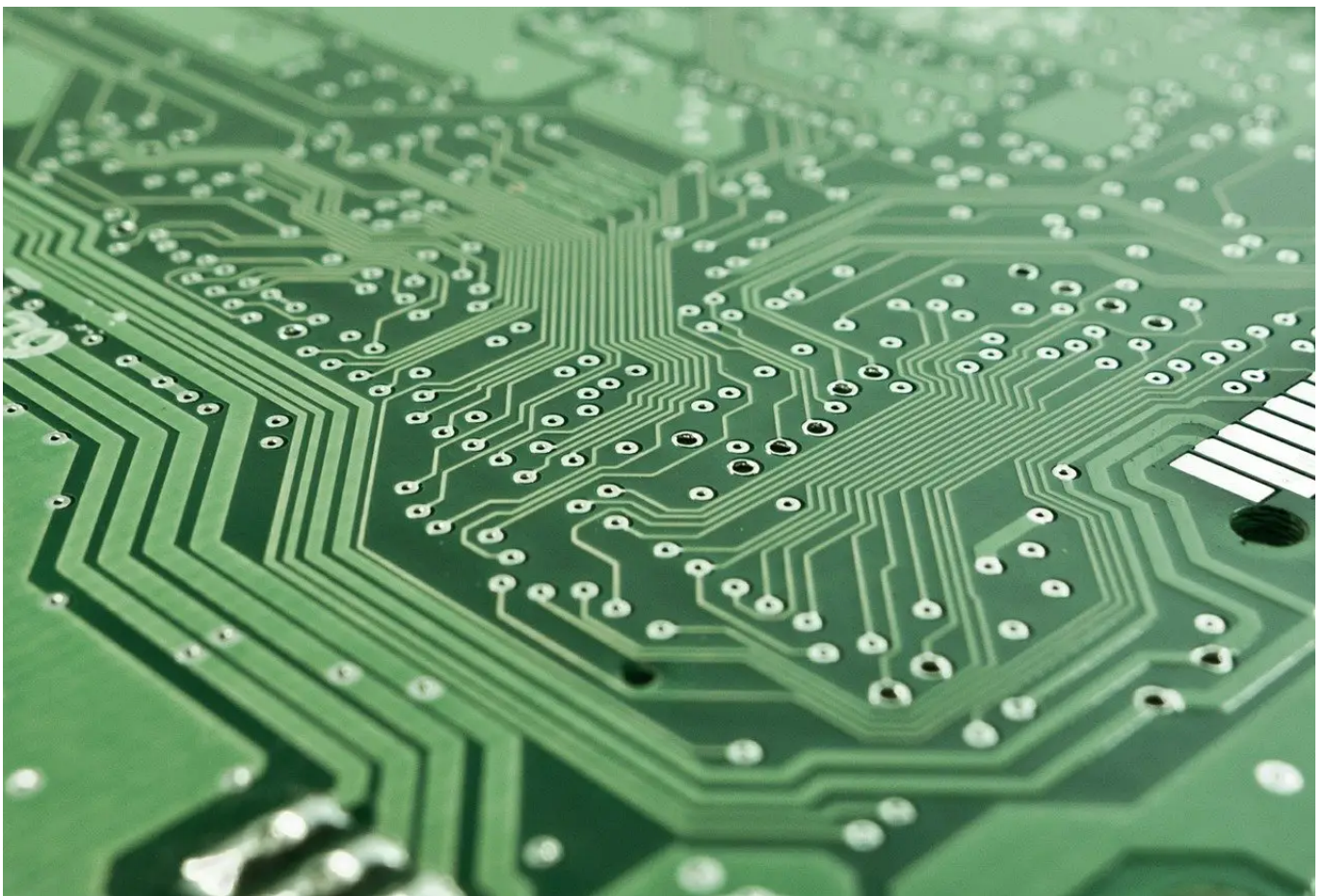
Circuit as a Noun

Definitions of "Circuit" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “circuit” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A roughly circular line, route, or movement that starts and finishes at the same place.*
- *The boundary line encompassing an area or object.*
- *A track used for motor racing, horse racing, or athletics.*
- *(law) a judicial division of a state or the United States (so-called because originally judges traveled and held court in different locations); one of the twelve groups of states in the United States that is covered by a particular circuit court of appeals.*
- *An established itinerary of events or venues used for a particular activity, typically involving sport or public performance.*
- *Movement once around a course.*
- *A system of electrical conductors and components forming an electrical circuit.*
- *An electrical device that provides a path for electrical current to flow.*
- *A chain of theatres or cinemas under a single management.*
- *A complete and closed path around which a circulating electric current can flow.*
- *A series of athletic exercises performed consecutively in one training session.*
- *A racetrack for automobile races.*

- A journey or route *all the way around* a particular place or area.
- A district administered or formerly administered by travelling judges.
- An established itinerary of venues or events that a particular group of people travel to.
- A regular journey made by a judge around a particular district to hear cases in court.
- A judicial division of a state or the United States (so-called because originally judges traveled and held court in different locations); one of the twelve groups of states in the United States that is covered by a particular circ.
- A group of local Methodist Churches forming an administrative unit.

The boundary line encompassing an area or object.

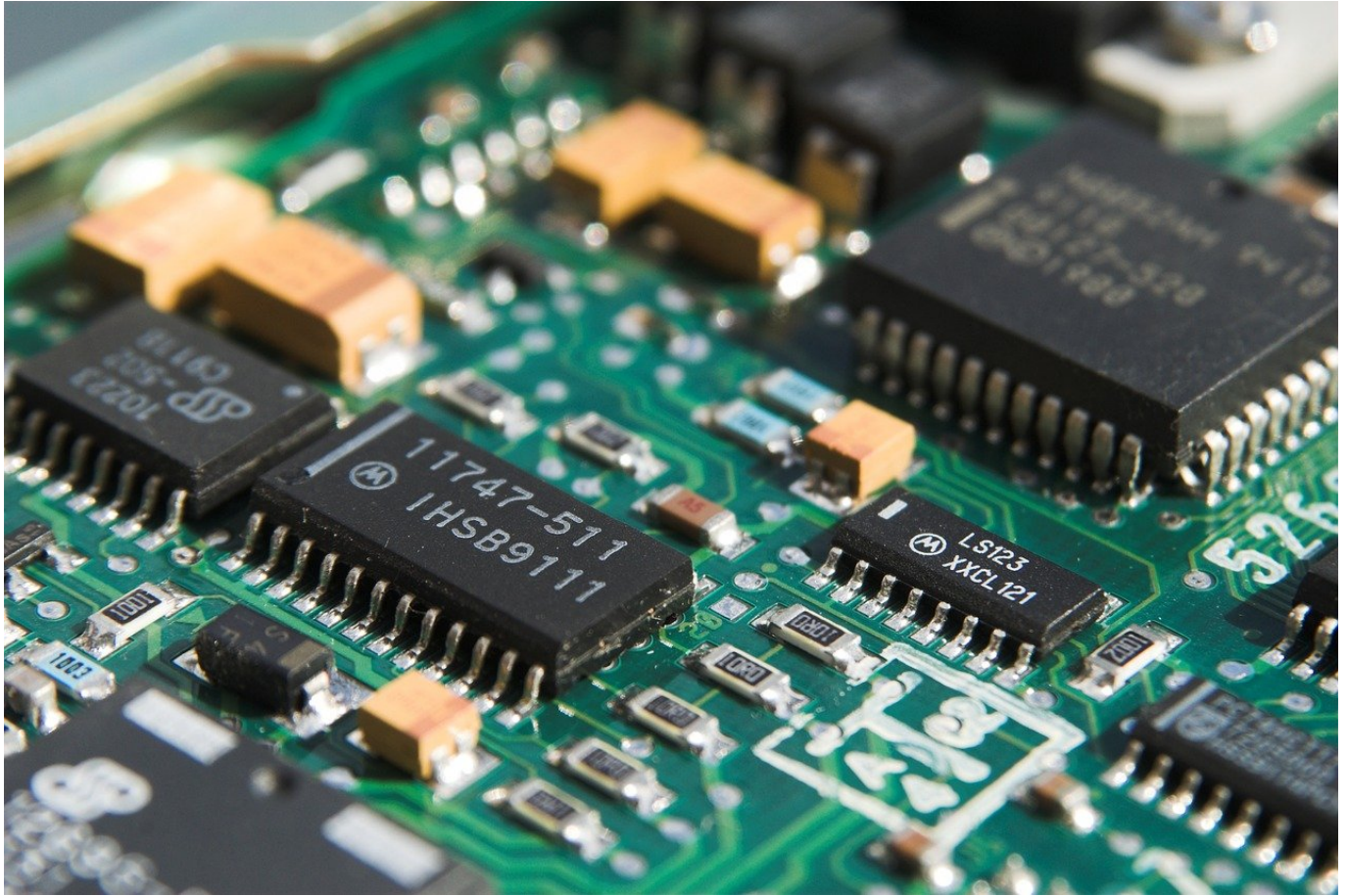
*A danger to all races over the whole **circumference** of the globe.*

course	(construction) a layer of masonry. <i>The course was less than a mile.</i>
electric circuit	A car that is powered by electricity.
lap	The part of an item of clothing especially a skirt or dress covering the lap. <i>The lap of the shingles should be at least ten inches.</i>
<u>loop</u>	An intrauterine device in the shape of a loop. <i>Make a loop in the twine.</i>
<u>orbit</u>	One complete circuit round an orbited body. <i>The satellite will complete one orbit every 12 hours.</i>
racetrack	A racecourse.
racing circuit	The sport of engaging in contests of speed.
revolution	A single orbit of one object around another or about an axis or centre. <i>The industrial revolution was also a cultural revolution.</i>
<u>round</u>	A partsong in which voices follow each other; one voice starts and others join in one after another until all are singing different parts of the song at the same time. <i>A round of golf takes about 4 hours.</i>
rounds	A serving to each of a group (usually alcoholic). <i>The doctor made his rounds.</i>
running track	The act of participating in an athletic competition involving running on a track.
<u>tour</u>	(in golf, tennis, and other sports) the annual round of events in which top professionals compete. <i>She joined the Royal Shakespeare Company on tour.</i>
tour of duty	A journey or route all the way around a particular place or area.
track	The act of participating in an athletic competition involving running on a track. <i>The track of an animal.</i>
turn	A place where a road meets or branches off another a turning. <i>You gave us quite a turn.</i>

Associations of "Circuit" (30 Words)

arc	Form an arch or curve. <i>His transformation provides the emotional arc of the story.</i>
behavior	Behavioral attributes the way a person behaves toward other people. <i>The behavior of small particles can be studied in experiments.</i>
bulbous	Shaped like a bulb. <i>The bulbous buttercup.</i>
<u>circle</u>	Form a circle around. <i>He paced away from her then circled back.</i>
<u>compass</u>	Drafting instrument used for drawing circles. <i>This region had within its compass many types of agriculture.</i>
concentric	Having a common center. <i>A universe consisting of concentric spheres or layers.</i>

conical	Having the shape of a cone. <i>Conical mountains.</i>
convex	Curving or bulging outward. <i>A convex lens.</i>
diameter	A transverse measurement of something; width or thickness.
ellipse	A regular oval shape, traced by a point moving in a plane so that the sum of its distances from two other points (the foci) is constant, or resulting when a cone is cut by an oblique plane which does not intersect the base. <i>The sums of the distances from the foci to any point on an ellipse is constant.</i>
ellipticity	The degree of deviation from circularity (or sphericity).
epicycle	An epicycle used to describe planetary orbits in the Ptolemaic system.
globose	Having the shape of a sphere or ball- Zane Grey. <i>The cells are generally globose.</i>
helical	Having the shape or form of a helix; spiral. <i>Helical molecules.</i>
hemisphere	A half of the celestial sphere. <i>The left hemisphere plays a dominant role in the comprehension of language.</i>
homocentric	Having a common center.
<u>mechanism</u>	A contrivance in the plot of a literary work. <i>The mechanism of infection.</i>
<u>pivot</u>	A movement in which the player holding the ball may move in any direction with one foot while keeping the other the pivot foot in contact with the floor. <i>The pivot of community life was the chapel.</i>
radius	The bone in a vertebrate s foreleg or a bird s wing that corresponds to the radius in a human being. <i>There are plenty of local pubs within a two mile radius.</i>
reentrant	Pointing inward.
<u>revolve</u>	Treat as the most important element. <i>The earth revolves around the sun.</i>
rotary	A rotary machine engine or device. <i>There is an output level rotary for overall volume setting.</i>
rotunda	A building having a circular plan and a dome. <i>A rotunda that exits on four roads into Greater Manila.</i>
<u>round</u>	Make round. <i>He could move quickly despite his round physique.</i>

shaped

Shaped to fit by or as if by altering the contours of a pliable mass as by work or effort.

*An enclosed back garden with a **shaped** lawn.*

sphere

Enclose in or as if in a sphere.

*The room was littered with books maps and **spheres**.*

spherical

Of or relating to spheres or resembling a sphere.

***Spherical** pearls.*

surround

Surround so as to force to give up.

*He loves to **surround** himself with family and friends.*

tour

Take a performer production etc on tour.

*He **toured** in America and Europe.*

tripping

Characterized by a buoyant rhythm.

*A **tripping** singing measure.*
