Definitions of "Chore" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “chore” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A tedious but necessary task.*
- *A routine task, especially a household one.*
- *A specific piece of work required to be done as a duty or for a specific fee.*



Synonyms of "Chore" as a noun (6 Words)

<u>burden</u>	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The burden of responsibility.</i>
duty	(of a visit or other undertaking) done from a sense of moral obligation rather than for pleasure. <i>A duty nurse.</i>
errand	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She asked Tim to run an errand for her.</i>
job	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>The gang pulled off a bank job in St Louis.</i>
task	A piece of work to be done or undertaken. <i>The endless task of classifying the samples.</i>
thing to be done	A persistent illogical feeling of desire or aversion.



Usage Examples of "Chore" as a noun

- *The farmer's morning chores.*
- *The early risers were up and about, doing their chores.*
- *He sees interviews as a chore.*

buyout	Acquisition of a company by purchasing a controlling percentage of its stock.
<u>clientele</u>	The customers of a shop, bar, or place of entertainment. <i>The solicitor s clientele.</i>
contracted	Reduced in size or pulled together. <i>The contracted pupils of her eyes.</i>
employed	(of a person) having a paid job. <i>Most of our graduates are employed.</i>
employee	A person employed for wages or salary, especially at non-executive level.
enterprise	A project or undertaking, especially a bold or complex one. <i>A state owned enterprise.</i>

livelihood	A means of securing the necessities of life. <i>He could no longer earn his own livelihood.</i>
lowly	Used of unskilled work (especially domestic work). <i>She d been too good for her lowly position.</i>
menial	A person with a menial job. <i>Menial factory jobs.</i>
milkman	A man who delivers and sells milk.
occupation	The period of time during which a place or position or nation is occupied. <i>The Roman occupation of Britain.</i>
occupational	Relating to a job or profession. <i>An occupational pension scheme.</i>
officiate	Perform duties attached to a particular office or place or function. <i>He baptized children and officiated at weddings.</i>
personnel	The department responsible for hiring and training and placing employees and for setting policies for personnel management. <i>Sales personnel.</i>
placement	Contact established between applicants and prospective employees. <i>Students spend one year on industrial placement.</i>
profession	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>After profession she taught in Maidenhead.</i>
project	Draw a projection of. <i>A history project.</i>
requisition	Demand the performance or occurrence of. <i>Requisition of grain at the point of a gun proved a novel experience for the peasantry.</i>
scullion	A servant assigned the most menial kitchen tasks.
service	Perform a service or services for someone. <i>Service is included in the final bill.</i>
subcontract	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i>Subcontract labour.</i>
