Definitions of "Channel" as a noun

- *A length of water wider than a strait, joining two larger areas of water, especially two seas.*
- *A service or station using a channel of frequencies.*
- *A deep and relatively narrow body of water (as in a river or a harbor or a strait linking two larger bodies) that allows the best passage for vessels.*
- *A band of frequencies used in radio and television transmission, especially as used by a*

particular station.

- *A navigable passage in a stretch of water otherwise unsafe for vessels.*
- *(often plural) a means of communication or access.*
- *A passage for water (or other fluids) to flow through.*
- *An electric circuit which acts as a path for a signal.*
- *A television station and its programs.*
- *The English Channel.*
- *The semiconductor region in a field-effect transistor that forms the main current path between the source and the drain.*
- *A method or system for communication or distribution.*
- *A long narrow furrow cut either by a natural process (such as erosion) or by a tool (as e.g. a groove in a phonograph record.*
- *A hollow bed for a natural or artificial waterway.*

- *A path over which electrical signals can pass.*

- *A tubular passage or duct for liquid.*

A business or organization that provides a particular service, especially the mediation of transactions between two parties.

Any projection that is thought to resemble a human arm.

avenue

A thoroughfare running at right angles to the streets in a city laid out on a grid pattern.
*An **avenue** of limes.*

broadcasting organization

A medium that disseminates via telecommunications.

canal

An artificial waterway constructed to allow the passage of boats or ships inland or to convey water for irrigation.
*They travelled on by **canal**.*

communication channel	A connection allowing access between persons or places.
conduit	A passage (a pipe or tunnel) through which water or electric wires can pass. <i>As an actor you have to be a conduit for other people's words.</i>
course	Part of a meal served at one time. <i>If you persist in that course you will surely fail.</i>
culvert	A tunnel carrying a stream or open drain under a road or railway.
cut	A passage cut or dug out as a railway cutting or a new channel made for a river or other waterway. <i>Kellett was denied a century by edging a cut to wicketkeeper Burns.</i>
distribution channel	An arrangement of values of a variable showing their observed or theoretical frequency of occurrence.
ditch	A long narrow excavation in the earth. <i>Their car went out of control and plunged into a ditch.</i>
drain	A pipe through which liquid is carried away. <i>A drain of young talent by emigration.</i>
duct	(in the body) a vessel for conveying lymph or glandular secretions such as tears or bile. <i>Ventilation ducts.</i>
furrow	A line or wrinkle on a person's face. <i>There were deep furrows in his brow.</i>
groove	A long narrow furrow cut either by a natural process such as erosion or by a tool as e.g. a groove in a phonograph record. <i>Her vocals drift delicately across a soaring soul groove.</i>
gutter	A channel on either side of a lane in a bowling alley. <i>Men who had fought their way out of the gutter.</i>
instrument	Any of various devices or contrivances that can be used to produce musical tones or sounds. <i>The musicians started tuning their instruments.</i>
line	A dose of a powdered narcotic drug especially cocaine laid out in a line ready to be taken. <i>The stresses unique to their line of work.</i>
means	Financial resources; income. <i>He is a man of means.</i>

<u>mechanism</u>	A natural or established process by which something takes place or is brought about. <i>The mechanism of the ear.</i>
<u>medium</u>	Transmissions that are disseminated widely to the public. <i>Radio communication needs no physical medium between the two stations.</i>
method	An acting technique introduced by Stanislavsky in which the actor recalls emotions or reactions from his or her own life and uses them to identify with the character being portrayed. <i>Labour intensive production methods.</i>
<u>mode</u>	A way of operating or using a system. <i>His preferred mode of travel was a kayak.</i>
narrows	A narrow strait connecting two bodies of water.
<u>neck</u>	A cut of meat from the neck of an animal. <i>Dolpour won by a neck from Wood Dancer.</i>
<u>passage</u>	A narrow way allowing access between buildings or to different rooms within a building a passageway. <i>An allegory on the theme of the passage from ignorance to knowledge.</i>
race	A series of races for horses or dogs held at a fixed time on a set course. <i>The industrious sun already half his race hath run.</i>
route	A round travelled in delivering, selling, or collecting goods. <i>The many routes to a healthier diet will be described.</i>
rut	A settled and monotonous routine that is hard to escape. <i>A stretch of road made impassable by ruts holes or waterlogging.</i>
sea passage	Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.
sluice	Conduit that carries a rapid flow of water controlled by a sluiceway. <i>A sluice with cold water.</i>
sound	The distinctive quality of the music of a particular composer or performer or of the sound produced by a particular instrument. <i>Light travels faster than sound.</i>
spillway	A passage for surplus water from a dam.
strait	A narrow passage of water connecting two seas or two other large areas of water. <i>Redundancy left him in severe financial straits.</i>
straits	A narrow channel of the sea joining two larger bodies of water.

stretch of water	The capacity for being stretched.
television channel	An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen.
transmission channel	An incident in which an infectious disease is transmitted.
trench	A trench coat. <i>Dig a trench around the perimeter of the fire.</i>
trough	A concave shape with an open top. <i>A water trough.</i>
tv channel	Broadcasting visual images of stationary or moving objects - Ernie Kovacs.
vehicle	A substance that facilitates the use of a drug, pigment, or other material mixed with it. <i>The play was just a vehicle to display her talents.</i>
watercourse	The bed along which a watercourse flows. <i>A dry watercourse.</i>
waterway	A channel at the outer edge of a deck of a boat that allows water to run off. <i>The canal was a very successful commercial waterway.</i>

convey	Transmit a title or property. <i>It s impossible to convey how lost I felt.</i>
direct	Aim something in a particular direction or at a particular person. <i>Heating ducts to direct warm air to rear seat passengers.</i>
guide	Use as a guide. <i>The groove in the needle guides the thread.</i>
impart	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Shiitake mushrooms impart a wonderfully woody flavour to the salad.</i>
pass on	Throw (a ball) to another player.

drain	Empty of liquid drain the liquid from. <i>The exercise class drains me of energy.</i>
drainage	Emptying something accomplished by allowing liquid to run out of it. <i>They set about renewing and repairing drainage and water supplies.</i>
furrow	Cut a furrow into a columns. <i>A look of concern furrowed his brow.</i>
groove	A long narrow furrow cut either by a natural process such as erosion or by a tool as e.g a groove in a phonograph record. <i>Groove a vinyl record.</i>
gulf	The Persian Gulf. <i>He felt a gulf between himself and his former friends.</i>
incised	Cut into with a sharp instrument. <i>An incised design.</i>
infotainment	A film or TV program presenting the facts about a person or event.
internet	A global computer network providing a variety of information and communication facilities, consisting of interconnected networks using standardized communication protocols. <i>An internet connection.</i>
irrigate	Wash out (an organ or wound) with a continuous flow of water or medication. <i>Irrigate the wound.</i>
irrigation	(medicine) cleaning a wound or body organ by flushing or washing out with water or a medicated solution. <i>The river supplies water for irrigation of agricultural crops.</i>
isthmus	A cord-like tissue connecting two larger parts of an anatomical structure.
narrow	Denoting a vowel pronounced with the root of the tongue drawn back so as to narrow the pharynx. <i>The home team just hung on for a narrow victory.</i>
navigable	(of a waterway or sea) able to be sailed on by ships or boats. <i>The use of white space can help make your mobile optimized site clearer and more navigable.</i>

passage	Subject a strain of microorganisms or cells to a passage. <i>The species occurs regularly on passage.</i>
peninsula	A piece of land almost surrounded by water or projecting out into a body of water.
radio	Communicate with a person or place by radio. <i>A radio station.</i>
shaft	Equip with a shaft. <i>A shaft of sunlight.</i>
strait	(of a place) of limited spatial capacity; narrow or cramped. <i>Redundancy left him in severe financial straits.</i>
surfing	The sport of riding a surfboard toward the shore on the crest of a wave. <i>Why share your internet connection with people surfing and chatting.</i>
television	An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen. <i>Dan was sitting on the settee watching television.</i>
tidal	Relating to or affected by tides. <i>Strong tidal currents.</i>
trench	Dig a trench or trenches in the ground. <i>She trenched the terrace to a depth of 6 feet.</i>
waterway	A navigable body of water. <i>The canal was a very successful commercial waterway.</i>
