- *A specific piece of work required to be done as a duty or for a specific fee.*



## Synonyms of "Chore" as a noun (6 Words)

<b><u>burden</u></b>	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The <b>burden</b> of responsibility.</i>
<b>duty</b>	(of a visit or other undertaking) done from a sense of moral obligation rather than for pleasure. <i>A <b>duty</b> nurse.</i>
<b>errand</b>	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She asked Tim to run an <b>errand</b> for her.</i>
<b>job</b>	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>The gang pulled off a bank <b>job</b> in St Louis.</i>
<b>task</b>	A piece of work to be done or undertaken. <i>The endless <b>task</b> of classifying the samples.</i>
<b>thing to be done</b>	A persistent illogical feeling of desire or aversion.





## Usage Examples of "Chore" as a noun

- *The farmer's morning chores.*
- *The early risers were up and about, doing their chores.*
- *He sees interviews as a chore.*



## Associations of "Chore" (30 Words)

<b>buyout</b>	Acquisition of a company by purchasing a controlling percentage of its stock.
<b><u>clientele</u></b>	The customers of a shop, bar, or place of entertainment. <i>The solicitor s <b>clientele</b>.</i>
<b>contracted</b>	Reduced in size or pulled together. <i>The <b>contracted</b> pupils of her eyes.</i>
<b>employed</b>	(of a person) having a paid job. <i>Most of our graduates are <b>employed</b>.</i>
<b>employee</b>	A person employed for wages or salary, especially at non-executive level.
<b>enterprise</b>	A project or undertaking, especially a bold or complex one. <i>A state owned <b>enterprise</b>.</i>
<b>errand</b>	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She knew that if she stated her <b>errand</b> she would not be able to see him.</i>

<b>headhunter</b>	A person who identifies and approaches suitable candidates employed elsewhere to fill business positions. <i>A <b>headhunter</b> offering you a wonderful new position at a higher salary.</i>
<b>housekeeping</b>	The regulation of metabolic functions that are common to all cells. <i>I took care of the <b>housekeeping</b> and cooked most of the meals.</i>
<b>job</b>	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>This feature allows your computer to queue print <b>jobs</b>.</i>
<b>livelihood</b>	A means of securing the necessities of life. <i>He could no longer earn his own <b>livelihood</b>.</i>
<b>lowly</b>	Used of unskilled work (especially domestic work). <i>She d been too good for her <b>lowly</b> position.</i>
<b>menial</b>	A person with a menial job. <i><b>Menial</b> factory jobs.</i>
<b>milkman</b>	A man who delivers and sells milk.
<b>occupation</b>	The period of time during which a place or position or nation is occupied. <i>The Roman <b>occupation</b> of Britain.</i>
<b>occupational</b>	Relating to a job or profession. <i>An <b>occupational</b> pension scheme.</i>
<b>officiate</b>	Perform duties attached to a particular office or place or function. <i>He baptized children and <b>officiated</b> at weddings.</i>
<b>personnel</b>	The department responsible for hiring and training and placing employees and for setting policies for personnel management. <i>Sales <b>personnel</b>.</i>
<b>placement</b>	Contact established between applicants and prospective employees. <i>Students spend one year on industrial <b>placement</b>.</i>
<b>profession</b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>After <b>profession</b> she taught in Maidenhead.</i>
<b>project</b>	Draw a projection of. <i>A history <b>project</b>.</i>
<b>requisition</b>	Demand the performance or occurrence of. <i><b>Requisition</b> of grain at the point of a gun proved a novel experience for the peasantry.</i>
<b>scullion</b>	A servant assigned the most menial kitchen tasks.
<b>service</b>	Perform a service or services for someone. <i><b>Service</b> is included in the final bill.</i>
<b>subcontract</b>	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i><b>Subcontract</b> labour.</i>



<b>task</b>	Assign a task to. <i>It <b>tasked</b> his diplomatic skill to effect his departure in safety.</i>
<b>undertaking</b>	The action of undertaking to do something. <i>National transport <b>undertakings</b>.</i>
<b>vocation</b>	A strong feeling of suitability for a particular career or occupation. <i>GNVQs in Leisure and Tourism will be the introduction to a wide span of <b>vocations</b>.</i>
<b>work</b>	Give a workout to. <i>The chairman was prepared to <b>work</b> it for Phillip if he was interested.</i>
<b>workshop</b>	Small workplace where handcrafts or manufacturing are done. <i>The play was <b>workshopped</b> briefly at the Shaw Festival.</i>
