**throttle**

Control an engine or vehicle with a throttle.

*The engines were at full **throttle**.*

**thwart**

From one side to another side of an area.

*He was **thwarted** in his desire to punish Uncle Fred.*

**valve**

Each of the halves of the hinged shell of a bivalve mollusc or brachiopod or of the parts of the compound shell of a barnacle.

*A **valve** shuts off the flow from the boiler when the water is hot enough.*

**welter**

A large number of items in no order; a confused mass.

*The shipwrecked survivors **weltered** in the sea for hours.*
