## Synonyms of "Charisma" as a noun (9 Words)

### [aura](#)

The distinctive atmosphere or quality that seems to surround and be generated by a person, thing, or place.

*Emotional mental and spiritual levels form an energy field around the body known as the **aura**.*

### [charm](#)

A characteristic property of certain subatomic particles specifically charm quarks charm antiquarks and hadrons containing these expressed as a quantum number.

*The **charm** begins with ritual instructions.*

### **force of personality**

An act of aggression (as one against a person who resists).

The distinct personality of an individual regarded as a persisting entity.

### [individuality](#)

*So absorbed by the movement that she lost all sense of **individuality**.*

### **personal appeal**

A short newspaper article about a particular person or group.

**personal magnetism** A short newspaper article about a particular person or group.

**personality**

The quality or fact of being a person as distinct from a thing or animal.

*She s always had loads of **personality**.*

**presence**

An invisible spiritual being felt to be nearby.

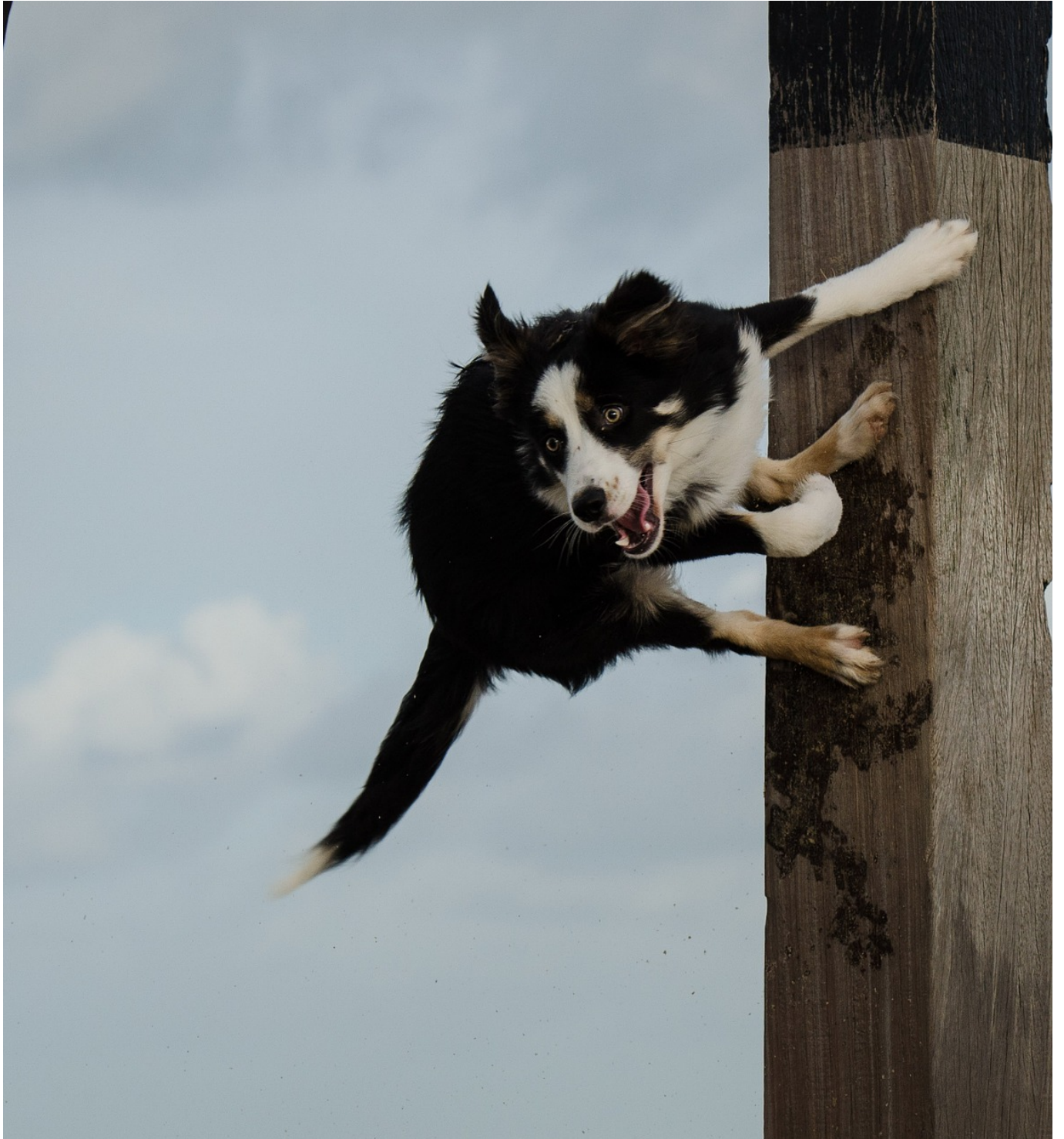
*She blushed in his **presence**.*

**strength of character** The property of being physically or mentally strong.

## Associations of "Charisma" (30 Words)

<b>allure</b>	The power to entice or attract through personal charm. <i>Will sponsors really be <b>allured</b> by such opportunities.</i>
<b>appeal</b>	Request for a sum of money. <i>I <b>appealed</b> to his sense of justice.</i>
<b>attract</b>	Be attractive to. <i>A campaign to <b>attract</b> more visitors to Shetland.</i>
<b>attraction</b>	A quality or feature that evokes interest, liking, or desire. <i>This reform has many <b>attractions</b> for those on the left.</i>
<b><u>cachet</u></b>	A seal on a letter. <i>Special <b>cachets</b> are applied to cards sold at the stands.</i>
<b><u>captivate</u></b>	Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was <b>captivated</b> by her beauty.</i>
<b><u>charm</u></b>	Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>The books have <b>charmed</b> children the world over.</i>
<b><u>enchant</u></b>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>Marcia had <b>enchanted</b> the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.</i>
<b><u>enthrall</u></b>	Hold spellbound.
<b><u>entice</u></b>	Attract or tempt by offering pleasure or advantage. <i>The treat is offered to <b>entice</b> the dog to eat.</i>
<b>enticing</b>	Attractive or tempting; alluring. <i>Difficult to say no to an <b>enticing</b> advertisement.</i>
<b><u>entrance</u></b>	The right, means, or opportunity to enter somewhere or be a member of an institution, society, or other body. <i>Her final <b>entrance</b> is as a triumphant princess.</i>
<b><u>fascinate</u></b>	Attract the strong attention and interest of (someone). <i>The serpent <b>fascinates</b> its prey.</i>
<b>gateway</b>	A device used to connect two different networks, especially a connection to the internet. <i>Mombasa the <b>gateway</b> to East Africa.</i>
<b>glamorize</b>	Make (something) seem glamorous or desirable, especially spuriously so. <i>The lyrics <b>glamorize</b> drugs.</i>
<b>hypnotize</b>	Induce hypnosis in. <i>She gazed down <b>hypnotized</b> by the swirling tide.</i>

<b><u>inviting</u></b>	Offering the promise of an attractive or enjoyable experience. <i>An <b>inviting</b> offer.</i>
<b><u>lure</u></b>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>He <b>lured</b> me into temptation.</i>
<b>mesmerize</b>	Attract strongly, as if with a magnet. <i>He was <b>mesmerized</b> when at the point of death.</i>
<b>portal</b>	A grand and imposing entrance (often extended metaphorically). <i>The <b>portals</b> of success.</i>
<b><u>seduction</u></b>	The action of seducing someone. <i>She was planning a <b>seduction</b>.</i>
<b><u>seductive</u></b>	Tempting and attractive; enticing. <i>A <b>seductive</b> voice.</i>
<b>spellbind</b>	Hold the complete attention of (someone) as though by magic; fascinate. <i>The singer held the audience <b>spellbound</b>.</i>
<b><u>tempt</u></b>	Risk provoking (a deity or abstract force), usually with undesirable consequences. <i>I was <b>tempted</b> to look at my watch but didn't dare.</i>
<b><u>temptation</u></b>	The tempting of Jesus by the Devil (see Matt. 4). <i>He felt the <b>temptation</b> and his will power weakened.</i>
<b><u>tempting</u></b>	Appealing to or attracting someone, even if wrong or unwise. <i>A <b>tempting</b> repast.</i>
<b><u>trance</u></b>	Put into a trance. <i>In the Hades Warehouse there's the finest in <b>trance</b> and techno.</i>
<b>woo</b>	Seek someone's favor. <i>China is <b>wooing</b> Russia.</i>
<b><u>worldly</u></b>	Very sophisticated especially because of surfeit; versed in the ways of the world. <i>She was much more <b>worldly</b> than Nora and dismissed the slur.</i>
