<u>covenant</u>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people. The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham, Moses, and David. <i>There was a covenant between them that her name was never to be mentioned.</i>
deed	Something that people do or cause to happen. <i>He signed the deed.</i>
dispensation	Permission to be exempted from the laws or observances of the Church. <i>Scholarship is conveyed to a wider audience than under the old dispensation.</i>
<u>document</u>	A piece of written, printed, or electronic matter that provides information or evidence or that serves as an official record.
hire	A newly hired employee. <i>Car hire is recommended.</i>
hire agreement	The act of hiring something or someone.
<u>hiring</u>	The act of hiring something or someone.
indenture	The state of being bound to service by an indenture. <i>The bracelet on his wrist represented his indenture to his master.</i>
lease	Property that is leased or rented out or let. <i>A six month lease on a shop.</i>

leasehold	Land or property held under a lease. <i>Leasehold premises.</i>
leasing	Property that is leased or rented out or let.
licence	Freedom to behave as one wishes, especially in a way which results in excessive or unacceptable behaviour. <i>The government was criticized for giving the army too much licence.</i>
permission	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i>They had entered the country without permission.</i>
<u>permit</u>	An official document giving someone authorization to do something. <i>He is only in Britain on a work permit.</i>
rent	A payment or series of payments made by the lessee to an owner for use of some property, facility, equipment, or service. <i>The rise in council house rents.</i>
rental	The act of paying for the use of something (as an apartment or house or car). <i>A nominal rental.</i>
rental agreement	The act of paying for the use of something (as an apartment or house or car).
renting	The act of paying for the use of something (as an apartment or house or car).
reservation	An area of land set aside for occupation by North American Indians or Australian Aboriginal people. <i>Some generals voiced reservations about making air strikes.</i>
reserving	A district that is reserved for particular purpose.
sanction	A mechanism of social control for enforcing a society's standards. <i>He appealed to the bishop for his sanction.</i>
sufferance	The condition of the holder of an estate who continues to hold it after the title has ceased, without the express permission of the owner. <i>An estate at sufferance.</i>
system of rules	The living body considered as made up of interdependent components forming a unified whole.
warrant	A negotiable security allowing the holder to buy shares at a specified price at or before a future date. <i>There is no warrant for this assumption.</i>
warranty	A written assurance that some product or service will be provided or will meet certain specifications. <i>The car comes with a three year warranty.</i>

gerontocracy	A political system governed by old men.

militarism	A political orientation of a people or a government to maintain a strong military force and to be prepared to use it aggressively to defend or promote national interests. <i>The need for liberal democratic reforms to avoid a revival of militarism.</i>
pension	Dismiss someone from employment typically because of age or ill health and pay them a pension. <i>Garden sheds were raided to bring out machines long since pensioned off.</i>
policy	A line of argument rationalizing the course of action of a government. <i>They debated the policy or impolicy of the proposed legislation.</i>

polity	The form of government of a social organization. <i>The civic humanist s polity.</i>
presidential	Befitting a president. <i>He s a very strong leader very presidential in his performance.</i>
protocol	A procedure for carrying out a scientific experiment or a course of medical treatment. <i>Hungary and the Soviet Union signed a trade protocol.</i>
refund	Money returned to a payer. <i>Please refund me my money.</i>
rent	Hold under a lease or rental agreement of goods and services. <i>Skis or snowboards rent for 60 80 for six days.</i>
subpoena	Summon someone with a subpoena. <i>The witness and her records were subpoenaed.</i>
<u>subsidy</u>	A sum of money granted to support an undertaking held to be in the public interest. <i>The arts continued to thrive through public subsidy.</i>
