- *Of or relating to a sensitive dependence on initial conditions.*
- *Lacking a visible order or organization.*

<b>confused</b>	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>A <b>confused</b> mass of papers on the desk.</i>
<b>disordered</b>	Thrown into a state of disarray or confusion. <i>The small <b>disordered</b> room.</i>
<b>disorderly</b>	Undisciplined and unruly. <i><b>Disorderly</b> youths.</i>
<a href="#"><u>disorganized</u></a>	Unable to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>The campaign was hopelessly <b>disorganized</b>.</i>
<b>disrupted</b>	Marked by breaks or gaps. <i>Many routes are unsafe or <b>disrupted</b>.</i>
<b>haywire</b>	Not functioning properly. <i>Her imagination had gone <b>haywire</b>.</i>
<b>helter-skelter</b>	With undue hurry and confusion.
<b>in chaos</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>in disarray</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>in disorder</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>in pandemonium</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>in turmoil</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>topsy-turvy</b>	In utter disorder.
<b>tumultuous</b>	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>The <b>tumultuous</b> years of his administration.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Chaotic" as an adjective

## Associations of "Chaotic" (30 Words)

<b><u>anarchy</u></b>	A state of lawlessness and disorder (usually resulting from a failure of government. <i>He must ensure public order in a country threatened with <b>anarchy</b>.</i>
<b>boisterous</b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i><b>Boisterous</b> practical jokes.</i>
<b>chaos</b>	The property of a complex system whose behaviour is so unpredictable as to appear random, owing to great sensitivity to small changes in conditions. <i>Snow caused <b>chaos</b> in the region.</i>
<b><u>clutter</u></b>	Unwanted echoes that interfere with the observation of signals on a radar screen. <i>The attic is full of <b>clutter</b>.</i>
<b>confused</b>	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>The flood of questions left her bewildered and <b>confused</b>.</i>
<b>crazy</b>	Extremely enthusiastic. <i>The monument leant at a <b>crazy</b> angle.</i>
<b>damaged</b>	Being unjustly brought into disrepute. <i>Her <b>damaged</b> reputation.</i>
<b>disheveled</b>	In disarray; extremely disorderly. <i>Her clothing was <b>disheveled</b>.</i>
<b>disorderly</b>	Completely unordered and unpredictable and confusing. <i>A <b>disorderly</b> pile of books.</i>
<b><u>disorganized</u></b>	Unable to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>The campaign was hopelessly <b>disorganized</b>.</i>
<b>disruptive</b>	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i><b>Disruptive</b> pupils.</i>
<b><u>dysfunctional</u></b>	(of a trait or condition) failing to serve an adjustive purpose. <i><b>Dysfunctional</b> behavior.</i>
<b>impaired</b>	Having a disability of a specified kind. <i><b>Impaired</b> driving charges.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>She <b>jumbles</b> the words when she is supposed to write a sentence.</i>
<b>lousy</b>	Infested with lice. <i>The town is <b>lousy</b> with tourists.</i>

<b>maelstrom</b>	A situation or state of confused movement or violent turmoil. <i>The train station was a <b>maelstrom</b> of crowds.</i>
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>My hair was a <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>messy</b>	Untidy or dirty. <i>Stripping wallpaper can be a <b>messy</b> time consuming job.</i>
<b>rambunctious</b>	Uncontrollably exuberant; boisterous. <i>A social gathering that became <b>rambunctious</b> and out of hand.</i>
<b>raucous</b>	Making or constituting a disturbingly harsh and loud noise. <i>A <b>raucous</b> party.</i>
<b>rowdy</b>	Noisy and disorderly. <i>It was a <b>rowdy</b> but good natured crowd.</i>
<b>rumple</b>	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>Careful you ll <b>rumple</b> my outfit.</i>
<b>sloven</b>	A coarse obnoxious person.
<b>tumultuous</b>	Excited, confused, or disorderly. <i><b>Tumultuous</b> applause.</i>
<b>ungovernable</b>	Impossible to control or govern. <i>The country had become <b>ungovernable</b>.</i>
<b>unkempt</b>	Not properly maintained or cared for. <i>Wild <b>unkempt</b> hair.</i>
<b>untidy</b>	Not neat and tidy. <i>She was chronically <b>untidy</b> and her clothes lay where she had dropped them.</i>
<b>vortex</b>	The shape of something rotating rapidly. <i>A swirling <b>vortex</b> of emotions.</i>
<b>whirlpool</b>	A quickly rotating mass of water in a river or sea into which objects may be drawn, typically caused by the meeting of conflicting currents. <i>He was drawing her down into an emotional <b>whirlpool</b>.</i>
