## Associations of "Chattering" (30 Words)

<b>amiably</b>	In a friendly and pleasant manner. <i>Come and visit me he said <b>amiably</b>.</i>
<b>babble</b>	Gibberish resembling the sounds of a baby. <i>The <b>babble</b> of a brook.</i>
<b>babbling</b>	Gibberish resembling the sounds of a baby. <i>You sound like a <b>babbling</b> fool.</i>
<u><a href="#">chat</a></u>	Birds having a chattering call. <i>You can have four simultaneous <b>chats</b> online at once.</i>
<b>confabulate</b>	Engage in conversation; talk. <i>She has lapses in attention and concentration—she may be confabulating a little.</i>
<u><a href="#">distraction</a></u>	The act of distracting; drawing someone's attention away from something. <i>Her uncharacteristic air of <b>distraction</b>.</i>

<b><u>driver</u></b>	A golfer who hits the golf ball with a driver. <i>Mule <b>drivers</b>.</i>
<b><u>gibber</u></b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>They shrieked and <b>gibbered</b> as flames surrounded them.</i>
<b><u>gibberish</u></b>	Unintelligible or meaningless speech or writing; nonsense. <i>He talks <b>gibberish</b>.</i>
<b><u>gossip</u></b>	A person given to gossiping and divulging personal information about others. <i>He became the subject of much local <b>gossip</b>.</i>
<b><u>incoherent</u></b>	Of waves having no stable definite or stable phase relation. <i>He screamed some <b>incoherent</b> threat.</i>
<b><u>maunder</u></b>	Talk in a rambling manner. <i>He <b>maunders</b> through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
<b><u>mumble</u></b>	Bite or chew (something) with toothless gums or without making much use of the teeth. <i>The old man had no teeth left and <b>mumbled</b> his food.</i>
<b><u>murmur</u></b>	Make a low continuous sound. <i>The distant <b>murmur</b> of traffic.</i>
<b><u>mutter</u></b>	Make complaining remarks or noises under one's breath. <i>Back benchers were <b>muttering</b> about the next reshuffle.</i>
<b><u>nonsense</u></b>	Having no intelligible meaning. <i>The law is a <b>nonsense</b>.</i>
<b><u>overhear</u></b>	Hear (someone or something) without meaning to or without the knowledge of the speaker. <i>I couldn't help <b>overhearing</b> your conversation.</i>
<b><u>palaver</u></b>	Flattery intended to persuade. <i>There's a lot of <b>palaver</b> involved.</i>
<b><u>prate</u></b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>I heard him <b>prate</b> on for at least an hour and a half.</i>
<b><u>prattle</u></b>	Talk at length in a foolish or inconsequential way. <i>She began to <b>prattle</b> on about her visit to the dentist.</i>
<b><u>prevaricate</u></b>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>He seemed to <b>prevaricate</b> when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
<b><u>ramble</u></b>	Continue talking or writing in a desultory manner. <i>Roses climbed <b>rambled</b> hung over walls.</i>



**slur**

Of words or speech be slurred.  
*There was a trace of a **slur** in his voice.*

**speak**

(of a hound) bark.  
*The prisoner won't **speak**.*

**stutter**

A tendency to stutter while speaking.  
*She flinched as a machine gun **stuttered** nearby.*

**talk**

Deliver a lecture or talk.  
*She will **talk** at Rutgers next week.*

**talking**

The action of talking speech or discussion.  
*I'll do the **talking** you just back me up.*

**tune**

A succession of notes forming a distinctive sequence.  
*The radio was **tuned** to the BBC.*

**unsupported**

Not given financial or other assistance.  
*A toddler who can stand **unsupported**.*

**windbag**

A boring person who talks a great deal about uninteresting topics.  
*I think he's a pompous old **windbag**.*
