chicness	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
elegance	The quality of being graceful and stylish in appearance or manner. <i>The simplicity and elegance of his invention.</i>
finesse	(in bridge and whist) an attempt to win a trick with a card that is not a certain winner, typically by playing it as the third card in a trick in the hope that any card that could beat it is in the hand of the opponent who has already played. <i>Orchestral playing of great finesse.</i>
flair	Stylishness and originality. <i>She had a flair for languages.</i>
flourish	An ornamental flowing curve in handwriting or scrollwork. <i>She entered with a great flourish.</i>
grace	In Greek mythology three beautiful goddesses Aglaia Thalia and Euphrosyne believed to personify and bestow charm grace and beauty. <i>The Virgin lived in a state of grace.</i>
gracefulness	Beautiful carriage.
last word	Holding device shaped like a human foot that is used to fashion or repair shoes.
modishness	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.

panache	A tuft or plume of feathers, especially as a headdress or on a helmet. <i>He entertained London society with great panache.</i>
poise	Composure and dignity of manner. <i>Poise and good deportment can be cultivated.</i>
polish	A preparation used in polishing. <i>They performed with great polish.</i>
<u>smartness</u>	A kind of pain such as that caused by a wound or a burn or a sore. <i>The smartness of the pace soon exhausted him.</i>
sophistication	The quality or character of being intellectually sophisticated and worldly through cultivation or experience or disillusionment. <i>The technological sophistication of their products.</i>
stylishness	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
suaveness	The quality of being bland and gracious or ingratiating in manner.
swank	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable. <i>A little money will buy you a good deal of swank.</i>
taste	A kind of sensing distinguishing substances by means of the taste buds. <i>Have you lost your taste for fancy restaurants.</i>
urbanity	Polished courtesy; elegance of manner. <i>A picture of banal urbanity.</i>

attractive	Having power to arouse interest. <i>A stunningly attractive charismatic man.</i>
dapper	Neat and trim in dress and appearance (typically used of a man). <i>A dapper young man.</i>
dashing	Lively and spirited. <i>A dashing black fedora.</i>
debonair	Having a sophisticated charm. <i>A debonair gentleman.</i>
elegant	Refined and tasteful in appearance or behavior or style. <i>Small churches with elegant white spires.</i>
flattering	Enhancing someone's appearance. <i>It was flattering to have a pretty girl like Fiona so obviously fond of him.</i>

smart	Showing mental alertness and calculation and resourcefulness. <i>Smart weapons.</i>
<u>sophisticated</u>	Appealing to or frequented by people who are sophisticated. <i>A young man with sophisticated tastes.</i>
<u>stylish</u>	Neat, confident, and skilful. <i>A stylish cocktail bar.</i>
<u>tasteful</u>	Free from what is tawdry or unbecoming. <i>A tasteful lounge bar.</i>
trim	Slim and fit. <i>A trim little villa.</i>
<u>understated</u>	Exhibiting restrained good taste. <i>Understated elegance.</i>
voguish	Popular or in fashion at a particular time. <i>Mermaid chic is very voguish this season.</i>

abreast	Being up to particular standard or level especially in being up to date in knowledge. <i>The path was wide enough for two people to walk abreast.</i>
alongside	Side by side.
attractive	Pleasing to the eye or mind especially through beauty or charm. <i>An attractive force.</i>
coquettish	Like a coquette. <i>A coquettish grin.</i>
craze	A fine crack in a glaze or other surface. <i>Crazed by hunger the population began to turn on the rebels.</i>

dapper	Marked by up-to-dateness in dress and manners. <i>A dapper young man.</i>
fad	An arbitrary like or dislike. <i>His fads about the type of coffee he must have.</i>
faddish	Intensely fashionable for a short time. <i>Tastes in flavoured coffee are so faddish.</i>
fashion	The production and marketing of new styles of clothing and cosmetics. <i>The skins were fashioned into boots and shoes.</i>
fashionable	Popular and considered appealing or fashionable at the time. <i>A fashionable cafe.</i>
glamorous	(of a person) having a beauty or charm that is sexually attractive. <i>Glamorous movie stars.</i>
jaunty	Having a cheerful, lively, and self-confident air. <i>A jaunty red hat.</i>
lately	In the recent past. <i>Lately the rules have been enforced.</i>
latest	In the current fashion or style. <i>The very latest scientific discoveries.</i>
modern	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i>Totem poles are modern rather than prehistoric.</i>
modish	Conforming to or following what is currently popular and fashionable. <i>It seems sad that such a scholar should feel compelled to use this modish jargon.</i>
natty	Marked by up-to-dateness in dress and manners. <i>A natty blue blazer.</i>
newfangled	Gratuitously new. <i>I ve no time for such newfangled nonsense.</i>
presently	At this time or period; now. <i>He is presently our ambassador to the United Nations.</i>
raffish	Unconventional and slightly disreputable, especially in an attractive way. <i>A cocktail party given by some raffish bachelors.</i>
rakish	Having or displaying a dashing, jaunty, or slightly disreputable quality or appearance. <i>He had a rakish debonair look.</i>
recency	The property of having happened or appeared not long ago.
recent	Of the immediate past or just previous to the present time. <i>His recent visit to Britain.</i>

recently	In the recent past. <i>Until recently we had a female doctor.</i>
<u>seductive</u>	Tending to entice into a desired action or state. <i>A seductive voice.</i>
<u>stylish</u>	Being or in accordance with current social fashions. <i>A stylish range of jewellery.</i>
<u>tempting</u>	Very pleasantly inviting. <i>A tempting financial offer.</i>
unconventional	Not conventional or conformist. <i>An unconventional marriage.</i>
up-to-date	A participant in a date.
urbanity	Polished courtesy; elegance of manner. <i>There is an important difference between rusticity and urbanity.</i>
