- *The governing body of a religious community or knightly order.*

- *A main division of a book, typically with a number or title.*

- agency** Thing or person that acts to produce a particular effect or achieve an end.
*The **agency** of providence.*
- arm** A side part of a chair or other seat on which a sitter can rest their arm.
*As they walked he offered her his **arm**.*
- assembly** A group of persons who are gathered together for a common purpose.
*He was told off for talking in **assembly**.*
- bit** The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press.
*Can you move over a **bit**.*
- branch** A part of a forked or branching shape.
*He went to work at our Birmingham **branch**.*

bureau	Furniture with drawers for keeping clothes. <i>The intelligence bureau.</i>
component	Each of two or more forces, velocities, or other vectors acting in different directions which are together equivalent to a given vector. <i>Jealousy was a component of his character.</i>
consistory	(in other Churches) a local administrative body.
<u>convention</u>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>He was an upholder of convention and correct form.</i>
convocation	The action of calling people together for a large formal assembly. <i>The arguments delayed the convocation of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
<u>council</u>	Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent. <i>A council flat.</i>
department	A division of a large organization such as a government, university, or business, dealing with a specific area of activity. <i>You ll find it in the hardware department.</i>
division	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The new clause was agreed without a division.</i>
<u>episode</u>	Film consisting of a succession of related shots that develop a given subject in a movie. <i>The whole episode has been a major embarrassment.</i>
epoch	A period marked by distinctive character or reckoned from a fixed point or event. <i>The Victorian epoch.</i>
<u>era</u>	Baseball a measure of a pitcher s effectiveness calculated as the average number of earned runs allowed by the pitcher for every nine innings pitched. <i>His death marked the end of an era.</i>
governing body	The act of governing; exercising authority.
lodge	A large house or hotel. <i>A hunting lodge.</i>
offshoot	A thing that develops from something else. <i>Commercial offshoots of universities.</i>
page	A page of a newspaper or magazine set aside for a particular topic. <i>He was turning the pages of his Sunday newspaper.</i>
part	The melody carried by a particular voice or instrument in polyphonic music. <i>He took the part of Prospero.</i>

period	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>The period 1977 85.</i>
<u>phase</u>	A distinct state of matter in a system matter that is identical in chemical composition and physical state and separated from other material by the phase boundary. <i>Phase two of the development.</i>
<u>portion</u>	An individual quantity of food or drink taken as part of a meal. <i>His portion was larger than hers.</i>
satellite	Satellite television. <i>Satellite broadcasting.</i>
<u>section</u>	A relatively distinct part of a book, newspaper, statute, or other document. <i>The finance section of the company.</i>
segment	A part of a figure cut off by a line or plane intersecting it. <i>Orange segments.</i>
<u>stage</u>	The theater as a profession usually the stage. <i>A series resistance between the headphones and the output stage.</i>
subdivision	Any taxonomic subcategory, especially (in botany) one that ranks below division and above class. <i>The Birkenhead police subdivision.</i>
subsidiary	A company controlled by a holding company. <i>The firm s Spanish subsidiary.</i>
synod	A Presbyterian ecclesiastical court above the presbyteries and subject to the General Assembly. <i>The deanery synod.</i>
time	A point of time as measured in hours and minutes past midnight or noon. <i>Do you know what time it is.</i>
wing	The wing of a fowl. <i>Michael earned his wings as a commercial pilot.</i>



Usage Examples of "Chapter" as a noun

- *The industrial revolution opened a new chapter in British history.*
- *A leaflet was issued by the local chapter of the American Cancer Society.*
- *A majority voted for the inclusion of the social chapter in the treaty.*
- *A chapter of disasters.*
- *We will deal with this in chapter eleven.*
- *Land granted by the Dean and Chapter of St Paul's Cathedral.*
- *He read a chapter every night before falling asleep.*
- *The people are about to begin a new chapter in their history.*
- *He joined the Atlanta chapter.*
- *The divorce was an ugly chapter in their relationship.*
- *The latest episode in a chapter of problems.*



Associations of "Chapter" (30 Words)

- antiphon** A musical setting of an antiphon.
- assonant** Having the same sound (especially the same vowel sound) occurring in successive stressed syllables.
*Note the **assonant** words and syllables in tilting at windmills.*
- book** A bookmaker's record of bets accepted and money paid out.
*Women's **books** like Cosmopolitan and Ladies Home Journal.*
- couplet** A stanza consisting of two successive lines of verse; usually rhymed.
- denouement** The final resolution of the main complication of a literary or dramatic work.
*The film's **denouement** was unsatisfying and ambiguous.*

doggerel	Comic verse composed in irregular rhythm. <i>Doggerel verses.</i>
fiction	Literature in the form of prose that describes imaginary events and people. <i>They were supposed to be keeping up the fiction that they were happily married.</i>
filing	Preservation and methodical arrangement as of documents and papers etc. <i>Iron filings.</i>
introductory	Serving as a base or starting point. <i>Began the slide show with some introductory remarks.</i>
literature	The humanistic study of a body of literature. <i>The literature on environmental epidemiology.</i>
missive	A letter, especially a long or official one. <i>Yet another missive from the Foreign Office.</i>
narrator	A person who delivers a commentary accompanying a film, broadcast, piece of music, etc. <i>A religious broadcast with Johnny Morris as narrator.</i>
new	Beginning anew and in a transformed way. <i>Looking for new business.</i>
novel	The literary genre represented or exemplified by novels. <i>The novels of Jane Austen.</i>
ode	A lyric poem with complex stanza forms.
phrase	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>They phrased the music with gusto.</i>
poem	A piece of writing in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given intensity by particular attention to diction (sometimes involving rhyme), rhythm, and imagery. <i>Lyric poems.</i>
poesy	The art or composition of poetry. <i>The genius of poesy.</i>
poetry	Any communication resembling poetry in beauty or the evocation of feeling. <i>He is chiefly famous for his love poetry.</i>
prologue	The actor who delivers the prologue in a play. <i>I got third in the prologue and eighth on the hardest stage.</i>
prose	Compose in or convert into prose. <i>A short story in prose.</i>

quatrain	A stanza of four lines.
reenact	Enact again. <i>Congress reenacted the law.</i>
reorganization	An extensive alteration of the structure of a corporation or government. <i>A committee was appointed to oversee the reorganization of the curriculum.</i>
rhyme	Compose rhymes. <i>Poetic features such as rhythm rhyme and alliteration.</i>
sentence	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>He always spoke in grammatical sentences.</i>
sonnet	Praise in a sonnet. <i>He sonneted his hostess now.</i>
stanza	A fixed number of lines of verse forming a unit of a poem.
verse	Compose verses or put into verse. <i>We were each required to recite a Bible verse from memory.</i>
writer	A clerk, especially in the navy or in government offices. <i>A CD writer.</i>
