Pleasing or delighting.  
*A **charming** little cottage.*

**fascinating**

Extremely interesting.  
*A **fascinating** story.*

**full of personality**

Constituting the full quantity or extent; complete.

**magnetic**

Of a bearing in navigation measured relative to magnetic north.  
*The hard disk is covered with a thin coat of **magnetic** material.*

**strong in character**

Of good quality and condition; solidly built.

## Associations of "Charismatic" (30 Words)

<b>administrate</b>	Work in an administrative capacity; supervise or be in charge of. <i>The person administrating the database system has left the company.</i>
<b>aileron</b>	An airfoil that controls lateral motion.
<b>appealing</b>	Able to attract interest or draw favorable attention- Vincent Starrett. <i>An <b>appealing</b> sense of humor.</i>
<b>ascendancy</b>	The state that exists when one person or group has power over another. <i>The <b>ascendancy</b> of good over evil.</i>
<b>behest</b>	A person's orders or command. <i>They had assembled at his <b>behest</b>.</i>
<b>centralize</b>	Concentrate (control of an activity or organization) under a single authority. <i>One of his first actions was to <b>centralize</b> control of the company's operations.</i>
<b>control</b>	The economic policy of controlling or limiting or curbing prices or wages etc. <i><b>Control</b> the quality of the product.</i>
<b>coordinator</b>	Someone whose task is to see that work goes harmoniously. <i>A full time <b>coordinator</b> was appointed to oversee the referral process.</i>
<b>dominance</b>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>Some plants produce structures to outcompete other species for <b>dominance</b> in a given habitat.</i>
<b>dominate</b>	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance. <i>Her husband completely <b>dominates</b> her.</i>
<b>govern</b>	(of a word) require that (another word or group of words) be in a particular case. <i>Who is <b>governing</b> the country now.</i>
<b>governing</b>	The act of governing exercising authority. <i>Regulations for the <b>governing</b> of state prisons.</i>
<b>grasshopper</b>	Terrestrial plant-eating insect with hind legs adapted for leaping.
<b>leader</b>	(in the UK) a member of the government officially responsible for initiating business in the House of Commons or House of Lords. <i>A natural <b>leader</b>.</i>

<b>leadership</b>	The ability to lead. <i>He believed that <b>leadership</b> can be taught.</i>
<b>lord</b>	Make a lord of someone. <i>When we were at school you used to <b>lord</b> it over us.</i>
<b>magnetic</b>	Of a bearing in navigation measured relative to magnetic north. <i>The hard disk is covered with a thin coat of <b>magnetic</b> material.</i>
<b>manageable</b>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<b>mastery</b>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>A child s <b>mastery</b> of language.</i>
<b>orator</b>	A public speaker, especially one who is eloquent or skilled. <i>A theatrically effective <b>orator</b>.</i>
<b>pole</b>	A long slender flexible rod of wood or fibreglass used by a competitor in pole vaulting. <i>New <b>poles</b> should be protected from grazing livestock.</i>
<b>reign</b>	Have sovereign power. <i>Queen Elizabeth <b>reigns</b> over the UK.</i>
<b>rudder</b>	Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft. <i>Bring the aircraft to a stall and apply full <b>rudder</b>.</i>
<b>sensorimotor</b>	Of or relating to the sensory and motor coordination of an organism or to the controlling nerves.
<b>statesman</b>	A skilled, experienced, and respected political leader or figure. <i>Guests included members of the European royal families, diplomats, and statesmen.</i>
<b>subjugate</b>	Put down by force or intimidation. <i>The new ruler firmly <b>subjugated</b> the Church to the state.</i>
<b>superintendence</b>	The management or arrangement of an activity or organization; supervision. <i>The school was under the <b>superintendence</b> of the nuns of the convent.</i>
<b>supervision</b>	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. <i>He was placed under the <b>supervision</b> of a probation officer.</i>
<b>thermostat</b>	Control the temperature with a thermostat.
