- chivalric** Characteristic of the time of chivalry and knighthood in the Middle Ages.  
***Chivalric** rites.*
- considerate** Showing concern for the rights and feelings of others.  
*Friends **considerate** enough to leave us alone.*
- gallant** (of a man) charmingly attentive and chivalrous to women.  
*Put up a **gallant** resistance to the attackers.*
- gentlemanly** Befitting a gentleman.  
*A **gentlemanly** profession.*
- honourable** Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent.  
*A decent and **honourable** man.*
- knightly** Being attentive to women like an ideal knight.  
*The **knightly** years.*

<b>noble</b>	Inert especially toward oxygen. <i>The Duchess of Kent and several other <b>noble</b> ladies.</i>
<b>protective</b>	Solicitously caring or mindful. <i>Animals with <b>protective</b> coloring.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Full of or exhibiting respect. <i>They sit in <b>respectful</b> silence.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A deeply <b>thoughtful</b> essay.</i>

## Associations of "Chivalrous" (30 Words)

<b>affable</b>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An <b>affable</b> and agreeable companion.</i>
<b>benign</b>	Pleasant and beneficial in nature or influence. <i><b>Benign</b> intentions.</i>
<b>chivalry</b>	The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct. <i>The age of <b>chivalry</b>.</i>
<b>civility</b>	Formal or perfunctory politeness. <i>I hope we can treat each other with <b>civility</b> and respect.</i>

<b>comely</b>	According with custom or propriety. <i>A <b>comely</b> face.</i>
<b>comity</b>	Courtesy and considerate behaviour towards others. <i>A show of public <b>comity</b> in the White House.</i>
<b>courteous</b>	Polite, respectful, or considerate in manner. <i>If a man be gracious and <b>courteous</b> to strangers it shows he is a citizen of the world.</i>
<b>courtesy</b>	(especially of transport) supplied free of charge to people who are already paying for another service. <i>He treated the players with <b>courtesy</b> and good humour.</i>
<b>couth</b>	Good manners; refinement. <i>It is more <b>couth</b> to hold your shrimp genteelly by the tail when eating.</i>
<b>curtsy</b>	Perform a curtsy. <i>She bobbed a <b>curtsy</b> to him.</i>
<b>decorous</b>	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Charlotte gave David a <b>decorous</b> kiss.</i>
<b>favor</b>	A feeling of favorable regard. <i>The outcome was in his <b>favor</b>.</i>
<b>genteel</b>	Characterized by exaggerated or affected politeness, refinement, or respectability. <i>Her <b>genteel</b> upbringing.</i>
<b>gesture</b>	Direct someone somewhere by means of a gesture. <i>He <b>gestured</b> his desire to leave.</i>
<b>goodwill</b>	The friendly hope that something will succeed. <i>The scheme is dependent on <b>goodwill</b> between the two sides.</i>
<b>gracious</b>	Disposed to bestow favors. <i>Greig was <b>gracious</b> in defeat.</i>
<b>greeting</b>	An acknowledgment or expression of good will (especially on meeting). <i>Warm <b>greetings</b> to you all.</i>
<b>handsome</b>	(of a woman) striking and imposing rather than conventionally pretty. <i>A <b>handsome</b> allowance.</i>
<b>humble</b>	Of low birth or station (‘base’ is archaic in this sense). <i>He built the business empire from <b>humble</b> beginnings.</i>
<b>kindness</b>	The quality of being warmhearted and considerate and humane and sympathetic. <i>He thanked them for their <b>kindness</b> and support.</i>

<b>knighthood</b>	Aristocrats holding the rank of knight. <i>He received a <b>knighthood</b> in the Birthday Honours.</i>
<b>merciful</b>	Showing or exercising mercy. <i>Sought <b>merciful</b> treatment for the captives.</i>
<b><u>modest</u></b>	Unassuming in the estimation of one's abilities or achievements. <i>Comfortable but <b>modest</b> cottages.</i>
<b>nice</b>	A city in southeastern France on the Mediterranean; the leading resort on the French Riviera. <i>A <b>nice</b> dress.</i>
<b><u>polite</u></b>	Having or showing behaviour that is respectful and considerate of other people. <i><b>Polite</b> society.</i>
<b>politely</b>	In a respectful and considerate manner. <i>I <b>politely</b> thanked him for the suggestion.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Feeling or showing deference and respect. <i>A <b>respectful</b> glance.</i>
<b>respectfully</b>	Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. <i>I must <b>respectfully</b> disagree with your claim.</i>
<b><u>unassuming</u></b>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <i><b>Unassuming</b> to a fault skeptical about the value of his work.</i>
<b>unpretentious</b>	Not attempting to impress others with an appearance of greater importance, talent, or culture than is actually possessed. <i>A friendly and <b>unpretentious</b> hotel.</i>
