<b>bureau</b>	Furniture with drawers for keeping clothes. <i>The intelligence <b>bureau</b>.</i>
<b>component</b>	Each of two or more forces, velocities, or other vectors acting in different directions which are together equivalent to a given vector. <i>Jealousy was a <b>component</b> of his character.</i>
<b>consistory</b>	(in other Churches) a local administrative body.
<u><b>convention</b></u>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>He was an upholder of <b>convention</b> and correct form.</i>
<b>convocation</b>	The action of calling people together for a large formal assembly. <i>The arguments delayed the <b>convocation</b> of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
<u><b>council</b></u>	Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent. <i>A <b>council</b> flat.</i>
<b>department</b>	A division of a large organization such as a government, university, or business, dealing with a specific area of activity. <i>You ll find it in the hardware <b>department</b>.</i>
<b>division</b>	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The new clause was agreed without a <b>division</b>.</i>
<u><b>episode</b></u>	Film consisting of a succession of related shots that develop a given subject in a movie. <i>The whole <b>episode</b> has been a major embarrassment.</i>
<b>epoch</b>	A period marked by distinctive character or reckoned from a fixed point or event. <i>The Victorian <b>epoch</b>.</i>
<u><b>era</b></u>	Baseball a measure of a pitcher s effectiveness calculated as the average number of earned runs allowed by the pitcher for every nine innings pitched. <i>His death marked the end of an <b>era</b>.</i>
<b>governing body</b>	The act of governing; exercising authority.
<b>lodge</b>	A large house or hotel. <i>A hunting <b>lodge</b>.</i>
<b>offshoot</b>	A thing that develops from something else. <i>Commercial <b>offshoots</b> of universities.</i>
<b>page</b>	A page of a newspaper or magazine set aside for a particular topic. <i>He was turning the <b>pages</b> of his Sunday newspaper.</i>
<b>part</b>	The melody carried by a particular voice or instrument in polyphonic music. <i>He took the <b>part</b> of Prospero.</i>

<b>period</b>	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>The <b>period</b> 1977 85.</i>
<b><u>phase</u></b>	A distinct state of matter in a system matter that is identical in chemical composition and physical state and separated from other material by the phase boundary. <i><b>Phase</b> two of the development.</i>
<b><u>portion</u></b>	An individual quantity of food or drink taken as part of a meal. <i>His <b>portion</b> was larger than hers.</i>
<b>satellite</b>	Satellite television. <i><b>Satellite</b> broadcasting.</i>
<b><u>section</u></b>	A relatively distinct part of a book, newspaper, statute, or other document. <i>The finance <b>section</b> of the company.</i>
<b>segment</b>	A part of a figure cut off by a line or plane intersecting it. <i>Orange <b>segments</b>.</i>
<b><u>stage</u></b>	The theater as a profession usually the stage. <i>A series resistance between the headphones and the output <b>stage</b>.</i>
<b>subdivision</b>	Any taxonomic subcategory, especially (in botany) one that ranks below division and above class. <i>The Birkenhead police <b>subdivision</b>.</i>
<b>subsidiary</b>	A company controlled by a holding company. <i>The firm s Spanish <b>subsidiary</b>.</i>
<b>synod</b>	A Presbyterian ecclesiastical court above the presbyteries and subject to the General Assembly. <i>The deanery <b>synod</b>.</i>
<b>time</b>	A point of time as measured in hours and minutes past midnight or noon. <i>Do you know what <b>time</b> it is.</i>
<b>wing</b>	The wing of a fowl. <i>Michael earned his <b>wings</b> as a commercial pilot.</i>

## Associations of "Chapter" (30 Words)

- antiphon** A musical setting of an antiphon.
- assonant** Having the same sound (especially the same vowel sound) occurring in successive stressed syllables.  
*Note the **assonant** words and syllables in tilting at windmills.*
- book** A bookmaker's record of bets accepted and money paid out.  
*Women's **books** like Cosmopolitan and Ladies Home Journal.*
- couplet** A stanza consisting of two successive lines of verse; usually rhymed.
- denouement** The final resolution of the main complication of a literary or dramatic work.  
*The film's **denouement** was unsatisfying and ambiguous.*

<b>doggerel</b>	Comic verse composed in irregular rhythm. <i><b>Doggerel</b> verses.</i>
<b>fiction</b>	Literature in the form of prose that describes imaginary events and people. <i>They were supposed to be keeping up the <b>fiction</b> that they were happily married.</i>
<b>filing</b>	Preservation and methodical arrangement as of documents and papers etc. <i>Iron <b>filings</b>.</i>
<b>introductory</b>	Serving as a base or starting point. <i>Began the slide show with some <b>introductory</b> remarks.</i>
<b>literature</b>	The humanistic study of a body of literature. <i>The <b>literature</b> on environmental epidemiology.</i>
<b>missive</b>	A letter, especially a long or official one. <i>Yet another <b>missive</b> from the Foreign Office.</i>
<b>narrator</b>	A person who delivers a commentary accompanying a film, broadcast, piece of music, etc. <i>A religious broadcast with Johnny Morris as <b>narrator</b>.</i>
<b>new</b>	Beginning anew and in a transformed way. <i>Looking for <b>new</b> business.</i>
<b>novel</b>	The literary genre represented or exemplified by novels. <i>The <b>novels</b> of Jane Austen.</i>
<b>ode</b>	A lyric poem with complex stanza forms.
<b>phrase</b>	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>They <b>phrased</b> the music with gusto.</i>
<b>poem</b>	A piece of writing in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given intensity by particular attention to diction (sometimes involving rhyme), rhythm, and imagery. <i>Lyric <b>poems</b>.</i>
<b>poesy</b>	The art or composition of poetry. <i>The genius of <b>poesy</b>.</i>
<b>poetry</b>	Any communication resembling poetry in beauty or the evocation of feeling. <i>He is chiefly famous for his love <b>poetry</b>.</i>
<b>prologue</b>	The actor who delivers the prologue in a play. <i>I got third in the <b>prologue</b> and eighth on the hardest stage.</i>
<b>prose</b>	Compose in or convert into prose. <i>A short story in <b>prose</b>.</i>

<b>quatrain</b>	A stanza of four lines.
<b>reenact</b>	Enact again. <i>Congress <b>reenacted</b> the law.</i>
<b>reorganization</b>	An extensive alteration of the structure of a corporation or government. <i>A committee was appointed to oversee the <b>reorganization</b> of the curriculum.</i>
<b>rhyme</b>	Compose rhymes. <i>Poetic features such as rhythm <b>rhyme</b> and alliteration.</i>
<b>sentence</b>	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>He always spoke in grammatical <b>sentences</b>.</i>
<b>sonnet</b>	Praise in a sonnet. <i>He <b>sonneted</b> his hostess now.</i>
<b>stanza</b>	A fixed number of lines of verse forming a unit of a poem.
<b>verse</b>	Compose verses or put into verse. <i>We were each required to recite a Bible <b>verse</b> from memory.</i>
<b>writer</b>	A clerk, especially in the navy or in government offices. <i>A CD <b>writer</b>.</i>
