- *Soreness and warmth caused by friction.*
- *A state of annoyance.*



## Synonyms of "Chafe" as a noun (5 Words)

- annoyance** A thing that annoys someone; a nuisance.  
*He turned his charm on Tara much to Hegarty's **annoyance**.*
- inflammation** Arousal to violent emotion.  
*He tried to calm those who were in a state of extreme **inflammation**.*
- lesion** Any localized abnormal structural change in a bodily part.
- swelling** Something that bulges out or is protuberant or projects from its surroundings.  
*The lobes are prominent **swellings** on the base of the brain.*
- vexation** A cause of annoyance, frustration, or worry.  
*The **vexations** of life under canvas.*

## Chafe as a Verb

### Definitions of "Chafe" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "chafe" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(with reference to a part of the body) make or become sore by rubbing against something.*
- *(of an object) rub abrasively against another.*
- *Feel extreme irritation or anger.*
- *Become or make annoyed or impatient because of a restriction or inconvenience.*
- *Tear or wear off the skin or make sore by abrading.*
- *Become or make sore by or as if by rubbing.*
- *Rub (a part of the body) to restore warmth or sensation.*
- *Warm by rubbing, as with the hands.*

- *Cause friction.*
- *Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations.*



## Synonyms of "Chafe" as a verb (35 Words)

<b>abrade</b>	Scrape or wear away by friction or erosion. <i>It was a landscape slowly <b>abraded</b> by a fine stinging dust.</i>
<b><u>annoy</u></b>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. <i>The decision really <b>annoyed</b> him.</i>
<b>be angry</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be annoyed</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>be exasperated</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be frustrated</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>be impatient</b>	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
<b>be incensed</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be irritated</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b>bother</b>	Take the trouble to do something; concern oneself. <i>Don t <b>bother</b> please.</i>
<b>devil</b>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i><b>Devilled</b> eggs.</i>
<b>excoriate</b>	Criticize (someone) severely. <i>The discharge is acrid and <b>excoriates</b> the skin of the nose.</i>
<b><u>fray</u></b>	(of a fabric, rope, or cord) unravel or become worn at the edge, typically through constant rubbing. <i>Bucks mark their territory by <b>fraying</b> small trees.</i>
<b><u>fret</u></b>	Provide a musical instrument with frets. <i>The bay s black waves <b>fret</b> the seafront.</i>
<b><u>gall</u></b>	Become or make sore by or as if by rubbing. <i>It <b>galls</b> me that we lost the suit.</i>
<b>get at</b>	Take the first step or steps in carrying out an action.
<b>get to</b>	Acquire as a result of some effort or action.
<b>grate</b>	Reduce food to small shreds by rubbing it on a grater. <i><b>Grate</b> carrots and onions.</i>
<b>gravel</b>	Cover with gravel. <i>Steps lead down from the terrace to a <b>gravelled</b> path.</i>
<b>graze</b>	Casually sample something. <i>Cattle <b>graze</b> on the open meadows.</i>

<b>irritate</b>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>Sprays and polishes can <b>irritate</b> dry sensitive skin.</i>
<b>nark</b>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>Women like her <b>nark</b> me.</i>
<b>nettle</b>	Sting with nettles. <i>I was only asking Jess said <b>nettled</b>.</i>
<b>rag</b>	Apply paint to a surface with a rag. <i>The deputy <b>ragged</b> the Prime Minister.</i>
<b>rasp</b>	Scrape or file something with a rasp. <i>My breath <b>rasped</b> in my throat.</i>
<b>rile</b>	Make (water) turbulent or muddy. <i>He has been <b>riled</b> by suggestions that his Arsenal future is in doubt.</i>
<b>rub</b>	Make dry clean or smooth by rubbing. <i>He <b>rubbed</b> a finger round the rim of his mug.</i>
<b>rub against</b>	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching.
<b>rub painfully</b>	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching.
<b>scrape</b>	Gather (money or other resources) together over time. <i>He found a ditch <b>scraped</b> a hole and put the bag in it.</i>
<b>scratch</b>	Play a record using the scratch technique. <i>I <b>scratched</b> myself on the tree.</i>
<b>skin</b>	Remove the skin from an animal or a fruit or vegetable. <i>He scrambled down from the tree with such haste that he <b>skinned</b> his knees.</i>
<b>vex</b>	Disturb the peace of mind of; afflict with mental agitation or distress. <i><b>Vex</b> the subject of the death penalty.</i>
<b>warm</b>	Get warm or warmer. <i>The blanket will <b>warm</b> you.</i>
<b>warm up</b>	Get warm or warmer.





## Usage Examples of "Chafe" as a verb

- *Her arms chafed where the rope bit into them.*
- *The grommet stops the cable chafing on the metal.*
- *The collar chafed his neck.*
- *This leash chafes the dog's neck.*
- *It chafed him to be confined like this.*
- *The bank chafed at the restrictions imposed upon it.*
- *I chafed her feet and wrapped the blanket round her.*



## Associations of "Chafe" (30 Words)

- abrade** Scrape or wear away by friction or erosion.  
*It was a landscape slowly **abraded** by a fine stinging dust.*
- abrasion** The process of scraping or wearing something away.  
*There were cuts and **abrasions** to the lips and jaw.*
- attrition** The process of reducing something's strength or effectiveness through sustained attack or pressure.  
*The skull shows **attrition** of the edges of the teeth.*
- awl** A pointed tool for marking surfaces or for punching small holes.
- bingo** A game in which players mark off numbers on cards as the numbers are drawn randomly by a caller, the winner being the first person to mark off all their numbers.  
*A **bingo** hall.*

<b>bruise</b>	Inflict a bruise or bruises on a part of the body. <i>This remark really <b>bruised</b> my ego.</i>
<b>contusion</b>	An injury that doesn't break the skin but results in some discoloration. <i>Vigorously shaking the head back and forth can produce <b>contusions</b> to the soft structure of the brain.</i>
<u>excise</u>	Charge excise on goods. <i>The rate of <b>excise</b> duty on spirits.</i>
<b>excoriate</b>	Damage or remove part of the surface of (the skin). <i>The discharge is acrid and <b>excoriates</b> the skin of the nose.</i>
<u>expunge</u>	Obliterate or remove completely (something unwanted or unpleasant). <i>The kind of man that could <b>expunge</b> an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.</i>
<u>fray</u>	Cause friction. <i>As the temperature rose tempers <b>frayed</b>.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>I felt so <b>hurt</b> and alone.</i>
<b>injury</b>	Wrongdoing that violates another's rights and is unjustly inflicted. <i>She suffered an <b>injury</b> to her back.</i>
<u>irritation</u>	(pathology) abnormal sensitivity to stimulation. <i>Some chemicals cause a direct <b>irritation</b> to the skin leading to dermatitis.</i>
<b>itch</b>	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching. <i>He has a bad case of the <b>itch</b>.</i>
<b>itching</b>	An irritating cutaneous sensation that produces a desire to scratch.
<b>lottery</b>	A means of raising money by selling numbered tickets and giving prizes to the holders of numbers drawn at random. <i>The election was just a <b>lottery</b> to them.</i>
<b>nail</b>	Attach something somewhere by means of nails. <i>A pair of <b>nail</b> clippers.</i>
<b>pain</b>	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>The <b>pain</b> of loneliness.</i>
<b>roughen</b>	Make or become rough. <i>His voice <b>roughened</b>.</i>
<u>rub</u>	Reproduce the design of a sepulchral brass or a stone by rubbing paper laid on it with coloured wax pencil or chalk etc. <i>A muscle <b>rub</b>.</i>
<u>scar</u>	Mark with a scar or scars. <i>This fossil bark is typified by its lozenge shaped leaf <b>scars</b>.</i>

- scrape** A place where soil has been scraped away especially a shallow hollow formed in the ground by a bird during a courtship display or for nesting.  
*The **scrape** of violin bows distracted her.*
- scratch** A technique used especially in rap music of stopping a record by hand and moving it back and forwards to give a rhythmic scratching effect.  
*Banks seem prepared to **scratch** stabilization charges.*
- scratching** The action of playing a record using the scratch technique.  
*A screen protector prevents any **scratching** of the display.*
- scrub** An act of scrubbing something or someone.  
*He had to **scrub** the floor.*
- skin** Of a wound form new skin.  
*We had a few beers and then we **skinned** up.*
- slit** Cut a slit into.  
*A wide recording head magnetizes the tape before it is **slit** to domestic size.*
- tattoo** A design on the skin made by tattooing.  
*She tapped her fingers in a nervous **tattoo**.*
- wound** The act of inflicting a wound.  
*He feared that mentioning it might reopen the **wound**.*
