correct Correct in opinion or judgment.

The government was **correct** to follow a course of defeating inflation.

necessary Unavoidably determined by prior circumstances. *They granted the necessary planning permission.*



Appropriate for a condition or purpose or occasion or a person's character,

proper needs.

An artist needs the **proper** tools.

required Required by rule.

Eight editions were published each required reading for trainees.

right Most suitable or right for a particular purpose.

Put things **right**.

elector In the US a member of the electoral college.

Close to 60 per cent of the 60 000 registered **elector**s voted.

All the people in a country or area who are entitled to vote in an election.

75 per cent of the **electorate** voted for a Scottish parliament in some form.

elite Selected as the best.

Elite colleges and universities.

especially Used to single out one person or thing over all others.

An **especially** or specially cautious approach to the danger.

favour

Treat (an injured limb) gently, not putting one's full weight on it.

Slashing public spending is a policy that few politicians **favour**.

hustings A meeting at which candidates in an election address potential voters.

Mrs Jones organized two public hustings.

incoming (of a communication) being received rather than sent.

Incoming class.

opt Make a choice from a range of possibilities.

Pupils **opt**ing to continue with physics.

Available to be chosen but not obligatory.

A wide range of **optional** excursions is offered.

particular Detailed information about someone or something.

She gets special or **particular** satisfaction from her volunteer work.

To a higher degree than is usual or average.

particularlyParticularly able students.

Hit lightly with a picking motion.

She finally **pick**ed her successor.

referendum A general vote by the electorate on a single political question which has

been referred to them for a direct decision.

Puncture and scar (the skin), as for purposes or tribal identification or

scarify rituals.

selected Chosen in preference to another.
