u>	A sense of resolution or conclusion at the end of an artistic work. <i>A closure motion.</i>
conclusion	The act of ending something. <i>His conclusion took the evidence into account.</i>
cutting short	A part (sometimes a root or leaf or bud) removed from a plant to propagate a new plant through rooting or grafting.
discontinuance	The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent).
discontinuation	The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent). <i>There were no serious adverse events and no drug discontinuations.</i>
end	Either of the halves of a sports field or court defended by one team or player. <i>The so called glorious experiment came to an inglorious end.</i>
ending	The act of ending something. <i>The ending of warranty period.</i>
finish	The act of finishing. <i>When these final episodes are broadcast it will be the finish of the show.</i>
finishing	The act of finishing. <i>The speaker's finishing was greeted with applause.</i>
interruption	An act of delaying or interrupting the continuity. <i>Students returning to education after an interruption in their career.</i>
stoppage	A cessation of work by employees in protest at the terms set by their employers. <i>One machine gun crew had a stoppage.</i>

stopping	The kind of playing that involves pressing the fingers on the strings of a stringed instrument to control the pitch. <i>The violinist s stopping was excellent.</i>
surcease	A stopping. <i>He teased us without surcease.</i>
suspension	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>The investigation led to the suspension of several officers.</i>
termination	A coming to an end of a contract period. <i>A good result and a happy termination.</i>
winding up	The act of winding or twisting.



Usage Examples of "Cessation" as a noun

- *A cessation of the thunder.*
- *A cessation of animal testing of cosmetics.*
- *The cessation of hostilities.*

Associations of "Cessation" (30 Words)

abeyance	A state of temporary disuse or suspension. <i>Matters were held in abeyance pending further enquiries.</i>
armistice	An agreement made by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting for a certain time; a truce. <i>The Italian government signed an armistice with the Allies.</i>
cease	Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end. <i>They were asked to cease all military activity.</i>
deadlock	Secure a door with a deadlock. <i>You can deadlock any exit door from the outside.</i>
desist	Choose not to consume. <i>Each pledged to desist from acts of sabotage.</i>
discontinuance	The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent).
end	Put an end to. <i>The phone rang at the other end.</i>
halt	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>A halt in the arms race.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>She speaks halting English with a heavy accent.</i>
hiatus	A missing piece (as a gap in a manuscript). <i>There was a brief hiatus in the war with France.</i>
intermission	A pause or break. <i>The daily work goes on without intermission.</i>
interruption	Some abrupt occurrence that interrupts an ongoing activity. <i>Students returning to education after an interruption in their career.</i>
layover	A brief stay in the course of a journey. <i>There was only a forty eight minute layover.</i>
momentarily	At any moment. <i>As he passed Jenny s door he paused momentarily.</i>
mortality	The number of deaths in a given area or period, or from a particular cause. <i>The causes of mortality among infants and young children.</i>
outage	A period when a power supply or other service is not available or when equipment is closed down. <i>There will be a network outage from 8 to 10 a m.</i>

pause	Interrupt temporarily an activity before continuing. <i>He chattered away without pause.</i>
permanently	In a way that lasts or continues without interruption; continually. <i>We need to be permanently vigilant.</i>
quit	Stop or discontinue (an action or activity). <i>He quit as manager of the struggling Third Division team.</i>
reprieve	A warrant granting postponement (usually to postpone the execution of the death sentence). <i>A mother who faced eviction has been given a reprieve.</i>
respite	Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. <i>The refugee encampments will provide some respite from the suffering.</i>
smoking	The act of smoking tobacco or other substances. <i>The effect of smoking on health.</i>
sojourn	Stay somewhere temporarily. <i>She had sojourned once in Egypt.</i>
stanch	Stop the flow of a liquid.
stop	A punctuation mark especially a full stop. <i>There were constant stops and changes of pace.</i>
suspension	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>Modifications have been made to the car's rear suspension.</i>
temporary	A person employed on a temporary basis typically an office worker who finds employment through an agency. <i>Employed on a temporary basis.</i>
tentative	Done without confidence; hesitant. <i>Just a tentative schedule.</i>
transience	An impermanence that suggests the inevitability of ending or dying. <i>The transience of life and happiness.</i>
truce	A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms. <i>The guerrillas called a three day truce.</i>
