| <b>gallantry</b>           | Courageous behaviour, especially in battle.<br><i>A medal awarded for outstanding <b>gallantry</b> during the raid.</i>                          |
| <b>impertinence</b>        | Inappropriate playfulness.<br><i>They gasped at the <b>impertinence</b> of the suggestion.</i>   |
| <b><u>impertinent</u></b>  | Not pertinent to the matter under consideration.<br><i>Talk of rhetoric and strategy is <b>impertinent</b> to this process.</i>                  |
| <b>impudence</b>           | The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties.<br><i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>             |
| <b>impudent</b>            | Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent.<br><i>He could have strangled this <b>impudent</b> upstart.</i>                         |
| <b>indomitable</b>         | Impossible to subdue.<br><i>A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.</i>  |
| <b>insolence</b>           | The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties.<br><i>She was sacked for <b>insolence</b>.</i>                              |
