- *The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct.*
- *Knights, noblemen, and horsemen collectively.*

attentiveness	Paying particular notice (as to children or helpless people). <i>This sight has maintained its top grading due to the attentiveness of the staff.</i>
considerateness	Kind and considerate regard for others.
consideration	A fact or a motive taken into account in deciding something. <i>The idea was motivated by political considerations.</i>
courtliness	Elegance suggestive of a royal court. Polite attentiveness to women.
gallantry	<i>No young man offers to carry this burden for her such gallantry is out of fashion.</i>
knight errantry	Originally a person of noble birth trained to arms and chivalry; today in Great Britain a person honored by the sovereign for personal merit.
knighthood	The title, rank, or status of a knight. <i>He received a knighthood in the Birthday Honours.</i>

knightliness	The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct.
magnanimity	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>Both sides will have to show magnanimity.</i>
<u>nobility</u>	The state of being of noble birth. <i>A member of the English nobility.</i>
politesse	Formal politeness or etiquette. <i>The suave circumlocutory politesse of a consular official.</i>
the knightly code	A set of rules or principles or laws (especially written ones).
thoughtfulness	Consideration for the needs of other people. <i>I am touched by your thoughtfulness.</i>

bioethics	The ethics of medical and biological research.
<u>chaste</u>	Without unnecessary ornamentation; simple or restrained. <i>A chaste consoling embrace.</i>
<u>chivalrous</u>	Courteous and gallant, especially towards women (typically used of a man or his behaviour). <i>Shall I be chivalrous and offer you my coat.</i>
<u>courteous</u>	Exhibiting courtesy and politeness. <i>She was courteous and obliging to all.</i>
<u>courtesy</u>	A courteous or respectful or considerate act. <i>He treated the players with courtesy and good humour.</i>
<u>decent</u>	Decently clothed. <i>That s awfully decent of you.</i>

decorous	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Charlotte gave David a decorous kiss.</i>
decorum	Propriety in manners and conduct. <i>He had acted with the utmost decorum.</i>
ethic	Relating to moral principles or the branch of knowledge dealing with these. <i>The ethic question is of wider import.</i>
etiquette	Rules governing socially acceptable behavior. <i>Etiquette books.</i>
<u>exemplar</u>	Something to be imitated. <i>The place is an exemplar of multicultural Britain.</i>
goodness	The quality of being morally good or virtuous. <i>A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.</i>
humble	Decisively defeat (a sporting opponent previously thought to be superior). <i>My humble apologies.</i>
humility	A disposition to be humble; a lack of false pride. <i>Not everyone regards humility as a virtue.</i>
<u>instance</u>	Cite (a fact, case, etc.) as an example. <i>Another instance occurred yesterday.</i>
kind	A category of things distinguished by some common characteristic or quality. <i>Our neighbor was very kind about the window our son broke.</i>
kindness	A kind act. <i>It would be a kindness on your part to invite her.</i>
knighthood	The title, rank, or status of a knight. <i>The basis of feudal knighthood.</i>
medieval	Resembling or likened to the Middle Ages, especially in being cruel, uncivilized, or primitive. <i>A medieval castle.</i>
meekness	The fact or condition of being meek; submissiveness. <i>All his best friends make fun of him for his meekness.</i>
<u>modest</u>	Limited in size or scope. <i>Comfortable but modest cottages.</i>
moral	Concerned with the principles of right and wrong behaviour. <i>The moral dimensions of medical intervention.</i>

morality	Principles concerning the distinction between right and wrong or good and bad behaviour. <i>The matter boiled down to simple morality innocent prisoners ought to be freed.</i>
nice	(of a person) good-natured; kind. <i>A nice point.</i>
paradigmatic	Related as members of a substitution class. <i>His biography is paradigmatic of the experiences of this generation.</i>
<u>polite</u>	Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others. <i>They thought she was wrong but were too polite to say so.</i>
prototype	Make a prototype of a product. <i>The firm is testing a prototype of the weapon.</i>
<u>righteous</u>	Morally justified. <i>Righteous indignation.</i>
<u>unassuming</u>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <i>Unassuming to a fault skeptical about the value of his work.</i>
virtue	Morality with respect to sexual relations. <i>Patience is a virtue.</i>
