confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>A confused mass of papers on the desk.</i>
disordered	Thrown into a state of disarray or confusion. <i>The small disordered room.</i>
disorderly	Undisciplined and unruly. <i>Disorderly youths.</i>
<u>disorganized</u>	Unable to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>The campaign was hopelessly disorganized.</i>
disrupted	Marked by breaks or gaps. <i>Many routes are unsafe or disrupted.</i>
haywire	Not functioning properly. <i>Her imagination had gone haywire.</i>
helter-skelter	With undue hurry and confusion.
in chaos	Currently fashionable.
in disarray	Directed or bound inward.
in disorder	Directed or bound inward.
in pandemonium	Currently fashionable.
in turmoil	Directed or bound inward.
topsy-turvy	In utter disorder.
tumultuous	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>The tumultuous years of his administration.</i>

Associations of "Chaotic" (30 Words)

<u>anarchy</u>	A state of lawlessness and disorder (usually resulting from a failure of government. <i>He must ensure public order in a country threatened with anarchy.</i>
boisterous	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>Boisterous practical jokes.</i>
chaos	The property of a complex system whose behaviour is so unpredictable as to appear random, owing to great sensitivity to small changes in conditions. <i>Snow caused chaos in the region.</i>
<u>clutter</u>	Unwanted echoes that interfere with the observation of signals on a radar screen. <i>The attic is full of clutter.</i>
confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>The flood of questions left her bewildered and confused.</i>
crazy	Extremely enthusiastic. <i>The monument leant at a crazy angle.</i>
damaged	Being unjustly brought into disrepute. <i>Her damaged reputation.</i>
disheveled	In disarray; extremely disorderly. <i>Her clothing was disheveled.</i>
disorderly	Completely unordered and unpredictable and confusing. <i>A disorderly pile of books.</i>
<u>disorganized</u>	Unable to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>The campaign was hopelessly disorganized.</i>
disruptive	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>Disruptive pupils.</i>
<u>dysfunctional</u>	(of a trait or condition) failing to serve an adjustive purpose. <i>Dysfunctional behavior.</i>
impaired	Having a disability of a specified kind. <i>Impaired driving charges.</i>
jumble	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>She jumbles the words when she is supposed to write a sentence.</i>
lousy	Infested with lice. <i>The town is lousy with tourists.</i>

maelstrom	A situation or state of confused movement or violent turmoil. <i>The train station was a maelstrom of crowds.</i>
mess	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>My hair was a mess.</i>
<u>messy</u>	Untidy or dirty. <i>Stripping wallpaper can be a messy time consuming job.</i>
<u>rambunctious</u>	Uncontrollably exuberant; boisterous. <i>A social gathering that became rambunctious and out of hand.</i>
<u>raucous</u>	Making or constituting a disturbingly harsh and loud noise. <i>A raucous party.</i>
<u>rowdy</u>	Noisy and disorderly. <i>It was a rowdy but good natured crowd.</i>
rumple	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>Careful you ll rumple my outfit.</i>
sloven	A coarse obnoxious person.
tumultuous	Excited, confused, or disorderly. <i>Tumultuous applause.</i>
ungovernable	Impossible to control or govern. <i>The country had become ungovernable.</i>
unkempt	Not properly maintained or cared for. <i>Wild unkempt hair.</i>
untidy	Not neat and tidy. <i>She was chronically untidy and her clothes lay where she had dropped them.</i>
vortex	The shape of something rotating rapidly. <i>A swirling vortex of emotions.</i>
whirlpool	A quickly rotating mass of water in a river or sea into which objects may be drawn, typically caused by the meeting of conflicting currents. <i>He was drawing her down into an emotional whirlpool.</i>
