- *(chemistry) a series of linked atoms (generally in an organic molecule).*
- *A series of things depending on each other as if linked together.*

- *A group of hotels, restaurants, or shops owned by the same company.*

bout	A period of illness. <i>A drinking bout.</i>
chain of mountains	Anything that acts as a restraint.
chemical chain	Material produced by or used in a reaction involving changes in atoms or molecules.
concatenation	The action of linking things together in a series, or the condition of being linked in such a way. <i>A complicated concatenation of circumstances.</i>
course	An area of land set aside and prepared for racing, golf, or another sport. <i>A business studies course.</i>

drop	The act of dropping something. <i>Do you play for the drop now or finesse the 9.</i>
ernst boris chain	A series of things depending on each other as if linked together.
fetters	A shackle for the ankles or feet.
group	A number of people that work together or share certain beliefs. <i>A group of boys approached.</i>
handcuffs	Shackle that consists of a metal loop that can be locked around the wrist; usually used in pairs.
irons	A golf club that has a relatively narrow metal head.
leg irons	One of the supports for a piece of furniture.
line	A line marking the starting or finishing point in a race. <i>Video evidence suggests the ball did not cross the line.</i>
locket	A small ornamental case, typically made of gold or silver, worn round a person's neck on a chain and used to hold things of sentimental value, such as a photograph or lock of hair.
manacles	Shackle that consists of a metal loop that can be locked around the wrist; usually used in pairs.
medallion	An emblem indicating that a taxicab is registered. <i>Medallions of veal.</i>
mountain chain	A land mass that projects well above its surroundings; higher than a hill.
mountain range	A land mass that projects well above its surroundings; higher than a hill.
pattern	A regular and intelligible form or sequence discernible in the way in which something happens or is done. <i>He set the pattern for subsequent study.</i>
period	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>The period 1977 85.</i>
<u>progression</u>	A passage or movement from one note or chord to another. <i>A blues progression.</i>
range	The area covered by or included in something. <i>The cost of dealing with unexploded shells and bombs on former military ranges.</i>
range of mountains	The set of values of the dependent variable for which a function is defined.
row	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>Rows of barbed wire protected the trenches.</i>

run	A race run on foot. <i>The play had a long run in the West End.</i>
<u>sequence</u>	A particular order in which related things follow each other. <i>He played the trumps in sequence.</i>
series	(electronics) connection of components in such a manner that current flows first through one and then through the other. <i>He gave a series of lectures on modern art.</i>
set	The process of becoming hard or solid by cooling or drying or crystallization. <i>The sets were meticulously authentic.</i>
shackles	A U-shaped bar; the open end can be passed through chain links and closed with a bar.
sir ernst boris chain	Term of address for a man.
spate	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A spate of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<u>spell</u>	A psychological state induced by (or as if induced by) a magical incantation. <i>A spell of good weather.</i>
<u>stone</u>	A large flat table or sheet originally made of stone and now usually of metal on which pages of type are made up. <i>A gold ring with a small dark red stone.</i>
<u>strand</u>	A very slender natural or synthetic fiber. <i>I could hear several melodic strands simultaneously.</i>
stretch	A stretch limo. <i>Long stretches of time.</i>
<u>string</u>	Stringed instruments that are played with a bow. <i>The village team held Rangers second string to a 0 0 draw.</i>
succession	The right or sequence of inheriting a position, title, etc. <i>The new king was already elderly at the time of his succession.</i>
<u>trail</u>	A trailer for a film or broadcast. <i>Smoke trails.</i>
<u>train</u>	A long piece of material attached to the back of a formal dress or robe that trails along the ground. <i>A train of gears.</i>

concatenation	The linking together of a consecutive series of symbols or events or ideas etc. <i>A complicated concatenation of circumstances.</i>
copper	A reddish brown colour like that of copper. <i>Some iron hulls were sheathed with wood and then coppered.</i>
decoration	Ornamentation. <i>He was awarded the highest Australian decoration.</i>
diamond	A tool with a small diamond for cutting glass. <i>She led a losing diamond.</i>
earring	Jewelry to ornament the ear; usually clipped to the earlobe or fastened through a hole in the lobe.
gem	Used in names of some brilliantly coloured hummingbirds e g mountain gem. <i>He had the gem set in a ring for his wife.</i>
gold	Made of or coloured like gold. <i>He proved to be a rabid seeker for gold and power.</i>
golden	Made or consisting of gold. <i>A choir of young golden voices.</i>
jade	Of something having the color of jade especially varying from bluish green to yellowish green. <i>A silk blouse in a vivid jade green.</i>
jewelry	An adornment (as a bracelet or ring or necklace) made of precious metals and set with gems (or imitation gems).
medal	Decorate or honour with a medal. <i>He was medalled by the Michigan Photographers Association.</i>
medallion	An emblem indicating that a taxicab is registered. <i>Medallions of veal.</i>
metallic	A paint fabric or colour with a metallic sheen. <i>Metallic luster.</i>
nacre	Mother-of-pearl.

necklace	In South Africa kill someone with a tyre necklace. <i>The harbour with its necklace of lights.</i>
pearl	A necklace of pearls. <i>Sunset pearled the sky above the hills.</i>
ribbon	A ribbon of a special colour or design awarded as a prize or worn to indicate the holding of an honour especially a small multicoloured piece of ribbon worn in place of the medal it represents. <i>In the Silk Cup trophy class Mullins stayed in the ribbons.</i>
ring	A ring shaped or circular object. <i>He had a silver ring on one finger.</i>
spangle	Cover with spangles or other small sparkling objects or lights. <i>The star spangled banner.</i>
string	A piece of string used to tie round or attach to something. <i>The child drew glass beads on a string.</i>
thread	Put something on a thread chain etc that passes through it especially in such a way as to connect a number of things by passing a thread through each. <i>His fine threads and fashionable specs.</i>
turquoise	A shade of blue tinged with green. <i>Blue turquoise is valued as a gemstone.</i>
