- attentive** (often followed by `to') giving care or attention.
*An **attentive** suitor.*
- chivalric** Characteristic of the time of chivalry and knighthood in the Middle Ages.
***Chivalric** rites.*
- considerate** Showing concern for the rights and feelings of others.
*Friends **considerate** enough to leave us alone.*
- gallant** (of a man) charmingly attentive and chivalrous to women.
*Put up a **gallant** resistance to the attackers.*
- gentlemanly** Befitting a gentleman.
*A **gentlemanly** profession.*
- honourable** Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent.
*A decent and **honourable** man.*
- knightly** Being attentive to women like an ideal knight.
*The **knightly** years.*

noble	Inert especially toward oxygen. <i>The Duchess of Kent and several other noble ladies.</i>
protective	Solicitously caring or mindful. <i>Animals with protective coloring.</i>
respectful	Full of or exhibiting respect. <i>They sit in respectful silence.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A deeply thoughtful essay.</i>

Associations of "Chivalrous" (30 Words)

affable	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An affable and agreeable companion.</i>
benign	Pleasant and beneficial in nature or influence. <i>Benign intentions.</i>
chivalry	The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct. <i>The age of chivalry.</i>
civility	Formal or perfunctory politeness. <i>I hope we can treat each other with civility and respect.</i>

comely	According with custom or propriety. <i>A comely face.</i>
comity	Courtesy and considerate behaviour towards others. <i>A show of public comity in the White House.</i>
courteous	Polite, respectful, or considerate in manner. <i>If a man be gracious and courteous to strangers it shows he is a citizen of the world.</i>
courtesy	(especially of transport) supplied free of charge to people who are already paying for another service. <i>He treated the players with courtesy and good humour.</i>
couth	Good manners; refinement. <i>It is more couth to hold your shrimp genteelly by the tail when eating.</i>
curtsy	Perform a curtsy. <i>She bobbed a curtsy to him.</i>
decorous	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Charlotte gave David a decorous kiss.</i>
favor	A feeling of favorable regard. <i>The outcome was in his favor.</i>
genteel	Characterized by exaggerated or affected politeness, refinement, or respectability. <i>Her genteel upbringing.</i>
gesture	Direct someone somewhere by means of a gesture. <i>He gestured his desire to leave.</i>
goodwill	The friendly hope that something will succeed. <i>The scheme is dependent on goodwill between the two sides.</i>
gracious	Disposed to bestow favors. <i>Greig was gracious in defeat.</i>
greeting	An acknowledgment or expression of good will (especially on meeting). <i>Warm greetings to you all.</i>
handsome	(of a woman) striking and imposing rather than conventionally pretty. <i>A handsome allowance.</i>
humble	Of low birth or station (‘base’ is archaic in this sense). <i>He built the business empire from humble beginnings.</i>
kindness	The quality of being warmhearted and considerate and humane and sympathetic. <i>He thanked them for their kindness and support.</i>

knighthood	Aristocrats holding the rank of knight. <i>He received a knighthood in the Birthday Honours.</i>
merciful	Showing or exercising mercy. <i>Sought merciful treatment for the captives.</i>
<u>modest</u>	Unassuming in the estimation of one's abilities or achievements. <i>Comfortable but modest cottages.</i>
nice	A city in southeastern France on the Mediterranean; the leading resort on the French Riviera. <i>A nice dress.</i>
<u>polite</u>	Having or showing behaviour that is respectful and considerate of other people. <i>Polite society.</i>
politely	In a respectful and considerate manner. <i>I politely thanked him for the suggestion.</i>
respectful	Feeling or showing deference and respect. <i>A respectful glance.</i>
respectfully	Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. <i>I must respectfully disagree with your claim.</i>
<u>unassuming</u>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <i>Unassuming to a fault skeptical about the value of his work.</i>
unpretentious	Not attempting to impress others with an appearance of greater importance, talent, or culture than is actually possessed. <i>A friendly and unpretentious hotel.</i>
