- displeasure** *He started hanging around the local pubs much to the **displeasure** of his mother.*
- exasperation** Actions that cause great irritation (or even anger).  
*She rolled her eyes in **exasperation**.*
- fury** The hideous snake-haired monsters (usually three in number) who pursued unpunished criminals.  
*Hell hath no **fury** like a woman scorned.*

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| <b>humiliation</b>   | Depriving one of self-esteem.<br><i>They suffered the <b>humiliation</b> of losing in the opening round.</i>   |
| <b>irritation</b>    | A thing that annoys or irritates someone.<br><i>Some chemicals cause a direct <b>irritation</b> to the skin leading to dermatitis.</i>                               |
| <b>mortification</b> | The action of subduing one's bodily desires.<br><i>They mistook my <b>mortification</b> for an admission of guilt.</i>   |
| <b>pique</b>         | A sudden outburst of anger.<br><i>He left in a fit of <b>pique</b>.</i>  |
| <b>rage</b>          | Violent state of the elements.<br><i>His face turned red with <b>rage</b>.</i>   |
| <b>spleen</b>        | Bad temper; spite.<br><i>He could vent his <b>spleen</b> on the institutions which had duped him.</i>  |
| <b>vexation</b>      | The state of being annoyed, frustrated, or worried.<br><i>The <b>vexations</b> of life under canvas.</i>   |
| <b>wrath</b>         | Belligerence aroused by a real or supposed wrong (personified as one of the deadly sins).<br><i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's <b>wrath</b>.</i> |

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| <b>cross</b>      | Mark or annotate a cheque typically by drawing a pair of parallel lines across it to indicate that it must be paid into a named bank account.<br><i>Mendel tried <b>crossbreeding</b>.</i> |
| <b>displeased</b> | Give displeasure to.   |
| <b>humble</b>     | Cause (someone) to feel less important or proud.<br><i>Wales were <b>humbled</b> at Cardiff Arms Park by Romania.</i>  |

| <b>put out</b>    | Make an investment.  |
| <b>vexed</b>      | Subject to prolonged examination, discussion, or deliberation.   |

| <b>annoyance</b> | A thing that annoys someone; a nuisance.<br><i>He turned his charm on Tara much to Hegarty's <b>annoyance</b>.</i>   |
| <b>belittle</b>  | Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of.<br><i>Don't <b>belittle</b> your colleagues.</i>  |

| <b>degrade</b>        | Reduce in worth or character, usually verbally.<br><i>He was <b>degraded</b> from his high estate.</i>  |
| <b>demean</b>         | Cause a severe loss in the dignity of and respect for (someone or something).<br><i>Good potential MPs would not <b>demean</b> themselves by setting out to acquire popularity.</i> |
| <b>deprecate</b>      | Belittle.<br><i>This feature is <b>deprecated</b> and will be removed in later versions.</i>  |
| <b>derogate</b>       | Detract from.<br><i>This does not <b>derogate</b> from his duty to act honestly and faithfully.</i>   |
| <b>disappointment</b> | A person or thing that causes disappointment.<br><i>His hopes were so high he was doomed to <b>disappointment</b>.</i>  |
| <b>disgrace</b>       | Bring shame or discredit on.<br><i>You have <b>disgraced</b> the family name.</i>   |
| <b>disparage</b>      | Express a negative opinion of.<br><i>He never missed an opportunity to <b>disparage</b> his competitors.</i>  |
| <b>distress</b>       | Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship.<br><i>The death of his wife caused him great <b>distress</b>.</i>  |

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| <b>nuisance</b>        | A person or thing causing inconvenience or annoyance.<br><i>I hope you re not going to make a <b>nuisance</b> of yourself.</i>                                       |
| <b>objectionable</b>   | Causing disapproval or protest.<br><i>Found the politician s views <b>objectionable</b>.</i>   |
| <b>offend</b>          | Hurt the feelings of.<br><i>A small hard core of young criminals who <b>offend</b> again and again.</i>  |
| <b>rankle</b>          | Annoy or irritate (someone).<br><i>The injustice <b>rankled</b> her.</i>   |
