The **tumultuous** years of his administration.






Usage Examples of "Chaotic" as an adjective

dysfunctional (of a trait or condition) failing to serve an adjustive purpose.

impaired Having a disability of a specified kind.

Impaired driving charges.

jumble

Be all mixed up or jumbled together.

She **jumble**s the words when she is supposed to write a sentence.

Infested with lice.

The town is **lousy** with tourists.



mess

A situation or state of confused movement or violent turmoil. maelstrom

The train station was a **maelstrom** of crowds.

A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel.

My hair was a **mess**.

Untidy or dirty.

messy Stripping wallpaper can be a **messy** time consuming job.

Uncontrollably exuberant; boisterous. rambunctious

A social gathering that became **rambunctious** and out of hand.

Making or constituting a disturbingly harsh and loud noise. raucous

A **raucous** party.

Noisy and disorderly.

rowdy It was a **rowdy** but good natured crowd.

Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. rumple

Careful you ll **rumple** my outfit.

sloven A coarse obnoxious person.

Excited, confused, or disorderly.

tumultuous Tumultuous applause.

Impossible to control or govern.

ungovernable The country had become **ungovernable**.

Not properly maintained or cared for.

unkempt Wild **unkempt** hair.

Not neat and tidy.

She was chronically **untidy** and her clothes lay where she had dropped untidy

The shape of something rotating rapidly.

vortex A swirling **vortex** of emotions.

A quickly rotating mass of water in a river or sea into which objects may be

drawn, typically caused by the meeting of conflicting currents. whirlpool

He was drawing her down into an emotional **whirlpool**.
