<b>food</b>	Any substance that can be metabolized by an animal to give energy and build tissue. <i><b>Food</b> shortages.</i>
<b>foodstuffs</b>	A substance that can be used or prepared for use as food.
<b>gaiety</b>	Lively celebration or festivities. <i>He seemed to be a part of the <b>gaiety</b> having a wonderful time.</i>
<b>gladness</b>	Experiencing joy and pleasure.
<b>glee</b>	A song for men's voices in three or more parts, usually unaccompanied, of a type popular especially c.1750-1830. <i>His face lit up with impish <b>glee</b>.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	State of well-being characterized by emotions ranging from contentment to intense joy. <i>She struggled to find <b>happiness</b> in her life.</i>
<b>high spirits</b>	A state of altered consciousness induced by alcohol or narcotics.
<b>hilarity</b>	Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>By midnight the <b>hilarity</b> had increased.</i>
<b>hoot</b>	A raucous sound made by a horn, siren, or steam whistle. <i>There were <b>hoots</b> of derision.</i>
<b>hope</b>	A specific instance of feeling hopeful. <i>Their only <b>hope</b> is surgery.</i>

<b>hopefulness</b>	The feeling you have when you have hope.
<b>hurrah</b>	An utterance of the word hurrah. <i>They gave us a loud <b>hurrah</b> as we went by.</i>
<b>jocularly</b>	Fun characterized by humor.
<b>jolliness</b>	Feeling jolly and jovial and full of good humor.
<b>jollity</b>	The quality of being cheerful. <i>He was full of false <b>jollity</b>.</i>
<b>joviality</b>	Feeling jolly and jovial and full of good humor.
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>Tears of <b>joy</b>.</i>
<b>joyousness</b>	The emotion of great happiness.
<b>jubilation</b>	The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of <b>jubilation</b>.</i>

<b>shout</b>	A call-out for one of the emergency services. <i>Do you want another drink My <b>shout</b>.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. <i><b>Shrieks</b> of laughter.</i>
<b>sunniness</b>	The quality of being cheerful and dispelling gloom.
<b>sunshine</b>	Used as a friendly or sometimes threatening form of address. <i>Their colourful music can bring a ray of <b>sunshine</b>.</i>
<b>sustenance</b>	The financial means whereby one lives. <i>They were in want of <b>sustenance</b>.</i>
<b>whoop</b>	A long rasping indrawn breath characteristic of whooping cough. <i>A moment s silence was followed by <b>whoops</b> of delight.</i>

<b>comfort</b>	Lessen pain or discomfort alleviate. <i>The victim was <b>comforted</b> by friends before being taken to hospital.</i>
<b>congratulate</b>	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>Simone wrote to her shortly after her engagement had been announced to <b>congratulate</b> her.</i>
<b><u>console</u></b>	Give moral or emotional strength to. <i>You can <b>console</b> yourself with the thought that you did your best.</i>
<b>drive on</b>	Proceed along in a vehicle.
<b>elate</b>	Fill with high spirits; fill with optimism. <i>While the wealth of wildlife <b>elated</b> me it unnerved me as well.</i>
<b><u>embolden</u></b>	Give (someone) the courage or confidence to do something. <i>Centre <b>embolden</b> and underline the heading.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Inspire with confidence; give hope or courage to. <i>Pupils are <b>encouraged</b> to be creative.</i>
<b><u>enliven</u></b>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. <i>The visit had clearly <b>enlivened</b> my mother.</i>

<b>salute</b>	Make a formal salute to. <i>Don't you usually <b>salute</b> a superior officer.</i>
<b>shout for</b>	Use foul or abusive language towards.
<b><u>solace</u></b>	Give moral or emotional strength to. <i>I <b>solaced</b> myself with a slab of chocolate.</i>

<b>ovation</b>	A sustained and enthusiastic show of appreciation from an audience, especially by means of applause. <i>The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b>.</i>
<b>passionately</b>	With or involving intense feelings of sexual love. <i>Ruth was <b>passionately</b> interested in politics.</i>

<b>pep</b>	Energy and high spirits; liveliness. <i>This tonic is guaranteed to give you more <b>pep</b>.</i>
<b>please</b>	Give satisfaction. <i>He arranged a fishing trip to <b>please</b> his son.</i>
<b>rejoice</b>	Feel happiness or joy. <i>The guard <b>rejoiced</b> in the name of Blossom.</i>
<b>rousing</b>	Capable of arousing enthusiasm or excitement. <i>A <b>rousing</b> sermon.</i>
<b>scoff</b>	An expression of scornful derision. <i>Patrick professed to <b>scoff</b> at soppy love scenes in films.</i>
<b>skylark</b>	A common Eurasian and North African lark of farmland and open country, noted for its prolonged song given in hovering flight. <i>He was <b>skylarking</b> with a friend when he fell into a pile of boxes.</i>
