Definitions of "Chosen" as a noun

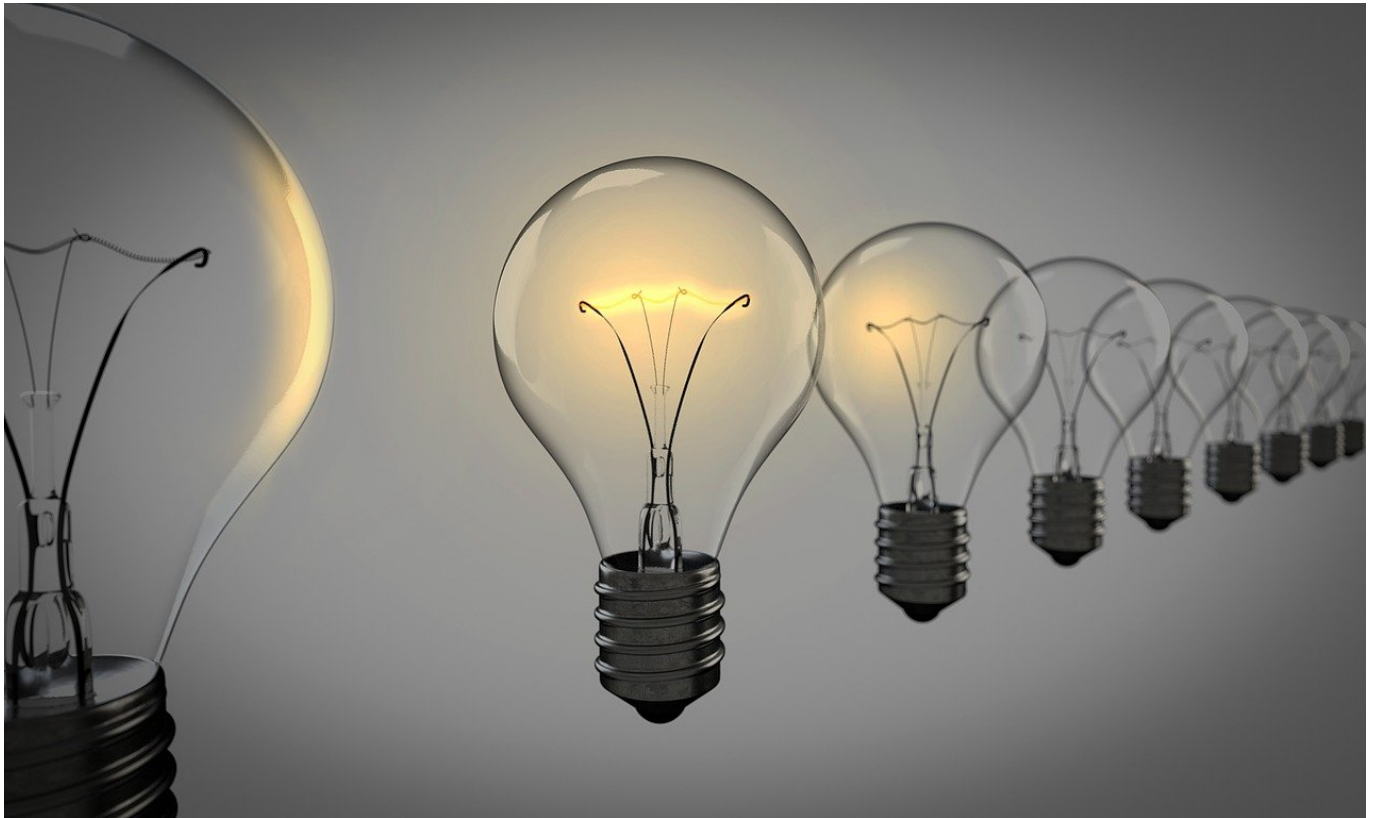
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “chosen” as a noun can have the following definitions:

elect An exclusive group of people.
*Success was a sign that they were one of the **elect**.*

Definitions of "Chosen" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "chosen" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having been selected as the best or most appropriate.*

Synonyms of "Chosen" as an adjective (5 Words)

- correct** Correct in opinion or judgment.
*The government was **correct** to follow a course of defeating inflation.*
- necessary** Unavoidably determined by prior circumstances.
*They granted the **necessary** planning permission.*

| abstention | Restraint in one's consumption; abstinence. <i>Alcohol consumption versus abstention.</i> |
| alternative | Serving or used in place of another. <i>An alternative lifestyle.</i> |
| ballot | The total number of votes cast in a ballot. <i>He won 54 per cent of the ballot.</i> |
| choice | The right or ability to choose. <i>Choice wine.</i> |
| choose | Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I always choose the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.</i> |
| competitively | In a way that compares favorably with others of the same nature, particularly in relation to price. <i>We will have to do some outsourcing to stay competitively priced.</i> |
| decide | Cause to decide. <i>We finally decided after lengthy deliberations.</i> |
| elect | Select by a vote for an office or membership. <i>An elect circle of artists.</i> |
| election | The predestination of some individuals as objects of divine mercy (especially as conceived by Calvinists). <i>She agreed to stand for election.</i> |
| elective | (of a person or office) appointed or filled by election. <i>Elective official.</i> |
| elector | In the US a member of the electoral college. <i>Close to 60 per cent of the 60 000 registered electors voted.</i> |

| electorate | All the people in a country or area who are entitled to vote in an election. <i>75 per cent of the electorate voted for a Scottish parliament in some form.</i> |
| elite | Selected as the best. <i>Elite colleges and universities.</i> |
| especially | Used to single out one person or thing over all others. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i> |
| favour | Treat (an injured limb) gently, not putting one's full weight on it. <i>Slashing public spending is a policy that few politicians favour.</i> |
| hustings | A meeting at which candidates in an election address potential voters. <i>Mrs Jones organized two public hustings.</i> |
| incoming | (of a communication) being received rather than sent. <i>Incoming class.</i> |
| opt | Make a choice from a range of possibilities. <i>Pupils opting to continue with physics.</i> |
| optional | Available to be chosen but not obligatory. <i>A wide range of optional excursions is offered.</i> |
| particular | Detailed information about someone or something. <i>She gets special or particular satisfaction from her volunteer work.</i> |
| particularly | To a higher degree than is usual or average. <i>Particularly able students.</i> |
| pick | Hit lightly with a picking motion. <i>She finally picked her successor.</i> |
| referendum | A general vote by the electorate on a single political question which has been referred to them for a direct decision. |
| scarify | Puncture and scar (the skin), as for purposes or tribal identification or rituals. <i>The men in some African tribes scarify their faces.</i> |
| select | Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>You can select from a range of quality products.</i> |
| selected | Chosen in preference to another. |
| selection | A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>The publication of a selection of his poems.</i> |
| specially | In a special manner. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i> |
| suffrage | A vote given in assent to a proposal or in favour of the election of a particular person. <i>Universal adult suffrage.</i> |
