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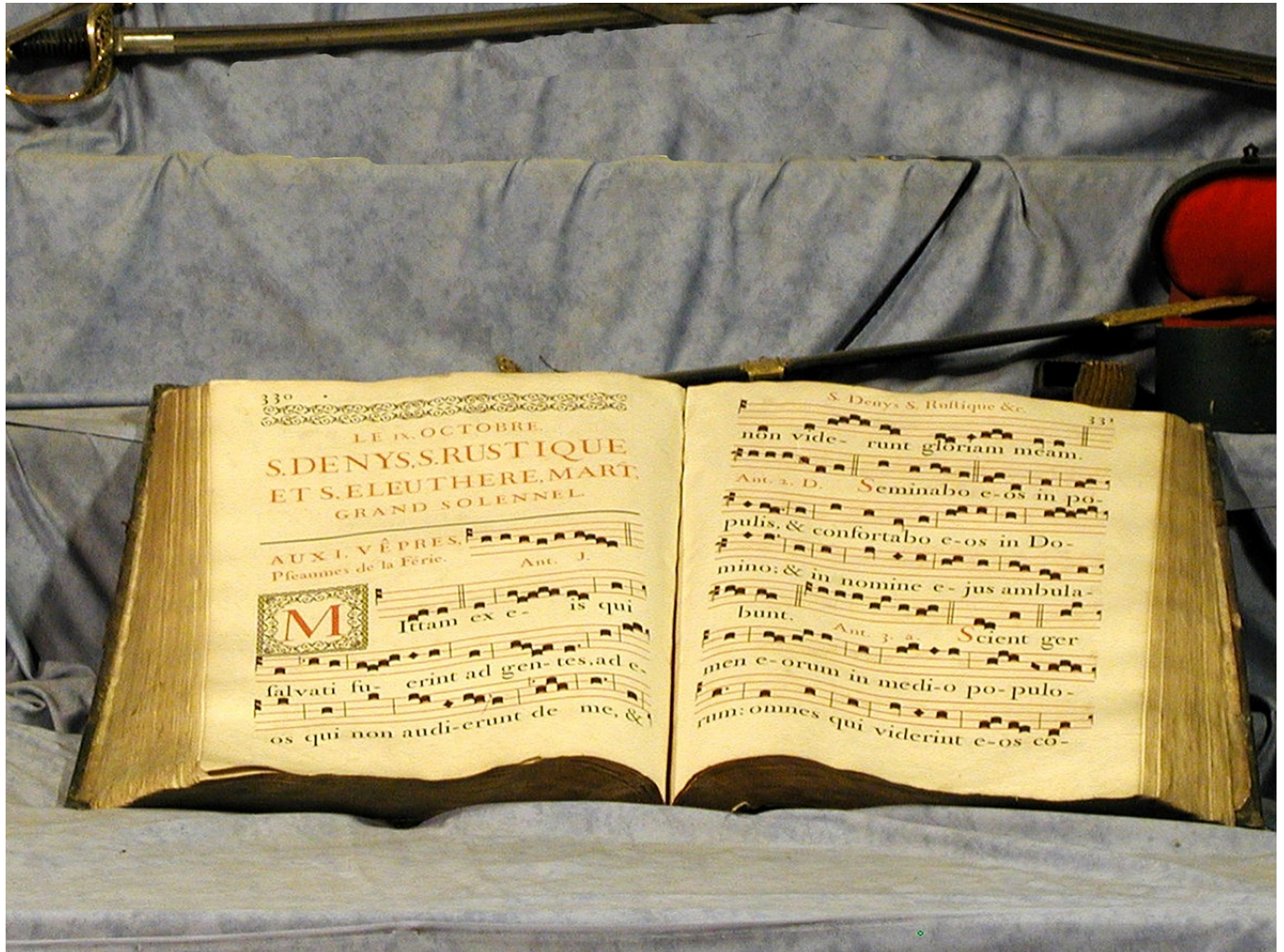

Chant as a Noun

Definitions of "Chant" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “chant” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A repetitive song in which as many syllables as necessary are assigned to a single tone.*
- *A repetitive song, typically an incantation or part of a ritual.*
- *The style of music consisting of chants.*
- *A short musical passage in two or more phrases used for singing unmetrical words; a psalm or canticle sung to such music.*
- *A repeated rhythmic phrase, typically one shouted or sung in unison by a crowd.*



Synonyms of "Chant" as a noun (14 Words)

- chanting** A repetitive song in which as many syllables as necessary are assigned to a single tone.
- chorus** A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama.
A **chorus** of boos.
- cry** A fit of weeping.
There was a **cry** of Silence.
- incantation** A series of words said as a magic spell or charm.
An **incantation** to raise the dead.
- intonation** The rise and fall of the voice in speaking.
Poor woodwind **intonation** at the opening.

<u>mantra</u>	A Vedic hymn. <i>A mantra is given to a trainee meditator when his teacher initiates him.</i>
rallying call	A large gathering of people intended to arouse enthusiasm.
recitation	A public instance of reciting or repeating (from memory) something prepared in advance. <i>The program included songs and recitations of well loved poems.</i>
recitative	A vocal passage of narrative text that a singer delivers with natural rhythms of speech. <i>Singing in recitative.</i>
<u>shout</u>	A loud cry expressing a strong emotion or calling attention. <i>Do you want another drink My shout.</i>
singing	The act of singing vocal music. <i>My mother had a beautiful singing voice.</i>
slogan	A motto associated with a political party or movement or other group. <i>Students were chanting slogans.</i>
song	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>A bird will not learn its song unless it hears it at an early age.</i>
war cry	A legal state created by a declaration of war and ended by official declaration during which the international rules of war apply.



Usage Examples of "Chant" as a noun

- *He was whispering something, repeating it like a chant or a mantra.*
- *Gregorian chant.*
- *A group of young people set up a chant of 'Why are we waiting.'*



Chant as a Verb

Definitions of "Chant" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "chant" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Sing or intone (a psalm, canticle, or sacred text.*
- *Recite with musical intonation; recite as a chant or a psalm.*
- *Utter monotonously and repetitively and rhythmically.*

- Say or shout repeatedly in a sing-song tone.



Synonyms of "Chant" as a verb (10 Words)

- cantillate** Recite with musical intonation; recite as a chant or a psalm.
*He **cantillated** the verses of the ancient Avesta.*
- carol** Sing Christmas carols.
*Goodbye he **carolled**.*
- chorus** (of a group of people) say the same thing at the same time.
*Yes the children **chorused**.*
- incant** Chant or intone.
*Priests were **incanting** psalms round her body.*

- intonate** Say or recite with little rise and fall of the pitch of the voice.
*Please **intonate** with sadness.*
- intone** Say or recite with little rise and fall of the pitch of the voice.
*All rise **intoned** the usher.*
- recite Recite in elocution.
Recite a poem.
- shout Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting.
*Anyone shooting a hole in one must **shout** for all players present on the course.*
- sing Sing in accompaniment to a song or piece of music.
*We **sing** along to all the songs.*
- tone** Change the color or tone of.
*Push ups help **tone** your abs.*



Usage Examples of "Chant" as a verb

- *The rabbi chanted a prayer.*
- *Priests and choir chant the story of the resurrection.*

- Protesters were chanting slogans.
- Everyone was singing and chanting.
- The students chanted the same slogan over and over again.

campaign	Go on a campaign go off to war. <i>A desert campaign.</i>
claim	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>If no one claims the items they will become Crown property.</i>
competitor	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>Our main industrial competitors.</i>

contestant	A person who participates in competitions. <i>An anxious contestant on a television quiz show.</i>
controvert	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>The views in the article have been controverted.</i>
demonstrator	A piece of merchandise which can be tested by potential buyers. <i>She was appointed demonstrator in botany at Newnham College.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	Be of different opinions. <i>The results disagree with the findings reported so far.</i>
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He was sent off for dissent.</i>
dissenter	A member of a non-established Church; a Nonconformist.
dissentient	In opposition to a majority or official opinion. <i>Dissentient voices were castigated as hopeless bureaucrats.</i>
<u>dissident</u>	Disagreeing, especially with a majority. <i>The measure was supported by dissident Tories.</i>
mascot	A character, animal or object that is adopted by a team or group as a symbolic figure. <i>The team's dolphin mascot.</i>
motto	A short sentence or phrase chosen as encapsulating the beliefs or ideals of an individual, family, or institution. <i>They were developing the use of leitmotifs or mottoes that appear throughout an opera.</i>
nonconformist	Not conforming to some norm or socially approved pattern of behavior or thought. <i>She was a nonconformist an individualist.</i>
<u>objection</u>	(law) a procedure whereby a party to a suit says that a particular line of questioning or a particular witness or a piece of evidence or other matter is improper and should not be continued and asks the court to rule on its impropriety or illegality. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
objector	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i>Objectors to the housing plans.</i>
oppose	Be against; express opposition to. <i>A candidate to oppose the leader in the presidential contest.</i>
<u>protest</u>	Write or obtain a protest in regard to a bill. <i>They finished the game under protest to the league president.</i>
protester	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i>The decision was hailed by protesters against the closure as a triumph.</i>

rebut	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>He had to rebut charges of acting for the convenience of his political friends.</i>
recusant	Of or denoting a recusant. <i>Support for the exiled King was greatest among Catholic recusants.</i>
remonstrance	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest. <i>Angry remonstrances in the Commons.</i>
saying	A collection of short, pithy expressions identified with a particular person, especially a political or religious leader. <i>This is stated in the sayings of the Prophet.</i>
shibboleth	A manner of speaking that is distinctive of a particular group of people. <i>Liberal shibboleths about education.</i>
slogan	A Scottish Highland war cry. <i>Students were chanting slogans.</i>
stickle	A section of river where the bed slopes and the water is shallow and runs swiftly; a rapid.
tone	A steady sound without overtones. <i>A certain amount of daily exercise is essential to maintain proper body tone and function.</i>
<u>trademark</u>	Mark with or register as a trademark. <i>The company trademarked their new gadget.</i>
truism	An obvious truth. <i>The truism that you get what you pay for.</i>
