| clichéd | Repeated regularly without thought or originality. |
| commonplace | Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>Unemployment was commonplace in his trade.</i> |
| crummy | Unwell. <i>A crummy little room.</i> |
| fatuous | Extremely silly or stupid. <i>A fatuous comment.</i> |

| feeble | Lacking bodily or muscular strength or vitality. <i>A feeble old woman.</i> |
| hackneyed | Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>Hackneyed old sayings.</i> |
| inane | Extremely silly or stupid. <i>Don't badger people with inane questions.</i> |
| jejune | Of insufficient quantity to meet a need. <i>Their entirely predictable and usually jejune opinions.</i> |
| overworked | Used to excess. <i>Overworked nurses do not have time to adequately prepare patients for discharge.</i> |
| platitudinous | (of a remark or statement) used too often to be interesting or thoughtful; hackneyed. <i>This may sound platitudinous.</i> |
| predictable | Able to be predicted. <i>The market is volatile and never predictable.</i> |
| punk | Relating to punk rock and its associated subculture. <i>I felt too punk to eat.</i> |
| stale | (of food) no longer fresh and pleasant to eat; hard, musty, or dry. <i>A top executive tends to get stale.</i> |
| stereotyped | Lacking spontaneity or originality or individuality. <i>The film is weakened by its stereotyped characters.</i> |
| tinny | Having an unpleasantly metallic taste. <i>Tinny music played in the background.</i> |
| tired | Depleted of strength or energy. <i>A few boxes of tired vegetables.</i> |
| trite | Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>His remarks were trite and commonplace.</i> |
| vapid | Offering nothing that is stimulating or challenging; bland. <i>A vapid smile.</i> |
| weak | Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>The central government had grown too weak to impose order.</i> |
| well worn | Wise or advantageous and hence advisable. |

Associations of "Cheesy" (30 Words)

- bacon** Back and sides of a hog salted and dried or smoked; usually sliced thin and fried.
*Crisp rashers of **bacon**.*
- baked** Dried out by heat or excessive exposure to sunlight.
*Land lying **baked** in the heat.*
- beef** The substance of a matter.
*He was **beefing** about how the recession was killing the business.*
- bread** Coat food with breadcrumbs before cooking.
*His day job puts **bread** on the table.*
- burger** A flat round cake of a savoury ingredient, typically minced beef.
*He sometimes schedules business lunches at his favorite **burger** joint in Manhattan.*

| cooked | Having been prepared for eating by the application of heat. <i>A cooked breakfast.</i> |
| cream | A sweet of a specified flavour which is creamy in texture. <i>Skim cream from the surface of milk.</i> |
| crispy | (of food) having a firm, dry, and brittle surface or texture. <i>Crispy fried bacon.</i> |
| deli | A shop selling ready-to-eat food products. |
| garnish | Decorate (food), as with parsley or other ornamental foods. <i>Some flowers are edible and make attractive salad garnish.</i> |
| grill | Cook food using a grill. <i>The student was grilled for two hours on the subject of phonology.</i> |
| ham | The back of the thigh or the thighs and buttocks. <i>Thin slices of ham.</i> |
| hamburger | A sandwich consisting of a fried cake of minced beef served on a bun, often with other ingredients. |
| lasagna | Baked dish of layers of lasagna pasta with sauce and cheese and meat or vegetables. |
| meat | The flesh of an animal, typically a mammal or bird, as food (the flesh of domestic fowls is sometimes distinguished as poultry). <i>Meat pies.</i> |
| milk | Take milk from female mammals. <i>Cows need to be milked every morning.</i> |
| mutton | Meat from a mature domestic sheep. <i>A leg of mutton.</i> |
| pizza | A dish of Italian origin, consisting of a flat round base of dough baked with a topping of tomatoes and cheese, typically with added meat, fish, or vegetables. <i>A pizza restaurant.</i> |
| pork | Gorge oneself with food. <i>We porked out on cookies and pies.</i> |
| roast | Of food having been roasted. <i>Roast the turkey.</i> |
| sandwich | Relating to a sandwich course. <i>She was sandwiched in her airplane seat between two fat men.</i> |
| sausage | An object shaped like a sausage. <i>Her hair hung in glossy black sausage curls.</i> |

| smoked | (of glass) treated in such a way as to darken it. <i>A plate of smoked salmon.</i> |
| spaghetti | Spaghetti served with a tomato sauce. |
| steak | A thick slice of steak or other high quality meat or fish. <i>Half a pound of fillet steak.</i> |
| toaster | An electrical device for making toast. |
| topping | Excellent; best possible. <i>A cake with a marzipan topping.</i> |
| veal | The flesh of a young calf, used as food. <i>Veal and ham pie.</i> |
| venison | Meat from a deer. <i>Venison steaks.</i> |
| yogurt | A semi-solid food prepared from milk fermented by added bacteria, often sweetened and flavoured. <i>Low fat yogurt.</i> |
