<u>castle</u>	A magnificent and imposing old mansion. The crumbling stonework of a ruined <b>castle</b> .
donjon	The great tower or innermost keep of a castle.
<u>fort</u>	A fortified military post where troops are stationed. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of <b>fort</b>s.</i>
fortification	Defensive structure consisting of walls or mounds built around a stronghold to strengthen it. <i>The building and maintenance of fortifications.</i>



<u>fortress</u>	A military stronghold, especially a strongly fortified town. <i>He had proved himself to be a <b>fortress</b> of moral rectitude</i> .
<u>keep</u>	Charge; control. Each child was expected to pay for their <b>keep</b> .
stronghold	A strongly fortified defensive structure. Their mountain <b>stronghold</b> s fell to enemy attack.
<u>tower</u>	A fortress or stronghold in the form of or including a tower. A titanic <b>tower</b> of garbage.

legionary	Of an ancient Roman legion. The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.
medieval	Resembling or likened to the Middle Ages, especially in being cruel, uncivilized, or primitive. Without other people around I would let my flat degenerate into <b>medieval</b> levels of squalor.
<u>military</u>	The military forces of a nation. As a young man he joined the <b>military</b> and pursued a career in the Army.
outpost	A remote part of a country or empire. Troops in some <b>outpost</b> s have surrendered.
<u>palace</u>	Official residence of an exalted person (as a sovereign. <i>The royal <b>palace</b>.</i>
<u>protector</u>	The title of the head of state in England during the later period of the Commonwealth between 1653 and 1659, first Oliver Cromwell (1653-8), then his son Richard (1658-9). A man who became her <b>protector</b> adviser and friend.
rampart	Fortify or surround with or as if with a rampart. The open Pacific broke on the far off <b>rampart</b> s of the reef.



recapture	Take back by force, as after a battle. The author <b>recapture</b> s an old idea here.
<u>siege</u>	The action of an armed force that surrounds a fortified place and isolates it while continuing to attack. Two cult members have died so far in the four day <b>siege</b> .
<u>soldier</u>	Serve as a soldier in the military. I <b>soldier</b> ed with your father on his last four campaigns.
sortie	(military) an operational flight by a single aircraft (as in a military operation. <i>This latest book is the author s first <b>sortie</b> into non fiction.</i>
stockade	An enclosure bound by a stockade. They built <b>stockade</b> s around their towns.
<u>stronghold</u>	A place where a particular cause or belief is strongly defended or upheld. <i>A Labour <b>stronghold</b></i> .
<u>warfare</u>	An active struggle between competing entities. <i>Guerrilla <b>warfare</b></i> .
<u>warrior</u>	Any of a number of standing poses in yoga in which the legs are held apart and the arms are stretched outwards. <i>The warrior</i> heroes of ancient Greece.
