- *A distinct compound or substance, especially one which has been artificially prepared or purified.*



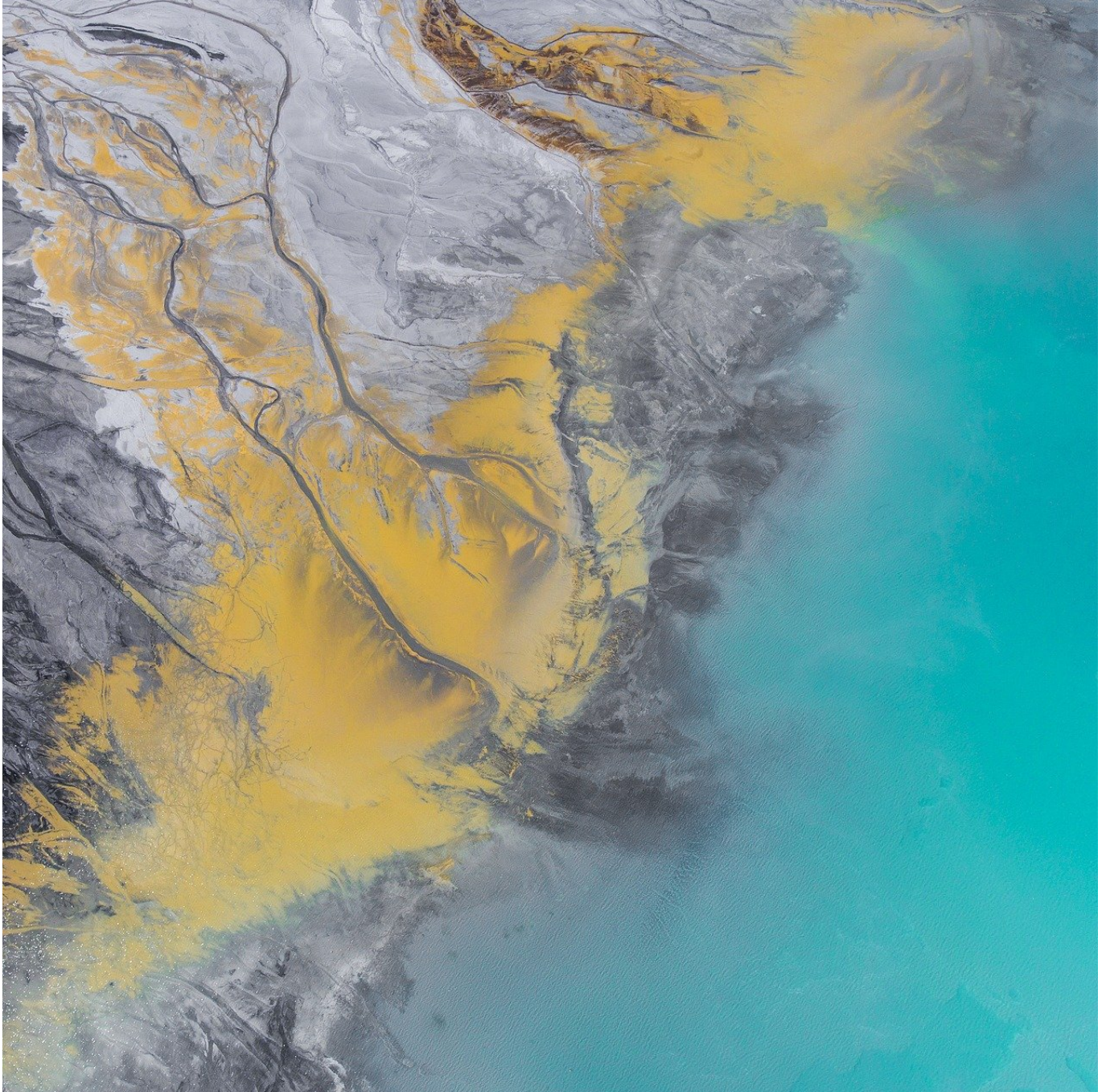
## Synonyms of "Chemical" as a noun (1 Word)

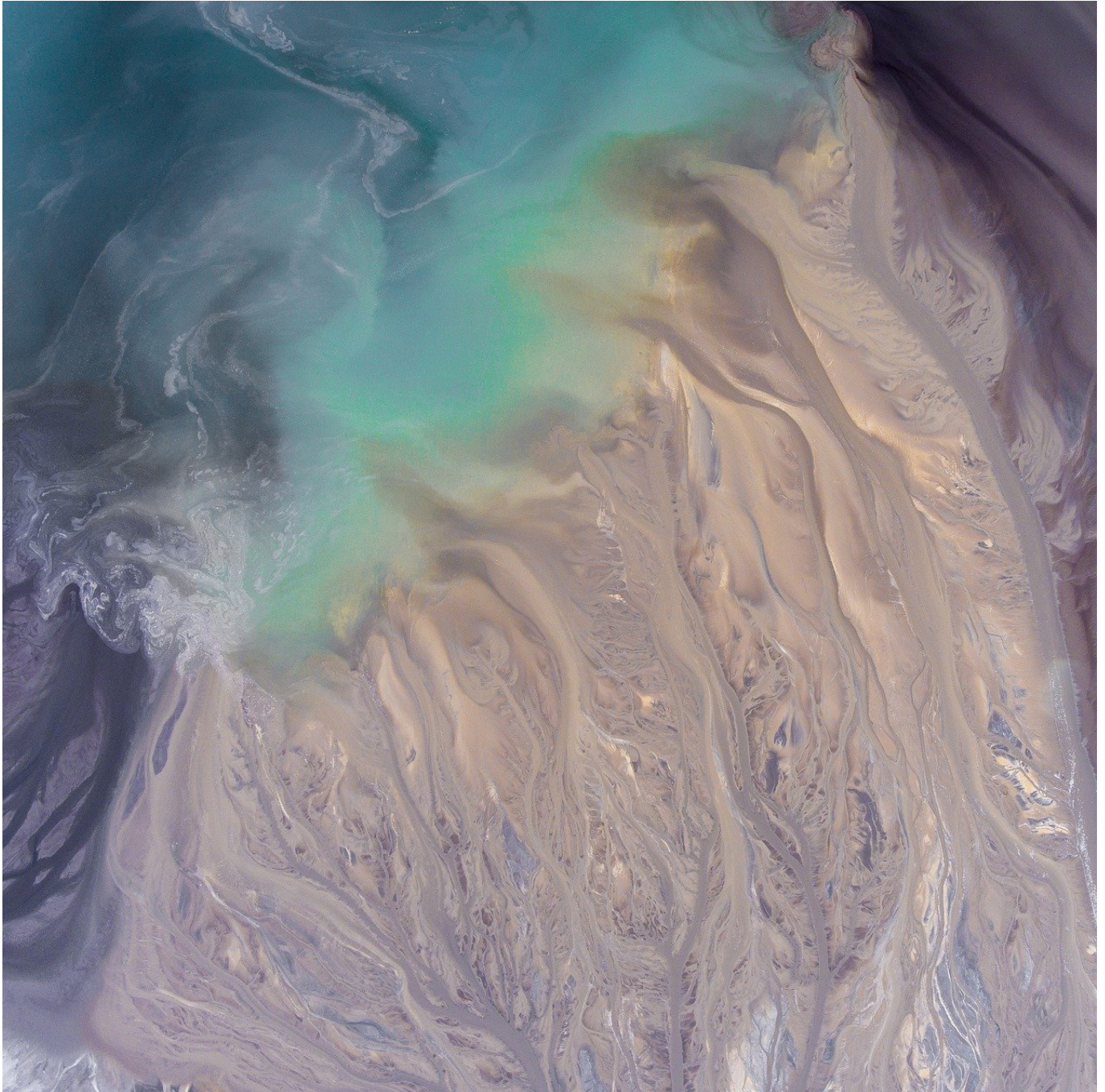

**acetate** A fabric made from fibers of cellulose acetate.  
*Acetate silk.*

<b>acid</b>	Street name for lysergic acid diethylamide. <i>Traces of <b>acid</b>.</i>
<b>alkali</b>	Any of various water-soluble compounds capable of turning litmus blue and reacting with an acid to form a salt and water. <i>Flint is not subject to chemical weathering except by strong <b>alkalis</b>.</i>
<b><u>alkaline</u></b>	Having the properties of an alkali, or containing alkali; having a pH greater than 7. <i>An <b>alkaline</b> soil.</i>
<b>calcium</b>	A white metallic element that burns with a brilliant light; the fifth most abundant element in the earth's crust; an important component of most plants and animals.
<b>carcinogen</b>	A substance capable of causing cancer in living tissue.
<b><u>chemistry</u></b>	The chemical composition and properties of a substance or object. <i>Their <b>chemistry</b> was wrong from the beginning they hated each other.</i>
<b>chloride</b>	Any salt of hydrochloric acid containing the chloride ion. <i>The presence of sulphates <b>chlorides</b> and nitrates.</i>
<b>electrolyte</b>	The ionized or ionizable constituents of a living cell, blood, or other organic matter. <i>The proper amount and distribution of <b>electrolytes</b> in the body is essential for health.</i>
<b>ferment</b>	A substance capable of bringing about fermentation. <i>We <b>ferment</b> the grapes for a very long time to achieve high alcohol content.</i>
<b>hydrogen</b>	A nonmetallic univalent element that is normally a colorless and odorless highly flammable diatomic gas; the simplest and lightest and most abundant element in the universe.
<b><u>intoxicated</u></b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>A noisy crowd of <b>intoxicated</b> sailors.</i>
<b>iodine</b>	A solution of iodine in alcohol used as a mild antiseptic.
<b>ion</b>	A particle that is electrically charged (positive or negative); an atom or molecule or group that has lost or gained one or more electrons. <i>Hydrogen <b>ions</b>.</i>
<b>leaven</b>	Cause to puff up with a leaven. <i>His sermons benefited from a <b>leavening</b> of humor.</i>
<b>leavening</b>	An influence that works subtly to lighten or modify something. <i>Underneath the frills and fuss there s a <b>leavening</b> of serious intent.</i>
<b>lithium</b>	Lithium carbonate or another lithium salt used as a mood stabilizing drug.



<b>metal</b>	Cover with metal. <i>The strange <b>metallic</b> note of the meadow lark suggesting the clash of vibrant blades.</i>
<b>nitric</b>	Of or containing nitrogen with a higher valency, often five. <b>Nitric acid.</b>
<b>potassium</b>	A light soft silver-white metallic element of the alkali metal group; oxidizes rapidly in air and reacts violently with water; is abundant in nature in combined forms occurring in sea water and in carnallite and kainite and sylvite.
<b>radium</b>	The chemical element of atomic number 88, a rare radioactive metal of the alkaline earth series. It was formerly used as a source of radiation for radiotherapy.
<b>reaction</b>	(chemistry) a process in which one or more substances are changed into others. <i>The work of these painters was a <b>reaction</b> against Fauvism.</i>
<b>saccharin</b>	A sweet-tasting synthetic compound used in food and drink as a substitute for sugar.
<b>silicate</b>	A salt or ester derived from silicic acid.
<b>sodium</b>	The chemical element of atomic number 11, a soft silver-white reactive metal of the alkali metal group.
<b>sulfuric</b>	Of or relating to or containing sulfur.
<b>toxic</b>	Denoting securities that are based on toxic debt and for which there is not a healthy or functioning market. <i>The dumping of <b>toxic</b> waste.</i>
<b>toxin</b>	A poison of plant or animal origin, especially one produced by or derived from microorganisms and acting as an antigen in the body.
<b>virulence</b>	Extreme hostility. <i>He was clearly pained by the <b>virulence</b> of the attacks.</i>
<b>yeast</b>	A commercial leavening agent containing yeast cells used to raise the dough in making bread and for fermenting beer or whiskey.
