<b>blether</b>	Long-winded talk with no real substance. <i>We sat there for two hours having a <b>blether</b>.</i>
<b>chatter</b>	The rapid series of noises made by the parts of a machine. <i>The starlings constant <b>chatter</b>.</i>
<b>confab</b>	A meeting or conference of members of a particular group. <i>The men clustered together for a quick <b>confab</b>.</i>
<b>confabulation</b>	A plausible but imagined memory that fills in gaps in what is remembered.
<b>conversation</b>	A talk, especially an informal one, between two or more people, in which news and ideas are exchanged. <i>The two men were deep in <b>conversation</b>.</i>
<b>gossip</b>	A conversation about other people an instance of gossiping. <i>He became the subject of much local <b>gossip</b>.</i>

<b>heart-to-heart</b>	The hollow muscular organ located behind the sternum and between the lungs; its rhythmic contractions move the blood through the body.
<b>old world chat</b>	Past times (especially in the phrase `in days of old).
<b>schmooze</b>	An informal conversation.
<b>schmooze</b>	A lively and friendly conversation, typically one conducted in order to impress or manipulate others. <i>Jon had a <b>schmooze</b> with a wireless guy.</i>
<b>talk</b>	The act of giving a talk to an audience. <i>Peace <b>talks</b>.</i>
<b>tête-à-tête</b>	Small sofa that seats two people.

## Synonyms of "Chat" as a verb (25 Words)

<b>babble</b>	Divulge confidential information or secrets. <i>They <b>babbled</b> on about their holiday.</i>
<b>chaffer</b>	Wrangle (over a price, terms of an agreement, etc). <i>I <b>chaffer</b>ed in the bazaars for objects I wanted.</i>
<b>chatter</b>	Cut unevenly with a chattering tool. <i>She was <b>chattering</b> about her holiday.</i>
<b>chew the fat</b>	Chew (food); to bite and grind with the teeth.
<b>chit-chat</b>	Talk socially without exchanging too much information.
<b>chitchat</b>	Talk socially without exchanging too much information.
<b>claver</b>	Talk socially without exchanging too much information.
<b>confab</b>	Engage in informal private conversation. <i>Peter was <b>confab</b>bing with a curly haired guy.</i>
<b>confabulate</b>	Talk socially without exchanging too much information. <i>She has lapses in attention and concentration—she may be confabulating a little.</i>



<u>converse</u>	Carry on a conversation. <i>She was withdrawn and preoccupied hardly able to <b>converse</b> with her mother.</i>
<b>engage in conversation</b>	Carry out or participate in an activity; be involved in.
<b>go on</b>	Make a certain noise or sound.
<b>gossip</b>	Engage in gossip. <i>They would start <b>gossiping</b> about her as soon as she left.</i>
<b>have a conversation</b>	Organize or be responsible for.
<b>jabber</b>	Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way. <i>He <b>jabbered</b> on about football.</i>
<b>jaw</b>	Chew (food); to bite and grind with the teeth. <i>I was too busy to spend time <b>jawing</b> with the rest of the crew.</i>
<b>natter</b>	Talk casually, especially on unimportant matters; chat. <i>They <b>nattered</b> away for hours.</i>
<b>prate</b>	Talk foolishly or at tedious length about something. <i>I heard him <b>prate</b> on for at least an hour and a half.</i>
<b>prattle</b>	Talk at length in a foolish or inconsequential way. <i>She began to <b>prattle</b> on about her visit to the dentist.</i>
<b>run on</b>	Progress by being changed.
<b>shoot the breeze</b>	Move quickly and violently.
<b>speak</b>	Show (someone or something) to be in a particular state or to possess a certain quality. <i>I ll <b>speak</b> to him if he calls.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Persuade or cause someone to do something by talking. <i>If you don t oblige me I ll <b>talk</b>.</i>
<b>tittle-tattle</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly.
<b>visit</b>	Pay a brief visit. <i>He was <b>visited</b> with a terrible illness that killed him quickly.</i>

## Associations of "Chat" (30 Words)

<b>confabulate</b>	Have a conference in order to talk something over. <i>She could be heard on the telephone confabulating with someone.</i>
<b><u>conference</u></b>	Take part in a conference or conference call. <i>I <b>conferenced</b> with a senior analyst at the Congressional Research Service.</i>
<b>consult</b>	An act of consulting a professional a consultation. <i>She <b>consulted</b> a large desk diary.</i>
<b>contentiousness</b>	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.

<b>disputation</b>	Debate or argument. <i>The founding father of logical <b>disputation</b>.</i>
<u><b>expansive</b></u>	Friendly and open and willing to talk. <i>The <b>expansive</b> force of fire.</i>
<b>forum</b>	A court or tribunal. <i>We hope these pages act as a <b>forum</b> for debate.</i>
<b>garrulous</b>	Full of trivial conversation. <i>A <b>garrulous</b> cab driver.</i>
<u><b>glib</b></u>	Marked by lack of intellectual depth. <i>A <b>glib</b> tongue.</i>
<b>interlocutor</b>	The performer in the middle of a minstrel line who engages the others in talk.
<b>interlocutory</b>	Consisting of dialogue. <i>An <b>interlocutory</b> injunction.</i>
<b>lengthiness</b>	Amount or degree or range to which something extends.
<b>locution</b>	A person's style of speech. <i>His impeccable <b>locution</b>.</i>
<b>loquacious</b>	Full of trivial conversation. <i>Never <b>loquacious</b> Sarah was now totally lost for words.</i>
<b>loquacity</b>	The quality of being wordy and talkative. <i>He was renowned for <b>loquacity</b>.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	Musical declamation of the kind usual in the narrative and dialogue parts of opera and oratorio, sung in the rhythm of ordinary speech with many words on the same note. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>

<b>speak</b>	Utter (a word, message, etc. <i>She refused to <b>speak</b> about the incident.</i>
<b><u>speaker</u></b>	The presiding officer in a legislative assembly, especially the House of Commons. <i>The <b>speaker</b> at commencement.</i>
<b>talk</b>	The act of giving a talk to an audience. <i>Peace <b>talks</b>.</i>
<b>talkative</b>	Full of trivial conversation. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn't stopped chatting.</i>
<b>talker</b>	A talkative person. <i>A fast <b>talker</b> with an encyclopedic mind.</i>
<b>verbosity</b>	The fact or quality of using more words than needed; wordiness. <i>A critic with a reputation for <b>verbosity</b>.</i>
<b>voluble</b>	(of speech) characterized by fluency and readiness of utterance. <i>A <b>voluble</b> game show host.</i>
<b>wordy</b>	Consisting of words. <i>Proceedings were delayed by <b>wordy</b> disputes.</i>
