| personnel | The department responsible for hiring and training and placing employees and for setting policies for personnel management. Sales personnel . |
| placement | The action of finding a home, job, or school for someone. A placement in a special school. |
| profession | A body of people engaged in a particular profession. They were baptized on profession of faith. |
| project | Extend out or project in space. Spending was projected at 72 900 million. |
| requisition | Demand and take for use or service, especially by military or public authority for public service. Requisitions for an Extraordinary General Meeting must state the business to be transacted. |
| scullion | A servant assigned the most menial kitchen tasks. |
| service | A company or agency that performs a public service subject to government regulation. The washing machine needs to be serviced . |
