### Synonyms of "Chide" as a verb (28 Words)

<b><a href="#">admonish</a></b>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone s behavior. <i>She <b>admonished</b> him to drink no more than one glass of wine.</i>
<b>bawl out</b>	Shout loudly and without restraint.
<b><a href="#">berate</a></b>	Scold or criticize (someone) angrily. <i>She <b>berated</b> herself for being fickle.</i>
<b>call down</b>	Stop or postpone because of adverse conditions, such as bad weather.
<b>call on the carpet</b>	Order, summon, or request for a specific duty or activity, work, role.
<b>castigate</b>	Censure severely. <i>He was <b>castigated</b> for not setting a good example.</i>

<b>censure</b>	Rebuke formally. <i>The company was heavily <b>censured</b> by inspectors from the Department of Trade.</i>
<b>chastise</b>	Punish, especially by beating. <i>The General cruelly <b>chastised</b> them with a whip.</i>
<b>chew out</b>	Chew (food); to bite and grind with the teeth.
<b>chew up</b>	Chew (food); to bite and grind with the teeth.
<b>criticize</b>	Indicate the faults of (someone or something) in a disapproving way. <i>The paper <b>criticized</b> the new movie.</i>
<b>dress down</b>	Decorate (food), as with parsley or other ornamental foods.
<b>have words</b>	Have as a feature.
<b>jaw</b>	Chew (food); to bite and grind with the teeth. <i>He <b>jawed</b> his bubble gum.</i>
<b>lambast</b>	Criticize (someone or something) harshly. <i>They <b>lambasted</b> the report as a gross distortion of the truth.</i>
<b>lambaste</b>	Censure severely or angrily.
<b>lecture</b>	Deliver an educational lecture or lectures. <i>Did you ever <b>lecture</b> at Harvard.</i>
<b>rag</b>	Play in ragtime. <i><b>Rag</b> that old tune.</i>
<b>rebuke</b>	Censure severely or angrily. <i>The judge publicly <b>rebuked</b> the jury.</i>
<b>remonstrate</b>	Present and urge reasons in opposition. <i>He turned angrily to <b>remonstrate</b> with Tommy.</i>
<b>remonstrate with</b>	Argue in protest or opposition.
<b>reprimand</b>	Address a reprimand to. <i>Officials were <b>reprimanded</b> for poor work.</i>
<b>reproach</b>	Accuse someone of. <i>You know that isn't true he <b>reproached</b> her.</i>
<b>reprove</b>	Take to task. <i>He was <b>reproved</b> for obscenity.</i>
<b>scold</b>	(of a bird) call loudly and persistently. <i>Mum took Anna away <b>scolding</b> her for her bad behaviour.</i>
<b>take to task</b>	Require (time or space).
<b>trounce</b>	Come out better in a competition, race, or conflict. <i>Essex <b>trounced</b> Cambridgeshire 5 1 in the final.</i>

**upbraid** Find fault with (someone); scold.  
*He was **upbraided** for his slovenly appearance.*

## Usage Examples of "Chide" as a verb

- 'Now, now,' he chided.
- She chided him for not replying to her letters.

## Associations of "Chide" (30 Words)

<b>accusation</b>	A formal charge of wrongdoing brought against a person; the act of imputing blame or guilt. <i><b>Accusations</b> of bribery.</i>
<b>admonish</b>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>He <b>admonished</b> the child for his bad behavior.</i>
<b>angrily</b>	In a manner resulting from or betraying anger. <i>The sky was black and thundered <b>angrily</b>.</i>
<b>belabor</b>	Attack verbally with harsh criticism. <i>She was <b>belabored</b> by her fellow students.</i>
<b>berate</b>	Scold or criticize (someone) angrily. <i>She <b>berated</b> herself for being fickle.</i>
<b>bluntly</b>	In an uncompromisingly forthright way. <i>To put it <b>bluntly</b> investors are suffering from a crisis.</i>
<b>castigate</b>	Reprimand (someone) severely. <i>He was <b>castigated</b> for not setting a good example.</i>
<b>castigation</b>	Verbal punishment.
<b>ensorious</b>	Harshly critical or expressing censure. <i><b>Censorious</b> champions of morality.</i>
<b>chastise</b>	Rebuke or reprimand severely. <i>The General cruelly <b>chastised</b> them with a whip.</i>
<b>gadfly</b>	A fly that bites livestock, especially a horsefly, warble fly, or botfly. <i>Always a <b>gadfly</b> he attacked intellectual orthodoxies.</i>
<b>incrimination</b>	An accusation that you are responsible for some lapse or misdeed. <i>His <b>incrimination</b> was based on my testimony.</i>
<b>lambaste</b>	Censure severely or angrily.
<b>nag</b>	A person who nags someone. <i>He's always <b>nagging</b> at her for staying out late.</i>

<b>opprobrium</b>	A state of extreme dishonor. <i>The <b>opprobrium</b> of being closely associated with gangsters.</i>
<b>punish</b>	Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on. <i>Fraudulent acts would be <b>punished</b> by up to two years in prison.</i>
<b>rebuke</b>	An act or expression of criticism and censure. <i>She had <b>rebuked</b> him for drinking too much.</i>
<b>recrimination</b>	An accusation in response to one from someone else. <i>There are no tears no <b>recriminations</b>.</i>
<b>reprimand</b>	Address a reprimand to. <i>The golfer received a <b>reprimand</b> for a breach of rules.</i>
<b>reproach</b>	In the Roman Catholic Church a set of antiphons and responses for Good Friday representing the reproaches of Christ to his people. <i>Words of <b>reproach</b>.</i>
<b>reproof</b>	An act or expression of criticism and censure. <i>A look of <b>reproof</b>.</i>
<b>reprove</b>	Take to task. <i>He was <b>reproved</b> for obscenity.</i>
<b>retort</b>	Use (an opponent's argument) against them. <i>The answer they make to us may very easily be <b>retorted</b>.</i>
<b>revile</b>	Criticize in an abusive or angrily insulting manner. <i>He was now <b>reviled</b> by the party that he had helped to lead.</i>
<b>scold</b>	(of a bird) call loudly and persistently. <i>Mum took Anna away <b>scolding</b> her for her bad behaviour.</i>
<b>scolding</b>	Rebuking a person harshly. <i>She d get a <b>scolding</b> from Victoria.</i>
<b>sternly</b>	With sternness; in a severe manner. <i>No she said <b>sternly</b>.</i>
<b>upbraid</b>	Find fault with (someone); scold. <i>He was <b>upbraided</b> for his slovenly appearance.</i>
<b>verbally</b>	With the function of a verb. <i>She claimed to have been <b>verbally</b> abused.</i>
<b>vilify</b>	Spread negative information about. <i>He has been vilified in the press.</i>
