- *A record of events in the order of their occurrence.*
- *An arrangement of events in time.*
- *The arrangement of events or dates in the order of their occurrence.*



## Synonyms of "Chronology" as a noun (16 Words)

- [annals](#)** Historical records.  
*The deed will live forever in the **annals** of infamy.*
- archive** A depository containing historical records and documents.  
*They were allowed to study in the **archives**.*
- archives** Collection of records especially about an institution.
- [chain](#)** A decorative chain worn round the neck as jewellery or as a badge of office.  
*The action would initiate a **chain** of events.*
- concatenation** The linking together of a consecutive series of symbols or events or ideas etc.  
*It was caused by an improbable **concatenation** of circumstances.*
- course** A pursuit of game (especially hares) with greyhounds by sight rather than scent.  
*The **course** had only nine holes.*

<b><u>cycle</u></b>	The period of time taken to complete a cycle of events. <i>The recurrent <b>cycle</b> of harvest failure food shortages and price increases.</i>
<b>history</b>	A historical play. <i>A <b>history</b> of the labour movement.</i>
<b>order</b>	The insignia worn by members of an order of honour or merit. <i>He would deliver special <b>orders</b> for the Sunday dinner.</i>
<b><u>progression</u></b>	A series with a definite pattern of advance. <i>Good opportunities for career <b>progression</b>.</i>
<b>record</b>	Sound recording consisting of a disk with a continuous groove used to reproduce music by rotating while a phonograph needle tracks in the groove. <i>He held the world <b>record</b> for over a decade.</i>
<b><u>register</u></b>	A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill. <i>The system requires teachers to take the <b>register</b> at each lesson.</i>
<b>series</b>	A set of games played between two teams. <i>The metals of the lanthanide <b>series</b>.</i>
<b><u>string</u></b>	Relating to or consisting of stringed instruments. <i>Unwieldy packs tied up with <b>string</b>.</i>
<b>succession</b>	The action of following in order. <i>A <b>succession</b> of stalls offering soft drinks.</i>
<b><u>train</u></b>	A retinue of attendants accompanying an important person. <i>A camel <b>train</b>.</i>

- *The novel abandons the conventions of normal chronology.*

<b>annals</b>	Used in titles of learned journals. <i>Eighth century Northumberland <b>annals</b>.</i>
<b>antiquate</b>	Make obsolete or old-fashioned.
<b>apocalypse</b>	An event involving destruction or damage on a catastrophic scale. <i>The <b>apocalypse</b> of World War II.</i>
<b>before</b>	In front of someone or something. <i>My playing days had ended six years <b>before</b>.</i>
<b>biblical</b>	Of or pertaining to or contained in or in accordance with the Bible. <i><b>Biblical</b> names.</i>
<b>chronicle</b>	A record or narrative description of past events. <i>A <b>chronicle</b> of his life during the war years.</i>
<b>chronological</b>	Calculated in terms of the passage of time. <i>The diary provided a <b>chronological</b> framework for the events.</i>
<b>doyen</b>	A man who is the senior member of a group. <i>He became the <b>doyen</b> of British physicists.</i>
<b>early</b>	Early shifts. <i><b>Early</b> man.</i>
<b>historical</b>	Used of the study of a phenomenon (especially language) as it changes through time. <i>Doubt that a <b>historical</b> Camelot every existed.</i>
<b>history</b>	A continuous, typically chronological, record of important or public events or of a particular trend or institution. <i>All of human <b>history</b>.</i>
<b>holocaust</b>	Destruction or slaughter on a mass scale, especially caused by fire or nuclear war. <i>A nuclear <b>holocaust</b>.</i>
<b>inopportune</b>	Not opportune. <i>A storm blew up at an <b>inopportune</b> moment.</i>
<b>mythological</b>	Relating to, based on, or appearing in myths or mythology. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all <b>mythological</b> symbols.</i>
<b>neolithic</b>	Latest part of the Stone Age beginning about 10,000 BC in the Middle East (but later elsewhere).
<b>order</b>	Place in a certain order. <i>The company's products were in such demand that they got more <b>orders</b> than their call center could handle.</i>

<b>paleolithic</b>	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,000 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i><b>Paleolithic</b> artifacts.</i>
<b>past</b>	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>A flotilla of glossy limousines swept <b>past</b>.</i>
<b>period</b>	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>Two <b>periods</b> of PE are allocated on the timetable.</i>
<b>precedence</b>	The order to be ceremonially observed by people of different rank, according to an acknowledged or legally determined system. <i>Quarrels over <b>precedence</b> among the Bonaparte family marred the coronation.</i>
<b>prehistoric</b>	No longer fashionable. <i><b>Prehistoric</b> settlements.</i>
<b>previous</b>	Previous convictions a criminal record. <i>The boat s <b>previous</b> owner.</i>
<b>previously</b>	At an earlier time or formerly. <i>A <b>previously</b> unquestioned attitude.</i>
<b><u>primordial</u></b>	(of a cell, part, or tissue) in the earliest stage of development. <i>The <b>primordial</b> oceans.</i>
<b><u>priority</u></b>	Preceding in time. <i>National independence takes <b>priority</b> over class struggle.</i>
<b>regimentation</b>	The imposition of order or discipline.
<b><u>secondly</u></b>	In the second place. <i>He was presented first of all as a hopelessly unqualified candidate and <b>secondly</b> as an extremist.</i>
<b>sometime</b>	At some indefinite or unstated time. <i>The Emperor Constantine used this speech <b>sometime</b> unto his bishops.</i>
<b>time</b>	Assign a time for an activity or event. <i>The bomb had been <b>timed</b> to go off an hour later.</i>
<b>timing</b>	A particular point or period of time when something happens. <i>One of the secrets of cricket is good <b>timing</b>.</i>
