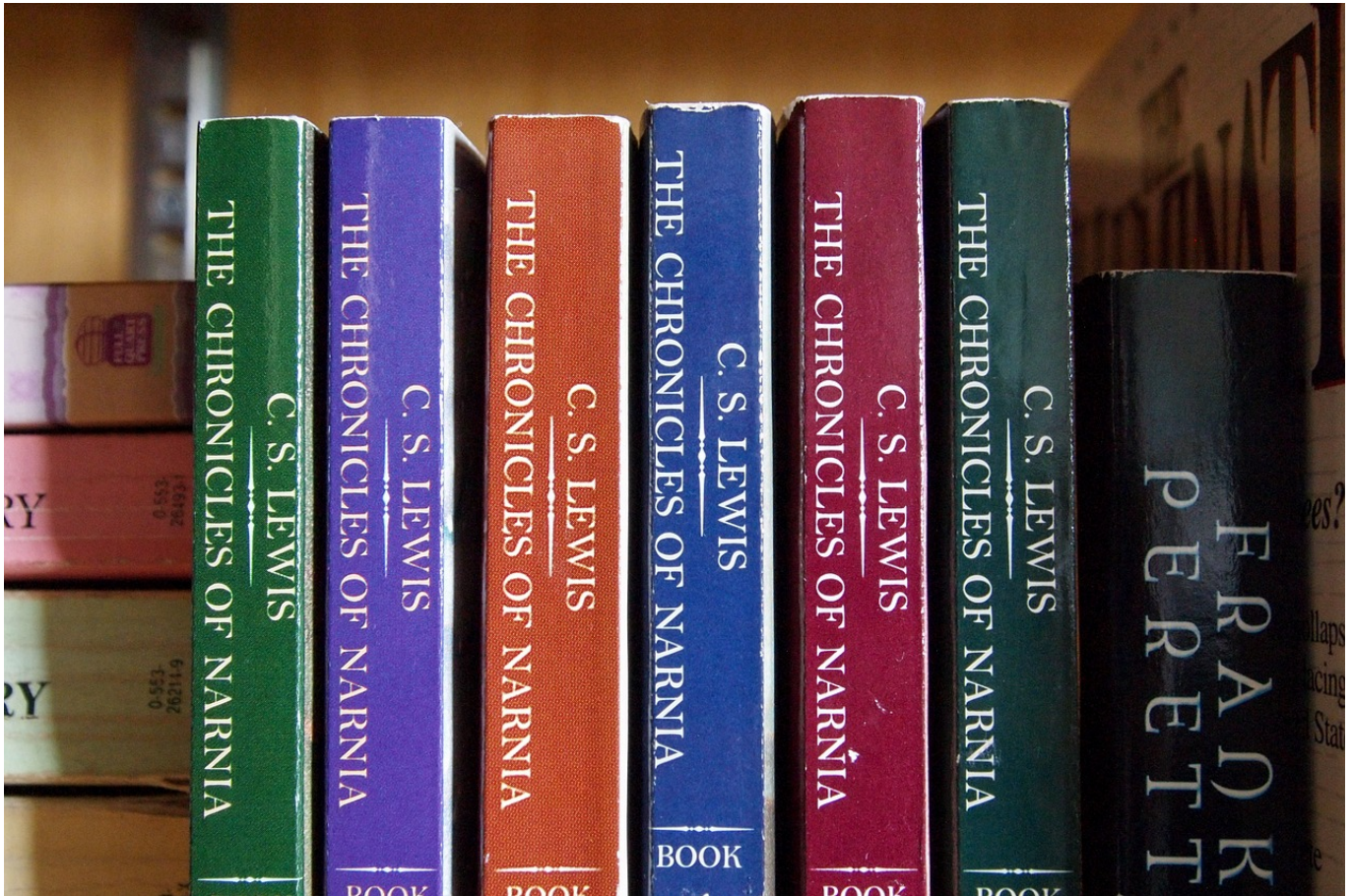

## Chronicle as a Noun

### Definitions of "Chronicle" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “chronicle” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A fictitious or factual work describing a series of events.*
- *A record or narrative description of past events.*
- *A factual written account of important or historical events in the order of their occurrence.*



## Synonyms of "Chronicle" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>account</b>	A short account of the news. <i>Don't do it on my <b>account</b>.</i>
<b>annals</b>	A record of events year by year. <i>Eighth century Northumberland <b>annals</b>.</i>
<b>archive</b>	A complete record of the data in part or all of a computer system, stored on an infrequently used medium. <i>They were allowed to study in the <b>archives</b>.</i>
<b>archives</b>	Collection of records especially about an institution.
<b>depiction</b>	A representation by picture or portraiture. <i>Michelangelo's <b>depictions</b> of the male nude.</i>
<b>description</b>	The action of giving a spoken or written account. <i>The emphasis was placed on explanation rather than <b>description</b>.</i>

<b>history</b>	The whole series of past events connected with a particular person or thing. <i>A patient with a complicated medical <b>history</b>.</i>
<b><u>impression</u></b>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>I wanted to create an <b>impression</b> of success.</i>
<b>portrayal</b>	Representation by drawing or painting etc. <i>His <b>portrayal</b> of the title character.</i>
<b>record</b>	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>He ruled that the criminal <b>record</b> of the defendant could not be disclosed to the court.</i>
<b><u>register</u></b>	A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill. <i>The system requires teachers to take the <b>register</b> at each lesson.</i>
<b>representation</b>	The description or portrayal of someone or something in a particular way. <i>Certain <b>representations</b> were made concerning police brutality.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>I m going to tell you a <b>story</b>.</i>



### **Usage Examples of "Chronicle" as a noun**

- *A chronicle of his life during the war years.*
- *A vast chronicle of Spanish history.*
- *The rebels' demands for personal freedom are conspicuous in the chronicles.*



## Chronicle as a Verb

### Definitions of "Chronicle" as a verb

- Record (a series of events) in a factual and detailed way.
- Record in chronological order; make a historical record.

- enter** Set out on an enterprise or subject of study.  
***Enter** a race.*
- put on record** Formulate in a particular style or language.
- record** Make a record of set down in permanent form.  
*The coroner **recorded** a verdict of accidental death.*
- register** Send by registered mail.  
*His features **registered** amusement.*
- report** Be responsible for reporting the details of as in journalism.  
*Eight Yorkshire terriers have been **reported** missing in the last month.*
- set down** Estimate.
- write down** Communicate by letter.

## Associations of "Chronicle" (30 Words)

<b>adaptation</b>	The action or process of adapting or being adapted. <i>Adaptations to the school curriculum.</i>
<b>adventure</b>	An unusual and exciting or daring experience. <i>I sold my East India <b>adventure</b> of 250 principal for 750.</i>
<b>allegory</b>	A story, poem, or picture that can be interpreted to reveal a hidden meaning, typically a moral or political one. <i>Pilgrim s Progress is an <b>allegory</b> of the spiritual journey.</i>
<b>anecdotal</b>	Characterized by or fond of telling anecdotes. <i><b>Anecdotal</b> conversation.</i>
<b>anecdote</b>	An account regarded as unreliable or hearsay. <i>His wife s death has long been the subject of rumour and <b>anecdote</b>.</i>
<b>annals</b>	Used in titles of learned journals. <i>Eighth century Northumberland <b>annals</b>.</i>
<b>antiquate</b>	Give an antique appearance to.
<b>apocryphal</b>	Being of questionable authenticity. <i>The <b>apocryphal</b> Gospel of Thomas.</i>
<b>apropos</b>	Introducing a different topic; in point of fact. <i>The song feels <b>apropos</b> to a midnight jaunt.</i>
<b>before</b>	Earlier in time; previously. <i>With the cross of Jesus marching on <b>before</b>.</i>
<b>chronological</b>	(of a record of events) following the order in which they occurred. <i>The diary provided a <b>chronological</b> framework for the events.</i>
<b>chronology</b>	The arrangement of events or dates in the order of their occurrence. <i>The novel abandons the conventions of normal <b>chronology</b>.</i>
<b>fable</b>	Myth and legend. <i>Men soon <b>fabled</b> up their Histories into Miracle and Wonder.</i>
<b>historical</b>	Having once lived or existed or taken place in the real world as distinct from being legendary. <i>For the Darwinians biogeography became a <b>historical</b> science.</i>
<b>history</b>	An eventful past. <i>The dawn of recorded <b>history</b>.</i>

<b>legend</b>	The story of a saint's life. <i>His speed and ferocity in attack were <b>legend</b>.</i>
<b>melting</b>	Becoming liquid. <i>She gave him a <b>melting</b> smile.</i>
<b><u>narration</u></b>	(rhetoric) the second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth. <i>His <b>narration</b> was hesitant.</i>
<b>outmoded</b>	Old-fashioned. <i><b>Outmoded</b> ideas.</i>
<b>past</b>	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the past. <i>They made a study of the reasons why <b>past</b> attempts had failed.</i>
<b>period</b>	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>An attractive and beautifully modernized <b>period</b> house.</i>
<b>prehistoric</b>	Belonging to or existing in times before recorded history. <i><b>Prehistoric</b> man.</i>
<b><u>primordial</u></b>	Existing at or from the beginning of time; primeval. <i>The <b>primordial</b> needs of the masses.</i>
<b>reportedly</b>	According to reports or other information. <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>sometime</b>	Occasional. <i>You must come and have supper <b>sometime</b>.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>Having such information is useful but it is not the whole <b>story</b>.</i>
<b><u>tale</u></b>	A fictitious or true narrative or story, especially one that is imaginatively recounted. <i><b>Tales</b> of witches and warlocks.</i>
<b>tedium</b>	The state or quality of being tedious. <i>The <b>tedium</b> of car journeys.</i>
<b><u>timely</u></b>	Before a time limit expires. <i><b>Timely</b> diagnosis and subsequent early administration will be imperative.</i>
<b>venture</b>	Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome. <i>Pioneering <b>ventures</b> into little known waters.</i>
